Maura chose to take a mourning period and I found myself at a crossroads: do I stay in the muck or move on? I chose to say "NEXT!" and move on as quickly as I could from the "failure" I had experienced.

One day I turned to my wife and said, "Give me the greatest book title I've ever heard, that's all I need is a good book title."

It took her all of a minute and a half. She looked at me and said, "Who Do You Think You Are?"

I was blown away. I thought it *was* the greatest book title I had ever heard. I asked Maura, "What would it be about?"

We brainstormed a bit and came up with an idea or two. We originally thought it would be a book of interviews with people who had gone from rags to riches, a book all about success and how those who are successful think and act.

I contacted one of the teachers from *The Secret* and asked to meet with him. He agreed to meet and we set a date. I then told my wife we had a meeting and we needed to complete our pitch on the book.

"What book?" she asked.

"Who Do You Think You Are?" I replied.

"That idea is half-baked," she said.

I responded, "Well then we'd better bake it and quick."

We met with this man, who has now become a mentor of ours, and spent a half-day with him. I am so grateful for that time, as this great teacher put my wife and me on a path of abundance. He helped us realize our self-worth, something we had been missing until then.

It wasn't long before I realized that this mentor wasn't going to have the time to collaborate on the project. In addition, the project didn't have enough "juice" for me the way it was, so, I went to prayer with it. I checked within myself and sat with the title until the purpose of the book came to me! I did what many wise mentors will tell you to do. I went inside for the answer I was searching for.

As I sat in silence waiting for the answer to my question, I remembered back to a time when I was searching for my life's purpose. I had spent many years asking *Who am I? What is my purpose?* I went from church to church, synagogue to mosque, looking for the answers. As a matter of fact, during this search I spent much time wishing I could sit in front of all the people I considered to be successful and clearly

living their purpose so that I could ask them the three questions I ask in this book. I found myself thinking about all the people who are still searching for their *life's purpose*, and that's when I came up with the idea for this book.

I realized that I had been surrounding myself with these great teachers, had built relationships with many of them, and that I was now in a position where I could ask these questions for the people who are still searching. Who do you think you are?

Who am I? Well, that has changed over the years. It evolves because of awareness. I now see that we are God's highest form of creation. We're created in His image and we're here to do His work. Since God's the Creator and gave us creative faculties we should be creating, doing good work, always beyond what we're doing.

Jane Willhite, who runs PSI Seminars is a good friend of mine, and a number of years ago I went up to her ranch with Mark Meyerdirk

and John Assaraf and we spent three days there. That's where I re-evaluated my purpose and my vision and I've let it guide me since then. The more I read 'My Purpose' and the more I look at it, the more I see wisdom in it. My purpose is to live and work in a prosperous environment that encourages productivity so that I may improve the service I render to my family, my company, my community, my nation and ultimately the world. My vision is to build a global organization dedicated to improving the quality of life worldwide. We create products and services at a profit, which is in harmony with the law of compensation. These products and services are created and marketed with like-minded people who share in our purpose.

Many years ago Karl Menninger said, 'environment's more important than heredity.' If we live and work in a prosperous environment that encourages productivity, that's going to stimulate our creative faculties and encourage us to keep improving on what we're doing. I believe that spirit is always for expansion and fuller expression, never for disintegration, and God operates by law and the laws are God's modus operandi. The more we understand the laws the better off we're going to be at keeping our life in harmony with those laws. So that's my stated purpose and I believe I'm on the right track because my results would indicate that.

I'm seventy-three and I've got as much energy as most people at twenty-three. I have attracted a phenomenal team of people in our company and I love what I do. I have a strong focus on money because I see it as an incredible creative instrument. I think money's used for two things. It's to help you be comfortable, and the more comfortable you are the more creative you can be. Beyond that, it's used to extend the service that you render beyond your own presence. Whatever I earn I invest back in what I do. I don't invest in real estate, stocks, bonds or anything like that. I'm not interested in creating great wealth, I'm interested in providing great service. What I earn goes back into the business and to what I do.

What events or series of events lead to your discovery?

Oddly enough, the first person who "reached me" asked me the same question as the one above: Who are you? I looked at him like he had fallen out of a tree and I said, "What do you mean, who am I? I'm Bob."

"You're not Bob," he said.

"Really, well who am I then?"

"Bob and Proctor are just two words," he said. "That's your name, it's not you."

I pointed to my body, "Well, okay, this is me."

"No, that's not you," he said. "That's your body. You've never heard anybody phone into work and say, 'Body's not coming in today; it's sick.'"

He really provoked me to think and it was possibly the first time in my life I really did think. He changed my life.

His name was Ray Stanford and he was a very ordinary guy. He's gone now. When I met him, he was moving houses... literally, he'd put them up on jacks and move them. He obviously saw something in me that I couldn't see in myself. He got me to sit down and really look at my results.

He put an 'R' on a sheet of paper and he said, "That represents results." He put two 'Hs' and a 'W' beside it and said, "That's happiness, health and wealth." Then he asked me if I thought he was a happy guy.

I said, "Yeah." I hadn't known him a long time, but he seemed pretty happy to me.

"Have you ever seen me when I was sick?"

"Uh, no."

"Have you ever seen me when I was broke?"

The guy always had money on him, so I said, "No."

"Well," he said, "you've got to be one of the most miserable people I've ever met. You're always broke, you're always complaining of a headache or backache or something. Why don't you change?"

I was earning \$4,000 a year at the time and I owed \$6,000. I could never see myself getting out of debt. I thought the only way to earn money was on my job. I was working at the fire department in a suburb of Toronto and I was stuck in a rut. I didn't believe I could change, but he did. The more he talked to me, the more I believed he believed I could change, and I really believed in his belief in me. He got me to read *Think and Grow Rich* and that's when my whole world started to change. That led me to Earl Nightingale's condensed narration of it and my income went up to \$150,000 a year, then \$175,000, then it went over a million.

I couldn't figure out what was happening. I was doing the right things but I didn't know what I was doing. I wasn't satisfied with the fact I had changed. I wanted to know why. According to my understanding, what was happening to me shouldn't have happened. I hadn't gone to school and I had no business experience. I realized that a lot of the things

I'd been told weren't true. So I just kept studying and I've never stopped. That was in 1961. That was what led me to where I am today, studying the mind, the laws of the universe, and paradigms.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their purpose in life, what would it be?

I would tell them to do what I did. I've always had a coach or a mentor and it was always a person who had accomplished what I wanted to accomplish. I went to visit Earl Nightingale because I was so hooked on his stuff. I was living in Toronto and he was in Chicago. I scheduled a meeting with him for an hour and when I was leaving I asked him, "What's the real secret behind everything?"

He just looked at me and said, "You should find out what you love to do and then dedicate your life to it. The problem with most people is they never figure that out."

I got really excited because I knew what I wanted to do; I wanted to do what Earl was doing. I made up my mind when I left his office that that's what I would do. I ultimately ended up in an office right beside him because I wanted to work with him; then I got the benefit of working with his partner Lloyd Conant, too.

I've always had a tremendous coach or mentor. And because of Ray Stanford, I always did exactly what they told me whether I agreed with it or not. I would do it until I found out they were lying or it wouldn't work, but they never lied and it always worked. I realized that our paradigms are what mess us up. Our paradigms control our logic; they color our perception.

If you're getting advice from someone who has demonstrated, by results, that they've done what you want to do, even though the advice may seem illogical to you, you'll probably get to where you want to go.

I believe people should study a little bit every day. It should become habitual, like brushing your teeth, combing your hair, having a shower or getting dressed. Study the mind, the laws of the universe and paradigms. There's enough information on those subjects to keep a person studying forever. I've been doing that for going on fifty years and if I live for another fifty, I'll continue to do it. The rewards have been nothing short of amazing.

Who do think you are?

I'm not a big fan of these kinds of questions. I'm the kind of guy who would write a book titled: *If You Think You Know Who You Are - Buy This Book and Discover You're Somebody Else*. I don't ask myself this

question. I've been meditating now for over 30 years and by persuasion, I am probably a Taoist or a Zen practitioner. I don't ask these kinds of questions and expect unpretentious answers. From what I've learned in our conversations with some of the world's most enduringly successful people, from Nobel Prize Laureates to billionaires, poets and artists, former US presidents and heads of state, together with people many of us have never heard of—people who are changing the world for the better—they don't ask themselves questions like this either.

If you ask them what they think it's all about, they've pretty much come to the conclusion that as you mature emotionally and mentally, you move from self-obsession and the expectation that life should serve you, to, as Senator John McCain told us, "being committed to a cause greater than oneself" and the realization that at the end of the day we are here to serve life.

What events or series of events led to your discovery?

The short story is that I was born to artist parents of very modest means. My father left after I was conceived and went off to serve in the Second World War. He was wounded and came back and passed away. Our home in the Blue Mountains of Australia was an isolated cabin constructed of gasoline cans filled with clay topped with a tin roof and basically without indoor plumbing. My father used to go there to paint watercolor landscapes. That's where I lived for the first 12 years of my life. Needless to say, it was pretty unpretentious.

I studied philosophy, psychology and economics at the University of Sydney. I taught design at the University of South Wales School of Architecture and along with a couple of very talented friends ran Honi Soit, the student newspaper of the University of Sydney.

I went from there to become highly successful in Australia as an advertising photographer and cinematographer and ultimately one of the creative directors of one of the largest ad agencies in the world. I was accountable for the look and feel of their television advertising and bringing it to creative acclaim. I woke up one day and realized I had solved the problem of being poor and had enough stuff to start my own world, but it hadn't made much difference as to how I felt on the inside. I still felt like the lonely little kid growing up in the Blue Mountains.

I had gotten to be pretty famous in a relatively small fishpond. Then one day I saw an issue of *Look Magazine*, edited by George Leonard, devoted to what was going on in California in the late 60s. By way of

back story, in a meeting with Michael Murphy, (one of the cofounders of the Esalen Institute) Michael asked George what they should call this "happening" and George Leonard suggested that they could call it the "Human Potential Movement." The name stuck and the rest, as they say, is history.

I was, coincidentally at about the same time, leading what they call "T Groups" in Australia. I had a US-based client who invited me to the United States to do some work for them in San Francisco Bay Area. I came in 1971 for a couple of weeks and I'm still here. I kind of collided with what was happening in this human potential movement and ran into a brilliant fellow called Werner Erhard. We conducted a T group for Werner and his staff, which marked the beginning of EST. Many of the core ideas from the EST Training have become incorporated into a vast body of ongoing work many of us are engaged in today. These ideas include the work around belief systems, taking personal responsibility for the experience of our lives and creating outcomes that matter to us.

I'm a passionately curious man and the whole process of the emergence of human potential engaged my curiosity and awakened my passion. In Australia I had started reading from the works of Jiddu Krishnamurti, especially a little book called *Think On These Things*. San Francisco was where it was happening in those days and once I arrived I became swept away by the work. Today I'm still passionately curious about all that it means to be a human being. I am deeply moved when in the presence of human greatness and by our continuing work in support of human excellence. I think there's a lot of superficiality around the edges of "The Movement" these days, which I don't care for. I believe one has to go deep and a lot of people don't go deep, and that's a pity.

The majority of the wonderful woman and men you will meet in the pages of *Success Built To Last* described their lives as a serendipitous journey filled with unexpected wonders and riches beyond their early dreams. My life has been, and continues to be, like this. I am deeply grateful.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their purpose in life, what would it be?

I believe this is a very personal question. Purpose is an intensely personal choice. The flip answer is "it's whatever you want it to be." I am not an advocate of the theory that as part of the Grand Design for the Universe there's some unique purpose for each of us. I take the point of

view, shared by a lot of extraordinarily accomplished people, that what we call meaning is a precious resource that lives within us that we can choose to invest in life—or not. I'm with Shakespeare, "things are neither good nor bad but thinking makes them so." This idea put into practice becomes an expression of personal accountability at the highest level.

We could re-phrase this to say, "nothing has meaning other than the meaning we give it." We do not live in the world; we live in our story about the world. We are the source responsible for the meaning our story has for us. If we change the meaning we change our life. That's one of the essential messages that we were giving to people in the EST Training and the Actualizations Workshop. Nothing has happened in the last thirty-five years that leads me to see this differently. How we invest our resource of meaning shapes our life and determines the quality of our experience and whether we are successful.

I've observed that people who are committed to a cause bigger than themselves, who are engaged in serving life rather than attempting to manipulate life into serving them, have richer, more satisfying, more enduringly successful lives. I don't assign spiritual causality to this reality. As a metaphor we could delve into the science of genetics and make a pretty good argument that genes are organized to choose cooperation over competition at any price because it's in the best interests of the gene's ability to do what genes do, which is replicate. So, what we have here is a kind of cooperative altruism at work in service of evolution. Whether this is cosmic design or serendipity, I do not know. For me, if it is serendipity, it is even more awe inspiring.

You have posed questions worthy of deep conversation that do not lend themselves to trivial answers. Organizations need to have a purpose, and I believe people need to become aware of what it is they are deeply passionate about, what it is they love to do—and then get really good at it. Our friends Janet and Chris Atwood have written a terrific book titled *The Passion Test*. I recommend that you to take the Passion Test for yourself. We noticed in *Success Built To Last* that successful people are unwilling to settle in life for doing something that they are not passionate about or don't love to do. And they get really good at doing what matters to them. Most people never learn how to become really good at anything—let alone something they love and that matters to them.

Enduringly successful people get really clear about what they are willing to invest meaning in, what matters to them, what they love to do, and then they develop a deliberate practice to get really good at it,

and they go deep. They recruit people to their dream and they build organizations and networks capable of making a difference. Theirs is a chosen purpose. Is it also a pre-ordained purpose? Very few of the successful people I talk to see it this way. Meaning and purpose are things that they mindfully choose. They live with integrity to meaning. That is to say they manage their thoughts and actions in service of this meaning and their chosen purpose. In this way they live the fully accountable life.

May you choose wisely!

Who do you think you are?

I believe that my higher purpose in life is to make a positive difference in the lives of others.

What event or series of events led to your discovery?

In the beginning I didn't really understand that my life had a higher purpose. I think I was like a lot of people. I was struggling to make my way through life, and I lived life for Dave Anderson. I wanted to know how I could get more, how I could satisfy myself. I spent most of my earlier years in that pursuit. I would work hard and I'd get so far, then I'd hit a brick wall and I'd crash and burn. Like most Type A personalities, I'd pick myself up again, get back in the game, work hard, bust my butt, and then hit a brick wall and crash and burn all over again.

I think when someone is seeking self-gratification it's easy to get messed up in substance abuse and drinking. At least it was for me. There are many different ways that people use to feel happy. Maybe they're looking for that magical moment (the high you experience the first time you use). When you experience that first high, you really feel like you've found something. But then like all addictive substances, the next time you go after it, it doesn't quite get you so high. So you drink a little bit more, or you use a little bit more drugs, and you're in that constant search for that gratification, that incredible high, that elusive magical moment, unachievable after the first time experience.

When I reached this point, I started to spiral downward. In that moment of personal failure, I did like a lot of people do; I blamed the economy and I blamed others. I always had an excuse for why I just couldn't get over the hump or why I could never attain my dreams. I was doing it to myself, but I would blame everyone and everything else instead of taking responsibility for my own actions. I didn't understand that it *wasn't* just about Dave Anderson; there were others around me who suffered as a result of my behavior.

Then my wife put me into treatment. For the first couple of weeks I sat around saying, "I can't believe my wife would do something like this to me." Today I've learned that recovery is a gift. It's the gift of healing. When I had been in recovery for about two weeks, contemplating where I had been, I really started to understand that I was my own worst enemy! I found myself on my knees at the side of my bed praying to God, the Holy Spirit, Jesus...I mean I was praying to everybody, and I

said, "God I'm tired of being sick and tired, and I'm tired of doing things Dave Anderson's way. It seems like everything that I try just doesn't work. I'm done doing things my way and I want to be forgiven, I want to be cleansed." It was at that moment I discovered the power of the word "surrender." I think that when you can ask for help and surrender to something greater, it's really a sign of wisdom and strength.

I think a lot of people are still trying to do their plan. You know, there's a saying that goes, if you want to make God laugh, tell him your plan. I was so intent on doing it my way and for my reasons that I never understood the spiritual side to all of it. I hadn't realized that there's a reason why we've been given talents or been blessed with certain gifts. Sometimes we get so full of ourselves that we forget to notice the real reason why we've been put on this earth, and that's for a higher purpose. I never understood that until the moment I surrendered my life and gave it over to an almighty power that I know as God. When I got off the floor that day, I felt like the weight of the world had been lifted from my shoulders. I felt free. I felt enlightened. I felt empowered. And from that moment on I started living my life in servitude. I started to read and understand the Bible. The Bible says that the meek shall inherit the earth and it talks about humbleness. Jesus was always humble. I started to understand that I was like Mother Teresa or Gandhi. I was a servant of other people, and I could give the best I had to the greatest number of people, and do it without any expectation other than just being able to give to other people.

Once I made this decision, I didn't have to worry about where success came from. All the doors that were so difficult to open before started springing open. It's amazing what I accomplished once I understood that it isn't all about Dave Anderson. Since I've been living a life of giving the best that I have to other people, I've really discovered what my purpose in life is all about.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their purpose in life, what would it be?

I think almost all successful people recognize that they are spiritual beings. We can go to school to learn disciplines, whether it's art, music or a profession like being an attorney. Those are all technical disciplines which you will become proficient at if you really study. But, the people who really succeed in touching many lives are the ones who understand that they have a spiritual side. Those who are unafraid to recognize this

are able to connect to God's great universe, all of its resources, and the unbelievable abundance that is out there. When you live in the realm of only what you can do, well there's only so much you can do as a human being. Once you surrender to a higher power, you're then able to connect with it.

It says in the Bible that we are made in the image and likeness of God; think about that. There is a lot in that incredible statement. God is infinite and we are as well. There may be some limitations to the human side of us, but there is no limit to our creativity. Look at the scientific breakthroughs with bio-technology and nanotechnology. Whenever we reach a philosophical breakthrough, a scientific breakthrough or a technological breakthrough, it opens up new horizons and we keep discovering just how unlimited our creativity is.

I'm a firm believer that if you can get rid of blame, live a life of being forgiven, and live a life of spirituality, when you're not in judgment of others or yourself, that's when you can start connecting with who you really are and make a significant difference in the lives of others.

I would also say that people should just hang on, not give up, and face their problems head on. A lot of people spend their lives running away from problems, cursing God and saying, "What's all this business about living a life full of abundance? All I seem to be getting is adversity and crisis. Why is it that I have to deal with this crushing problem right now that's ruining my life?" And God looks down and says, "Hey, you wanted abundance and abundance only comes through adversity, problems and crises." Once you get through the problem you're going to be wiser and you're going to be stronger. That's when people will start saying we've got to go get Keith, because he's good at handling problems. Every time we run from problems, the good Lord above is saying, "Hey, where are you going? You wanted abundance yet you keep running away from all the opportunities I send your way."

This last one was a doozy; I worked really hard on that one. When we quit running away from problems, that's when our creativity comes bubbling forth. When you have to work with your mind and your talents to get through the problems, people start to notice your abilities and start to recognize all the good that you've accomplished. That's when people with ideas and resources and their own abundance come to you and say, "Hey, you have a real talent for getting through the tough times, and you always turn problems around. I could sure use someone like you on my team."

"The only voice you should listen to is the voice that comes from within."

America loves a "rags to riches" – an "underdog" – an "against all odds come-back" - a "survivor!" Bill has been a millionaire three times, bankrupt twice, and a billionaire once.

Bill is the ultimate underdog/survivor/achiever overcoming personal circumstances and tragedy to rise to the top of corporate America. Homeless at age fourteen, a member of a street gang and a high-school dropout – he took control of his life by taking the GED exam and putting himself through college and law school.

Bill and his wife Kathy have individually graced the covers of national business magazines, Kathy on the cover of *Forbes*, and Bill on the cover of *Inc*. They were listed individually in the *Forbes* 400 wealthiest people in America. One national magazine ranked them number 25.

In 1998, tragedy struck when Bill's former business partner committed fraud and sent the company into bankruptcy. Although Bill's former business partner told the prosecutors that he had acted without Bill's knowledge, admitted his guilt and was sent to prison – in the post Enron environment, U.S. Attorney General, John Ashcroft, indicted Bill on 57 felony counts relating to Bill's partner's activities. Five years later, after a 2½ month long trial where the Government called 53 witnesses and produced over 1,000 exhibits, Bill rested his case without calling a single witness or producing a single exhibit. The jury unanimously acquitted Bill on all counts.

Ironically, seventeen months after his acquittal and six and a half years after his company was liquidated, the Federal Bankruptcy Trustee issued his report, which publicly acknowledged for the first time, "CFS was not a fraud."

This experience would have embittered most people, but not them. Bill and Kathy now travel the country, sharing their stories of how they created their successes and how they dealt with their challenges. It is their life's goal to do for "failure" what Betty Ford did for alcoholism and Susan Komen did for breast cancer.

Who do you think you are?

That's a great question, and if you had asked me at any other point in my life I probably would have given you a different answer. It's like when we pick our major in college. We decide in our freshman year what we think we want to be when we grow up, and it almost always changes by the time we become a sophomore. All those things I thought I was during the early part of my life have changed. And last year at age fifty-seven, I finally figured out who I really am, and what I'm really supposed to be doing here on earth.

I have led a very unique life, with some cataclysmic failures and some wonderful successes. It's pretty rare to have both of those in the same individual, and because I posses both, I think that is now my job. I'm supposed to talk to as many people as I can about both my successes and my failures, and I am very open about them both. Quite frankly, I think there is more to be learned from our failures than there is from our successes. So, who I think I am is a spokesman for people who have failed in their lives and who want to learn how to overcome their failures.

What event or series of events led to your discovery?

It is so much a process of overcoming adversity in life; it's the adversities that introduce us to ourselves. Likewise, it was an adversity that introduced me to the new me, or the "who I think I am now." I had a business partner who committed a crime. The crime tanked my company, put the company into bankruptcy, caused 3,900 people to lose their jobs, caused my wife and I to lose a three-and-a-half billion-dollar fortune, and ultimately got me indicted on fifty-seven felony counts. During all of this adversity I was able to get myself acquitted of all fifty-seven of those counts, but in the process I learned a lot about myself and about the world. It was that adversity that set me on the path I am on now.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their purpose in life, what would it be?

The best advice I can give anybody, and I give it as often as I can whether I'm talking to a high school group (I do over a hundred high school speeches a year) or if I'm talking to adults (I will speak to over 300,000 adults this year), is that the only voice they should listen to is the voice that comes from within. We are so eager and willing to listen to outsiders.

We listen to others when they tell us that we're good enough or we're not good enough, or not smart enough, or we can't do this, we can't do that. The only person who is really qualified to opine on our strengths, our weaknesses, our credibility, and our capabilities is ourselves.

Sure we should be honest with ourselves; we should admit and accept that which we didn't do well and right, or the mistakes that we have made in our life. But at the same time we should be equally honest about all the things we have done well and right. We should be able to embrace and accept and appreciate all the times we didn't screw up, all the times we didn't get it wrong, all the times we didn't make a mess of something, and put them on the same level – on the same scale – as we put our screw ups. And if we were to do that, if people were to do this one simple little drill, just compare their successes against their failures (and a success is any time that you didn't fail) they would see that they have succeeded a hundred times more than they have ever failed. This would give them the strength to overcome whatever adversity they're facing presently.

I think we should keep it simple. There's no need for me to give you the eighty-four steps to success, because honestly there aren't eighty-four steps. There's just learning how to live with yourself, learning how to be yourself, learning how to be happy being who you are, what you are, the way you are right now. It's so important to enjoy the moment. Yes, we can strive for more and be on a path to have more, but we should never be in "deferred gratification" mode where we have the mentality of "well I'm going to be happy later if I work real hard now." No! Let's be happy now.

It doesn't matter which God you believe in. I'm very spiritual and I have a strong sense of personal belief, but I try really hard not to put my beliefs on anybody else because I don't think that's my job. I don't think that's what I'm here to do. No matter which God you believe in, that God believes in YOU, and wants you to be whatever you can be. He also wants you to be happy being what it is he's already made you.

Who do you think you are? What is the purpose of your life?

I am an expression of who God is. I am part and parcel of what makes up who God is. I'm a reflection of who God is.

When I discovered the purpose for my life, I discovered it in about two minutes at a seminar that literally changed the course of my life forever. Bob Proctor's mentor, Leland Val Vandewall asked us to think for a second, and without giving much more thought than that, simply write the first thing that came to mind when we asked the question, why am I here? What is my purpose? Without thinking, I wrote the following: "My purpose is to demonstrate by my life and my results what a life of faith is, teach that to the world in order to lift their spirits closer to God."

That came out instantly and it was very clear to me that it was what I'm here to do. I want to demonstrate by my life and my results, not my talk, not my wishes, but by my results. I think that results are a demonstration of what's really going on. I want to demonstrate by how I live with life, how I interact with life. I want to demonstrate what a life of faith is. I am not necessarily talking about religious faith, although that is an important part of my life.

The good book says that faith is the evidence of things unseen and the certainty of things hoped for. In my case, it's the certainty of what I hope for. I want to teach people to get their eyes off of their past, and get their eyes off the limitation, and get their eyes on what it is they hope for and have them be certain that it will materialize in physical form in their lives. Faith is seeing things that other people can't see. Faith gives you hope. Faith keeps your eyes on God. Faith keeps you moving.

The next part of that is to teach it to the world. I have been gifted with the ability to teach, and it is important to me to have a global view of teaching the world in order to lift people's spirits closer to God. I think what people need more than money, more than relationships, more than anything, is an intimate connection with the Almighty. If I can participate by lifting people a little bit closer to God, then my purpose in life is being fulfilled.

What event or series of events led to your discovery?

There have been two major events that took the form of mentorships that transformed my life. My first mentor was a man named Norm

Sharkey, who I met on September 6, 1977. That marked a significant change in my life, because for the first time ever, I opened myself up to the spiritual dimension of life. I was going down the wrong road. I was like a freight train on the tracks of destruction. I met Norm Sharkey, and he got me in touch with God for the first time. He showed me that I could have a personal relationship with God and he introduced me to Jesus and other teachers who have been instrumental in changing the direction of my life. He showed me how to give love and how to receive love. It happened in such a profound way that it completely altered the course of my life.

Then in 1988, I met Bob Proctor. Bob Proctor has become my financial mentor; at least that's what I call him. He's really my internal mentor. He showed me that I could earn in a month what I used to earn in a year. I started making over \$1 million a year. In order for that kind of result, something major has to happen inside of you, and that's what Bob's main effect on me was. He showed me how to really think about what was going on in my life and he changed my understanding of who I am and how I tick. We're never taught about how people think. We're never taught about why people do certain things and don't do certain things. And why people don't do the things that they want to. He showed me how to apply that.

I started off by applying this to the earning of money, and I quickly found out that it's just a symptom, a game, or a measuring stick, to understanding more about me and what causes most people in the world to operate on autopilot without thinking. Bob has had a major effect on my life for the past 21 years. And I'm just so grateful that he's been part of my life.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their purpose in life, what would it be?

I was asked that question recently on an Australian radio show. They said in 30 words or less, tell us how a person could achieve what they want to achieve in their life. I told them it wouldn't take me 30 words it would only take me eight words. Those eight words are: *find a mentor*, and do what they say. It's that simple. Find somebody who has the results that you want. Don't ask broke people how to get rich. Don't ask sick people how to get healthy. Don't ask divorced people how to have strong relationships. Find somebody who has the results that you want and do what they say, and the emphasis is on the word do.

Now some of us are seminar junkies and go to seminar after seminar after seminar after seminar, and I'm here to tell you that some of you should stop going to seminars. You should start doing the seminar. What I mean by that is people need to start putting into practice what they already know. Most of us know what to do to have more love. Most of us know what to do to have the money. Most of us know what to do to have better physical bodies. The question is why don't people do it?

Again, find a mentor and do what they say. It's not a matter of gathering more information. There are some people who have gone to so many seminars that they can finish the sentence of the speaker on stage because they know the material that well. My mentor told me that you know nothing until you make a permanent change in your behavior. It's behavior, not gathering more information, it's doing what you're mentor says. So you've got to study and learn and get close to them. You've got to invest; be near them and let them influence you. That's what I've found is the easiest and fastest way to grow in any area of your life. Find a person who lives the life you want and do what they say. Follow their advice.

I was in Vancouver yesterday with my first mentor, Norman Sharkey, who really taught me about love and about God. And just watching him interact with people caused me to be more loving. Proximity is good. Read their books, do what they say, go to their events, learn from them - not to simply gather information, but to implement what they say into your life.

Who do think you are?

I am a child of God who has been gifted with certain intellectual faculties that allow me to co-create my life and to live my purpose. My purpose is very specifically defined. My purpose is to be the very best in the world at communicating the teachings and ideas of Bob Proctor and Thomas Troward, to guide other people to find their purpose, and to give them a process by which they can show others to do the same.

What event or series of events led to your discovery?

I was twenty-two years old and had gotten the entrepreneurial bug to start a business and to express the spiritual side of myself that had built up inside. I had \$200 and a dream. I went door-to-door and cleaned offices in the evening time. I used a vacuum cleaner, a bottle of Pledge and a bottle of Windex. I built that business to a certain degree in about three years. I got stuck, as so many of us do, and I could not break out of where I was financially. In hindsight, I realize that I wasn't just stuck financially, I was stuck spiritually, I was stuck in my relationships, I was stuck in every area of my life. I was stuck in my personal development and my health.

I did something that I had never done before in school; I started to read books. I had flunked out of high school. I had limiting beliefs for the first half of my life. I had this terrible speech impediment...I stuttered. Of course, whenever a young person has some kind of weakness the other kids tend to prey on that. I was told that I was stupid and was teased a lot. If you hear these comments over and over again, sooner or later it forms your perception of who you are. It got to a point where I had so much desire that I began to challenge my own core beliefs and values. I began the tough work of self evaluation, of asking, Why do I believe this? Is this true about me? Does it have to be?

I read everything from Anthony Robbins to Zig Zigler, but I just couldn't get any of it to stick. It seemed like most of the information in those self help books just wanted to motivate me, and I was already motivated. I was a twenty-four-year-old man, who was cleaning toilets and emptying trashcans at night. I did not need a kick in the rear end to move me faster in same direction. I needed a change of course. I needed to change who I was and how I operated. I truly believed that this could happen.

Through divine intervention, somebody gave me a videotape of seminar called *You Were Born Rich* by Bob Proctor. After watching it for about thirty minutes, I knew that Bob had the answers for me. He made me aware of the universal laws that govern the way I thought and behaved. He showed me that I had intellectual faculties that I was using, but wasn't using properly. I would always imagine the worst-case scenarios instead of using my imagination to look at all the possibilities. I realized that I had the ability to choose my perception and that would ultimately create my reality.

That was the first shift, when I realized I could co-create my life by tapping into the spiritual side of myself, becoming aware of my oneness with my creator, and working with the talents I had been given. I could define who I was and define my purpose and I could live that out loud and boldly. For the first time in my life, what other people thought of me didn't matter anymore. Another person's opinion of me was none of my business. My opinion of me is what mattered most. That was the beginning of my self-discovery. I had gotten to the point where I was sick and tired and frustrated enough to do the necessary work involved shifting my paradigm, and that's what I did.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their purpose in life, what would it be?

My advice would be to accept the notion that they already have the answer, and that they always have had the answer. We are taught biblically to seek first the kingdom within us. The answer is there. Now, it gets clouded by all types of beliefs that we may not have chosen as young people. I believe that the average age for somebody to fully develop conscious awareness, where they had the ability to accept or reject ideas about themselves, is around seven to nine years of age. By then we have been filled with so many limiting beliefs from our parents, our grandparents, our teachers or our coaches. They're well-meaning, just ignorant. When I say the word ignorant, most people identify that as being rude. I mean ignorant as a lack of awareness. They just lack the awareness of how human beings operate in the laws that govern our thoughts and behavior.

I recommend that people unplug their TV sets and really dedicate some time to self-study and recognize that wherever they are, whatever the results are in their lives, whatever circumstances have shown up, their best thinking has gotten them there. They didn't just wake up one day and say to themselves, I think I'll make all the wrong decisions in my life today. The results that they have in their lives are an expression of their level of awareness. If they want to change the results of their lives, they must first change the cause, which is what's going on inside. The only way to shift that is to raise their level of awareness through self-contemplation. Spirit contemplates and spirit expresses itself through contemplation, and we are individualized spirit.

I would recommend that people study some of the great teachers that we have now and some of the great teachers from the past, and apply the principles they teach. They should never wait for the conditions and circumstances to be "right" in their lives to take the steps necessary to define their purpose and live their purpose. The conditions and circumstances of their lives will never be right. They have to set their own course and move in the direction of their dreams.

One of the lessons I've learned is that the quality of the answers

that we get in life is truly determined by the quality of the questions we ask in life. Often times we ask the wrong questions. When gifted with an idea that is in harmony with our purpose, most people filter that idea through their current belief system and they evaluate whether it is good or bad or right or wrong or ask should I or shouldn't I? Asking those self-limiting questions does them no good. It doesn't serve them at all. I would encourage someone, when gifted with an idea, to ask this question: If I act on this idea will it move me in the direction of my dream? If so, regardless of knowing how to achieve it and regardless of the conditions or circumstances, move in that direction. Go as far as you can go, and then the next step will be shown. It always works, it works for everybody, and it works all the time.

What event or series of events led you to your discovery?

I stopped thinking and I started doing. And believe me, there's a huge difference between thinking and doing. I recognized that most people we remember *for something*, not just their names, but *for something*. They're usually remembered for a discovery or credited for that discovery. I consider a discovery as simply coming up with a plan of attack and implementing it. I do this through simple concepts like: What do you do with an idea? You've got to take the idea and build a core group of people around the idea, then, you've got to develop and execute a plan. So, that's a discovery, and that's what people are remembered for, and at that point they have the responsibility to put that information out there for the people who want it.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their purpose in life, what would it be?

Who do you think you are?

What event or series of events lead to your discovery?

Thirteen years ago I found myself flat broke. I come from a farming background, and we invented a piece of machinery for handling bales of hay that was cutting edge at the time. I started a manufacturing business with my brother to manufacture this great product. Things were going extremely well until the day that greed set in.

This left me in debt of over fifty thousand dollars and without any share in the business and no assets. With no education, no skills and no money I had no other choice but to go on social security. This fortnightly check barely covered the food and rent, and it surely did not allow for paying back any of the debt I was left with. The bill collectors came knocking and I finally ended up working out plans for payment with them that included a very small monthly pay-off rate. I convinced them that if they got just a little bit of money from me for many years to come, it would still be better than nothing which is what they would get if they said no to my offer.

I started to look at ways to make some money and learned about this new (at the time) form of marketing called network marketing. Through that I was introduced to personal development and over the next few years I attended seminars and read books from authors and speakers like Tom Hopkins, Jim Rohn, Zig Ziglar, and Tony Robbins. I attended Tony Robbins' UPW course 7 times. I learned everything he did, watched his presenting techniques, listened to the way he phrased things and continued to read and educate myself.

A friend loaned me some Bob Proctor cassette tapes of his seminar *You Were Born Rich*. As I listened, Bob explained to me how the mind works and why we get the results we have in our life. The reason I was drawn to his work was because Bob didn't just tell me what to do, he also showed me how the mind works and told me the *why* to do it. Within thirty days of listening to Bob and doing the things he said, things started to change. I went from broke to ten thousand dollars a month within 3 months, then over a million a year within three years.

I became a very successful trader once I realized that the stock market is just a vibration, like everything else. Who do you think you are?

I think many people go through life not really knowing where they want to be. As I was going through the various stages of my life, from selling vacuum cleaners to running a long-distance company to running an Internet business, my purpose wasn't clear. I knew I needed to earn an income, but what I needed to understand was what exactly did I need to do, what was my purpose? That was certainly a quest for me.

What I discovered was as I did certain things, all of a sudden everything else came into alignment. When you are doing the right thing, the alignment happens automatically for you. If you're not in sync with everything around you it doesn't happen.

As we go through this process of discovering what we want to do, we need to be aware of what is around us. Meaning, when we take a certain action what is the end result? If we take the right action, all of the rest seems to fall right into place for us. For example, for a long time, even as I built a successful Internet marketing business, I knew that I wanted to talk more about the aspects of a person becoming successful. It's not just our technical abilities that we utilize on a day-to-day basis. What I wanted to talk about was the mindset of success and how success actually happens.

I took a big step. I made the decision to speak on the topic of success. I also made the decision to speak on bigger stages as well. In the course of a few days, several people called me to speak, and they had events with three to five thousand people lined up to attend. This all happened four of five days after I made up my mind. Here's the really interesting part. They didn't ask me to speak about Internet marketing. They wanted me to teach people how to be successful. They wanted me to talk about success. All of a sudden, all of the pieces of the puzzle came into play.

My purpose is to teach people how to become successful by teaching them the techniques to get their minds straight, rather than to depend upon things like technical abilities. At this current time in my life, that is definitely my purpose. Many people have said this but I believe it bears repeating: When the student is ready the master will appear. Hopefully, I can be that person teaching those people and appear at the right time in their life, and they can learn from what I've done and from the mistakes I have made.

What event or series of events led to your discovery?

I don't think it was a specific event. It was a quest. I believe everybody has what they call a "vision quest." Everyone has one, but they don't always realize that they do.

I was always in search of what everyone else was in search of, meaning, I wanted the life of success. What was that? How did I define it? Actually, I am still in quest of that. That may seem strange coming from me. I have many things that people would certainly want to have: a

beautiful home, a thriving business, as much money as I could possibly need, but does that match up with my vision?

Here's what people should understand, it's not a series of events. It's really what you start, what you intend your life to be. People intend their lives to be a certain way when they are young. From the time I was ten or twelve years old I would tell my mother every single day that I was going to become a millionaire by the time I was twenty-five. For some reason that number always stuck in my mind. You can ask my mother and she will tell you the exact same thing. I said this over and over again anytime she asked me, "What do you want to do?" I would tell her, "I'm going to be a millionaire by the time I'm twenty-five." The funny part is I did not become a millionaire by the time I was twenty-five, I was actually twenty-six. Some people might call this a failure, but the fact is that I earned my first million dollars when I was twenty-six years of age. It took me ten months to do it.

So what series of events caused this? Some might say it was the constant reiteration of that goal, even though I didn't even know what I was doing at that time. Some people might say I was in the right place at the right time. But let me tell you this, prior to me starting a business that made me \$1 million, I sold vacuum cleaners door-to-door. In selling vacuum cleaners door-to-door, I certainly learned how to deal with people, but I didn't learn anything about how to run a business.

From the time I was very young, I realized that there was a life that was different from the one I was living. Not that my parents didn't provide for us, they did everything they could for me when I was young. But the fact is, I realized that there was a world out there that I didn't know. I saw it on television. I saw it on shows like *Miami Vice*. I saw the houses on *Lifestyles of The Rich and Famous*. The question became how could I access that world? How do I go from where I am today to that place? That's what started me on my quest to find out what that other world was.

Along my way, I met certain other people, and each one of those people taught me something. There were probably nine or ten key people who made a difference in my life.

The first one was a guy named Lenny Epstein. Lenny taught me how to sell vacuum cleaners. He sold me on the idea of selling vacuum cleaners, even though I was 19 years old and had no intention of selling vacuum cleaners. He convinced me to sell vacuum cleaners in about two minutes. The reason this is important is that he showed me how to be a great salesperson. He taught me that you don't push the product on some-

one; you make them want it so bad that it's their own idea to have it.

And another person was someone I met along the way as I was traveling. (I don't even remember his name actually.) I had a job for a very short time selling timeshares down in Florida. I only did it for two weeks because I felt kind of guilty selling time-shares, quite honestly. This person showed me the next step. I happened to meet one of the people who started the very first time-share in Spain. He was living in Orlando, Florida at a very high-end place called Windermere. Windermere is a beautiful place to live with really big homes. Shaquille O'Neal has a house there and Michael Jackson has a house there. He brought me to his home, which is the biggest house I had never seen and he also showed me his car, which was a Jaguar. I was impressed. Not with the fact that he had a Jaguar, but that he had it shipped all the way from Germany to Orlando in order to drive it. He had given me a taste of what the extra life was. He was an instrumental person because he opened my eyes to see that people actually do live like this.

Another person who probably changed my life the most was a teacher I had during my brief year in college. During one of his classes he talked about one of the greatest books ever written about business and how it had created more millionaires than any other book. It's a book called *Think and Grow Rich*. He explained the story of Napoleon Hill and Drew Carnegie and said that if you ever want to be successful in life you need to buy this book. I took all the change I had and went to the nearest phone booth and started calling all the bookstores in the area in order to find the book.

I grew up in a very small town in upstate New York, and I was really shy at this time. I didn't want to use public transit because I would have to see a bunch of strangers on that bus. I was not willing to use the bus to get to this bookstore. The problem was the bookstore was about 6 miles away. So I ended up walking across town, 6 miles, to this little bookstore, bought the book *Think And Grow Rich*, and walked back another 6 miles.

I read the book on my way back as I walked. I skipped classes the next day to continue reading and I finished the book. Here is where I would like to say that I read it and my life changed and I've never been the same since, but the truth is, I didn't get it. I thought to myself, "Why would someone read this book and become a millionaire- because of what they read in it?" I knew that there must be something in it, but I couldn't place my finger on it. It took me years before I realized the impact, before my mind was ready to accept what I had learned. I hadn't

lived the concepts enough to understand them. Eventually, I did get it, and I still read that book to this day. I actually republished it with my own forward.

If I were to name one key event, I would say that it happened on Easter Sunday in 1995. That's the day that my son's mother took my son and left me as I was trying to start my long distance phone company. I sat there alone, in an empty room, saying to myself, "I have to make this work." I had been working four or five months to launch the company, and my wife left me saying "You'll never amount to anything, and you are just playing at this business like it's a game." Her words stuck in my head and will probably continue to stay in my head the rest of my life.

That was the single defining moment. I had my back against the wall. There was no place else to go. I couldn't go any lower. I had no money. The cupboards were absolutely bare, and that's not just a figure of speech. It was absolutely true. There was no food in the whole house. And there I was with this idea of starting a long-distance phone company with nothing more than a background in selling vacuum cleaners.

Within the next two weeks, we launched the company, and in our first seven days we generated over \$100,000, and I've never looked back.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their purpose in life, what would it be?

You can find all the reasons why you shouldn't do something, but what you want to do is find all the reasons that you should. We just need one good reason. For many people it may be their family. For many people it might be in spite of someone else.

My advice to someone who's getting started is to first believe in yourself. That is key. Belief has a success cycle to it. First you have a belief that causes you to take action, or in some cases, causes you not to take action. Based upon that action, we get to a series of results, and based upon the results we either build a bigger or smaller belief. Then the success cycle starts all over again.

In order to grow your success cycle into an ever-growing one, you need to start with something small. By starting with something small, all of a sudden, it grows, and it gets bigger and bigger. Start by achieving small levels of success and building it up from there. What people hear when they go to a seminar, read in a book, or watch in a movie is the end result of what has taken people many years to achieve. They don't see the very beginnings. So, they think that they can just start there, just

jump to the end result.

The fact is, that doesn't really happen. There isn't necessarily a quantum leap to get there. There is a faster method, which is to focus on the next logical step, meaning from where you are to the next place. What is your next logical step along the way? There may be ten pieces to the puzzle here, but you need to go to the next step, to the next step, then to the next step. Those are the sequential steps we need in order to make the whole system work for us.

So the question I have for the readers of this book is, based on where you are, what is the next logical step for you to take? What is the one thing that you can do today to move yourself toward your end goal? If we take that premise and we apply it every single day, all of a sudden we achieve those little tiny steps, which eventually add up to a big step when we look at it overall.

Again, what is the next logical step for you, and what is it that you can do for yourself today? Today is the key! Today! If we worry about the future, we are worrying about something that hasn't even happened yet. We need to focus on the present, because the present is what is going to make it work for us. It's all about what we do today. How we can take destiny and put it in our own hands, and allow ourselves to achieve a level of success? Yes, there is a sequence and order of things, and it all starts with your very next step. Just take your next step.

What event or series of events led to your discovery?

The musical side of that self-awareness has been with me since I was very young. I was aware of my innate musical ability when I was seven

or eight, playing songs by ear. In high school I was learning an instrument in a week or two and then when I was in college I started writing songs. I've always recognized it. I remember reading a little snippet of an interview a slightly bitter at the time John Lennon, in which he said that he always knew he was a musical genius and he couldn't believe that no one else saw it in him. It was just something he knew about himself his whole childhood. I always knew I had a musical gift, and it came out in small ways over the years, playing piano and writing songs, playing trombone in high school and college and that sort of thing.

Even though I knew I had this musical ability, I wasn't raised to be an artist. I was raised to be a lawyer, or a doctor, or something with intellectual credentials. Therefore I was induced to do my homework, study hard, get good grades and go to college. I majored in economics in college, and having the life of an artist never occurred to me until after college. I was twenty-one. I was listening to Sarah McLachlan on a Walkman, and all of a sudden it occurred to me that this is a woman who sits at a piano, plays a song, records it, sings it, sells it, and that is her job. But, even then, it didn't really permeate my awareness of what I was to be until years later.

In 1997, when I was twenty-seven years old, I had the realization that computer programming (which is what I was doing at the time) was really not my life. I've always had the natural inclination to give joy, to make someone smile. I used to visit my grandmother in the hospital and sing to her. When I'd sing for her in the hospital I would always find anyone else on the floor who was open to hearing music and visit them as well...I've always done that. I realized that this was mine to do! The exact form of it wasn't clear, but in 1998 I moved to Los Angeles and started saying "yes" to every musical invitation I could find. Rather than doing the computer programming I'd been doing, I just dove all the way into my music and allowed it to take shape however it was going to take shape. What ended up happening was that this music with a message, this inspirational music for humanity, filled with songs of healing, compassion and connection, music that I innately write, found an audience in a magnetic, beautiful, graceful, organic way.

Now, eight years later, after bringing these songs to whoever will have me, singing them for hundreds of thousands of people, being very persistent using the other side of my brain, and doing all of the business work necessary, I find that my exact purpose in life is being fulfilled. I am now in a position to sing songs for all of humanity in every language they can be translated into, and at every event around the world that will

have me. All these things conspire to create the exact career of musical service to humanity that I had imagined, but never would have known how to build if I hadn't done it one day at a time. I took that huge leap in 1997, moved to Los Angeles and just started! Starting is very important. Right where I was I just started, and I certainly could not have planned most of what's come.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their purpose in life, what would it be?

Well, there's the simple answer I always shared with kids, which is do for a job what makes you giggle. Do the thing that is so fun that you can't even imagine people would pay you for it. Because somewhere, somebody is making a good living doing that thing.

I used to think that was the whole answer, but it's really not. For a lot of people, that thing that they "came to do" really isn't all that clear and could in fact be completely hidden. People who aren't clear gravitate towards me, because I am so clear about who I am and what I do now. They come up and share with me that they are touched by that clarity and inspired by it. I think the advice I would give to a person who just doesn't know how to answer the questions, "What am I here to do?" and "Who am I?" is that we all fear making a mistake that we can't take back. I think that fear keeps people from quitting the job, leaving the relationship, moving to the city, recording an album, writing the book. We view these things as one-way tickets, as no-going-back choices. The fact is that there is no one way (and this is a song from my new album), there is no foolproof plan, there is no fateful final chance. And I really do believe that.

Face the fear of not knowing, face all of those uncertainties, and particularly face the fear that you're going to make a fatal mistake, that this is your one big shot. If you don't know what it is you dream of doing, try something! If you can't decide whether to be a hardware manager or a trumpet player, rent a trumpet for a month and see if you gravitate towards playing it. See if you have a knack for it, or go work in a hardware store, and if you don't like it after six days, quit. It sounds a little freewheeling and perhaps a little idealistic if you have significant financial responsibilities or "ties that bind you." But, it is possible to experiment and find out, and I'm a big believer in the path of least resistance.

If you step forward and try it – whether it's a mystery or something you would love, love, love to do-if you just step forward and try it, you

will find the path of least resistance, it will pull you onto your perfect path. That's exactly what's happened to me. If you encounter tons of resistance, pay attention to that resistance – which I would call a "no" – it's as good as a "yes" because it tells you as much as a fluid, graceful entrance into something would. Resistance is just as informative and valuable. So my advice would be to just try something. Even on a hunch. In fact, the crazier the better!

For somebody who has an inkling of what they came here to do and just hasn't stepped into it, I would say just start where you are. Face the feeling of inadequacy, face the mystery, face the feeling of being unqualified, just feel all those things. Face all those fears: I don't have any business doing it, I don't know how to make it happen, I don't have the relationships, I don't have the money, I don't have the capital, I don't have the friends, I don't have the experience, I don't have the office, I don't have the music equipment, I don't have the word processor, I don't know any publishers in New York, I don't know any venture capitalists, I've never manufactured a product before, I don't know how to trademark my invention.

Take the first tiny step forward. Make a single phone call, take out a single book from the library, just take a step forward. Anyone from Donald Trump on down to the ten year old who opened up the lemonade stand will tell you that they had no idea how it was going to turn out. They just did the first thing they could think of towards that goal.

Of course, experience serves you. In other words, you do gain experience over the years, but the only way to get that experience is by trying it. The first time you open up a lemonade stand you may buy too many lemons or not get enough ice. But the second time, your estimate will be closer. The third time you won't run out of quarters to change people's dollars. By the eleventh time you'll be teaching classes on how to run the lemonade stand. Donald Trump did the same thing, I am sure. Even if you began with a billion dollars, you'd still need to learn how to manage that kind of money, how to build a beautiful building. You'd still need to learn how to manage assets. No matter who you are, you'd still need to learn all of those things, and all those things come with time and experience. We all begin with a blank slate or a blank sheet of paper.

Craig Shoemaker

"I used to have a lot of fear until I learned what fear really is — False Evidence Appearing Real."

Craig Shoemaker was named Comedian of the Year by the American Comedy Awards, won two NATAS Emmy Awards, was named Best Supporting Actor at the 2007 Elevate Film Festival, performed at every major comedy venue in the country and was seen by over two million people last year. His "Lovemaster" routine was voted Most Popular Comedy on XM Radio's Big Schtick Award and was voted one of the top 20 stand-up specials on Comedy Central. Who do you think you are?

I am a guy that really, truly, fundamentally, profoundly loves to make people laugh! I like to be around laughter, whatever that looks like. If I can be the inspiration for the laugh, that's all the better. I really cherish being in the company of others, whether I am having them over for dinner or just hanging out. I have always enjoyed this. Now, the performing

aspect of my life has moved to a different level. I have gone from my little fort, hanging out with my friends, to being in front of 70,000 people at the University of Florida. To sum it all up, I am a person who enjoys life and likes to spread that joy. I am like Johnny Laughterseed.

What event or series of events led you to your discovery?

Internally throughout my whole life I knew what my purpose was. But I ignored it, shunned it, and turned my head to it. I wasn't encouraged to bring that part of me out, the spark that was inside of me. I was actually discouraged from original thought and feeling, and that really bothered me for a long time. But I know the moment it all changed; it was the moment my first child was born. That's when a new connection took place. That's when I started to look deeper inside of myself and found those truths that were always lying within, affirmed and confirmed them, and went from there. It was a monumental moment in my life, and it happened the second I locked eyes with him. I knew right then that it had all changed.

The journey became more intentional, because I realized that everything I do has an affect on him, Justin, and my other child, Jared. Every move or decision I make, everything I am about, I have to answer to someone directly, and I have to be an example. This has helped me bring focus to my life, because my road is narrower now. I can't have so many distractions or so many people in my life because I need to go coach little league, I've got to go to mommy and me classes for the little one! My time is scheduled now, and it's purposeful and meaningful. Whether it's coaching little league or setting up a production meeting for a movie that's coming out, everything has its place in time. It's moment to moment.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their purpose in life, what would it be?

I'd say the most important thing I ever did was to decide not to be a victim anymore. I participate in my own life, and I understand that only I can dictate what happens. I will constantly find my part in an equation. What is my role in this relationship? I always have a part in my relationships, whether it's a business relationship, a love relationship or whatever it is. If I can define my part in the relationship, then it makes the fear go away. I used to have a lot of fear until I learned what fear

really is - False Evidence Appearing Real. Now I'll find evidence that I've gathered that keeps me from going any further, because that's what fear does, then I'll wipe that fear away and move forward.

There are so many detractors, doubters, and cynical people out there who want you to join their pity party, and my suggestion would be to stop and move away from them. I have had to do that in my life. And, I'm not being harsh by doing that. I will always be there for them; I am a loyal friend...I still have the same friends from kindergarten. There are ten of us, and we go away every year together even though I live three thousand miles away. It's still important for me to have those friendships. If someone is toxic and they're trying to bring me down, I will extend my hand, help them, and share of my experiences of how I have overcome a fear. But if they're not willing to face their fears or their part in something, I can't just pull them along with me, because they'll drag me down.

I think it's really important to live like that, and that's what I try to teach my children. I hope that I am a good example to them; when I see an obstacle, I don't run from it. I make it dissipate. The bigger the obstacle, the higher the hurdle, and the better I feel having overcome it. For instance, when I went skydiving, I dealt with the greatest amount of fear I have ever had. Yet I experienced a huge amount of joy in going through the process. When I landed safely (barely, by the way, because my radio didn't work and I landed in electrical barbwire...talk about landing shock), the feeling of elation and accomplishment that took place was incredible. It was a metaphor for my life. There are so many fears and people and obstacles that get in your way. You know, things we are powerless over like the prime rate or an ex-wife who is a debtor. What am I going to do about it? When I get over those fears and those types of things in my life, it's incredible.

Ultimately, I would say that it's important to face your fear head on, and welcome it, because it's your friend. The avoidance of fear is far worse then the actual fear itself. It's much more painful.

Michael Colyar

"Who are you? Ask you who you are. Ask yourself.

And if you know who you are, then everything just gets to be easier."

Dubbed "The King of Venice Beach," Colyar made his mark in the hearts and minds of his audiences on the Boardwalk of Venice Beach California with his thought-provoking humor. Every Saturday and Sunday for over nine years he would perform five one-hour shows a day to audiences of all ages, races, and backgrounds.

Who do you think you are?

I think that I am a healer, a healer and a humorist, and in fact it's through humor that I do my healing. I also think I am a discoverer and an adventurer of this life, you know, I really dig being here. Every day is a great adventure for me, and although what I do now is comedy and act, it wouldn't matter. Whatever I was doing, I would go at it with the same energy. I get up in the morning and I can't wait to get the day started. I

don't need an alarm clock. What I try to do everyday is just live my dream.

You know what's really funny, I had learned how to do comedy in the streets of Chicago, telling jokes and passing my hat, and I became like the king of street performance in one summer in Chicago. But then winter came, and nobody wanted to hear jokes in December on State Street. I packed everything that would fit in my 1967 Buick LeSabre, sold everything else, and drove to California so I could stand in the street and do comedy for living. I really came to become a millionaire, but when I got to Venice Beach I discovered my brother, and I discovered that the world ain't about me, and that I can't find me until I find you. Because I ain't at my place; I'm where you are. Once I embrace you I embrace myself, and only then am I free to be who I am.

Instead of trying to be a millionaire, I now attempt to be a billionaire of being. Instead of trying to make my living, I live my making, and my making shall make my living. That's how I try to walk through this thing called life. That's why I get up in the morning. I'm living life to the fullest each day. It ain't necessarily whether I'm doing comedy, or acting, or being a grandparent, or flying to Chicago to feed my mama collard greens every three weeks. She's seventy-seven years young and just got past breast cancer, and now she's fighting liver cancer, but when I feed her, she's up and about and her energy is good again. I'm just living the life.

I think my purpose is to discover who I am. I think that is the only job, the only curriculum, in this entire course of life. To discover who I am and my connection to life and to that pulse and the energy. I discover that by being honest and true to myself every day. And I try to keep revealing a little bit more of myself every day, to myself.

What event or series of events led to your discovery?

I think it's more like a series of events, because it didn't just come to me; it's been coming to me, continually, over the years. When I got to Venice Beach, I saw a life force that I had never seen before, where everybody was interacting with everybody and so many people were about life and Spirit. They weren't necessarily putting a name on Spirit, but they were about the goodness of the land and healing each other and raising folks up. I saw that all mixed in, in the area where people were absolutely crazy, and drug addicts, and wild gangsters, and all of that was blended together in this area known as Venice Beach.

When I got there it was like I discovered a new world. It allowed my mind to be open for new things. I think the first thing I did was run into a guy who later became one of my spiritual gurus, Ostarius. This brother started talking to me and automatically I started getting connection to Spirit and to those people who lived out on that beach and to the homeless people, to people who were dealing with drugs, who still came to my show just to cool out and be regular folk. Life meant something to

me. I will always tell everybody I didn't even start knowing what life was until I was twenty-nine years old. That's what I think was the beginning of the series of things which culminated with *The Secret*.

I hit about eight things, and each one sent me flying. Like if you were driving then all of a sudden you hit the turbo button. Eight things in my life have done that to me, and *The Secret* is the eighth in that series. I just keep on growing, and more and more things happen. I think it's about the discovery of self and that's what made me come to it. I wanted to know more about who I am.

Another thing in the series of events was talking with Anthony Robbins. He had this infomercial back then, and I was the first black person on his infomercial. When I did his infomercial, I did it because I really believed in that guy! Casey Kasem invited me to see an animal rights seminar. I hadn't even heard of anything like that. Anthony Robbins was running it. He talked about how bad it is to kill animals just so you can have their skin or you can eat them. He showed what happens to the animals and at the same time he showed the educational value of it, how to be in love with the animal and in love with the world and the planet. It blew my mind that he cared that much. I said to myself, I want to meet this white dude. So, I went to meet him. I had just won Star Search and given half of the money to the homeless and I told him that. He looked at me and said, "Well I want you to be my friend." So he sent me those tapes. In thirty days those tapes had me so focused and so clear on where I wanted to go and how to go about it. It was truly one of those moments that put me in turbo. It just sent me out there! I connected that with the connection to the Spirit I was already getting from talking to Ostarius out on Venice Beach and every few years something great like that has happened.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their purpose in life, what would it be?

Try as hard as you can not to lie to yourself. If we can just get to the point where we can be 100% honest with ourselves, then everything in our lives becomes more workable, more manageable, more real and more loving. A lot of us are so terrified that somebody's going to get what's ours, or we won't get the radial tires, or that's not going to be our DVD that we deal with that fear thing instead of that love thing, and we miss the whole point. It's not about the destination. We don't know whether we're ever going to get where were trying to get to. It's about the journey.

Have a blast; you might not make it till tomorrow. You might say, I ain't getting in no plane because they crash too much, but you could be driving down the street and a plane could crash into your car and kill you. You don't want to rationalize anything more than God is Love and you're part of that. You get to be this continuing explosion of energy and positivity if you want to be. You can get there by not lying to yourself.

Who are you? Ask you who you are. Ask yourself. And if you know who you are, then everything just gets to be easier. The way you treat other people gets easier. Every thing gets easier when you are truthful with yourself. I don't maintain that any of this is right. I'm just saying that this is what I've been doing. This is what's been working for me.

Another thing I would recommend is *Agape*. Way before I saw *The Secret*, I saw Michael Beckwith. He was one of those eight things that happened to me. People were talking to me about *Agape* on Venice Beach fifteen years ago. I'm talking about teenagers, 12-year-olds, 10-year-olds would come up to me after my show in Venice Beach and say, "You would love my church. It's called *Agape*. Do you know what that means?" I'd say "no." And they'd say, "It means all encompassing love."

I blew that off, I never paid any attention to it, but I was on a search for churches. Every time I would see some place on Sunday, where there were black people standing outside in suits talking to each other, I'd pull over and go inside and see what they were talking about. I was in *Agape* for eight minutes, and I knew that I was at home. There was no two ways about it. This was before Michael even started speaking. He created such an atmosphere of love and energy in that place. You can just walk in, and it's like the Bodhi Tree (The Bodhi Tree was another one of those eight things for me). When you walk in the Bodhi Tree you feel the love of the spirit that's in that room. There ain't nobody there to hurt nobody; everybody's there to embrace everybody. When you walk into *Agape*, you feel that warm energy and that love right way, before anybody even opens their mouth. Then when Michael goes up and starts talking, forget about it.

Debra Wilson Skelton

"It depends on one's belief system, but I personally think the universe has a plan for each and every one of us."

Debra Wilson Skelton is best known for her eight seasons on Fox's late night sketch comedy series *MADtv.* Her other television credits include *CSI:* Crime Scene Investigation, Without a Trace, E! and VH1 specials, as well as various other guest star appearances. Her film work includes *B.A.P.S, Skin Deep, Nine Lives, Scary Movie 4, Super Sweet 16, Gridlock'd, American History X and Avatar.*

Skelton is most proud of her community service work with elementary schools, at-risk-youth programs, and a number of animal organizations including Linda Blair's World Heart Foundation, New Leash On Life Animal Rescue and Farm Sanctuary. Debra is married to writer/director Cliff Skelton and lives in Los Angeles.

Who do you think you are?

My purpose is the same as everyone else's; it's just that I have asked to discover what that is. I have taken the journey to discover it and have come to the understanding that everything around me is a byproduct of what I am supposed to do in the universe. I think other people allow *it* to define them. I think we are here for our healing and for other people's healings. We're here to uplift, support, validate, appreciate, recognize and continue to move forward to make this planet register on a higher vibration. Everything we're given is a circumstance to do that.

Some people get defined by their careers. They're defined by how much money they make, the status of their relationships, the car they drive, the clothes they wear or their jewelry. They're defined by a lot of status symbols. But it is the investment in self that doesn't go away. All the other things that we are defined by go away. You're clothes, your money, your shoes, and your house; when you pass from this planet, what will people say about you, other than the fact that they liked what you did as an actor? What will they say of you as a human being? When you strip the acting away, what you have left is the human.

My purpose is to ensure that when I pass from this planet people have wonderful things to say, and that, like Obi-Wan Kenobi said, "If you strike me down I shall become more powerful than you could possibly imagine." So, it's not in my acting, it's in my living and doing that creates the person I am on this planet. I think that I am an amazing human being that the universe created to do wondrous work for other human beings. That's what really defines me. If someone says, "Oh my god she's great because she took the time, she prayed with me, she spent time with me, I got to know her," I have created a personal relationship with that person. That's the thing that lasts when the celluloid disappears.

What event or series of events led to your discovery?

There have been so many it's not funny. I think that everybody has a downfall at one point in their life in order to find the make and measure of who they are as a human being, and I have had many downfalls. Significant ones. Dramatic ones that were basically do or die, at least in my mind. They forced me to ask the question, "Who am I?" They forced me to ask the question, "Is there a God?" They forced me to cry out in need of something beyond myself. They made me say, "If there is a God, prove to me that I am worthy to be here. Help me understand the journey of my purpose on this planet."

When Spirit speaks it feels so good. Having a giving nature, and knowing how to do that is a part of every being's journey on this planet. When you give, it feels good. So, part of it is, I am grateful that I am recognized as someone who is worthy to give, and at the same time my ego enjoys the "feel good" of it.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their purpose in life, what would it be?

It depends on one's belief system, but I personally think the universe has a plan for each and every one of us. Each and every one of us is significant. I volunteer at a lot of "at risk" teen organizations in conjunction with the Department of Juvenile Justice and the California Youth Authority, and this is something I always tell them. Say you were a Rolex watch, and that Rolex watch was made of platinum, diamonds, the most fantastic metals, the most fantastic artistry and workings in the world. What if the smallest mechanism broke down, and you were that small mechanism. What happens to the entire watch? It breaks down. It doesn't serve its

purpose, which is to tell time. It may still be a nice looking piece of jewelry, but it was created to be a watch. It has now lost its purpose. Now did that small mechanism need to be any larger to be part of that entire breakdown? No. So, it doesn't matter how large you are or how small you are, you are essential to that watch, which means you are essential to the universe.

The universe is essentially that watch, that timepiece. We are mandated by time on this planet, and so I liken human beings to that watch. Even the smallest mechanism is important to the watch. Without you here fulfilling your purpose on this planet, there is a part of the universe that breaks down. There is someone in the future that needs you and you won't be there for them. It's vital for you to find your success, your balance, find your truth and offer these back to the world.

Keb' Mo'

"Start going toward what you love to do, even if you feel like for some reason you're not able to do that right now."

Keb' Mo' draws heavily on the old-fashioned country blues style of Robert Johnson, but keeps his sound contemporary with touches of soul and folksy storytelling. He writes much of his own material and has applied his acoustic, electric, and slide guitar skills to jazz- and rock-oriented bands in the past as well.

Born Kevin Moore in Los Angeles to parents of Southern descent, he was exposed to gospel music at a young age. At 21, Moore joined an R&B band later hired for a tour by Papa John Creach and played on three of Creach's albums. Opening for jazz and rock artists such as the Mahavishnu Orchestra, Jefferson Starship, and Loggins & Messina helped broaden Moore's horizons and musical abilities. Moore cut an R&B-based solo album, *Rainmaker*, in 1980 for Casablanca, which promptly folded.

In 1983, he joined Monk Higgins' band as a guitarist and met a number of blues musicians who collectively increased his understanding of the music. He subsequently joined a vocal group called the Rose Brothers and gigged around L.A. 1990 found Moore portraying a Delta Bluesman in a local play called +Rabbit Foot and later playing Robert Johnson in a docudrama called *Can't You Hear the Wind Howl*?

He released his self-titled debut album as Keb' Mo' in 1994, featuring two Robert Johnson covers, eleven songs he wrote or co-wrote, and his guitar and banjo work. His second album, Just Like You, was equally well received. Slow Down followed in 1998 and Door was issued two years later. Big Wide Grin followed in 2001, while 2004 saw the release of two albums, Keep It Simple and Peace, Back by Popular Demand. Suitcase was issued in 2006 on Red Ink Records.

Who do think you are?

I am who I am, and who I think I am is probably not who I am. I think who I am is already hardwired into my DNA. I think of myself as a servant and a participant. The word "leader" never comes to mind, because I think "leader" is a strange word. It connotes someone else is maybe sheep-like. What it boils down to is to hourly know who I am.

When I interact with the world and nature, I feel a part of the whole thing. I'm a cog in the wheel. I'm a lot of things, dependent on what's going on. I'm kind of like, what is plastic? It's the dashboard on your car, it's the bag you put your groceries in, it's the covering of your TV set, and it's the outside of your computer. What is anything really? At any given time, that role could morph into several different versions of myself.

What events or series of events led to your discovery?

For me it was more surrender than discovery. I surrendered myself and then let go. Often times, depending on who you are, it's difficult to find out how you fit into society. For instance, if you grow up with a knack for science, or a knack for writing, or you have a knack for playing a musical instrument everyone knows what you're going to be at young age. But if your knack is to be, let's say, the Rodney King of this lifetime, who knew you were going to grow up to say one of the famous quotes of all time, "Can't we all just get along?"

There's a guy who may have appeared to be a loser, when in fact, he's not a loser. He's just a cog in the big wheel. He's a part that affects all of us in some way. Even in what appeared to be his darkest hour, he affected the world in a really powerful way. He affected his city. He made a difference.

It's easy to recognize the Einsteins, the Nobel Peace Prize winners, the Oscar winners and the presidents of the world. Those people are easy to spot. It's the "not-so- significant" people who aren't as easy to spot, but they have so much to offer the world and so much to contribute to society if we'd only listen to them.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their purpose in life, what would it be?

I'd say the search is over; start going toward what you enjoy. Start going toward what you love to do, even if you feel like for some reason you're not able to do that right now. If you're looking for yourself, you need to walk toward it. Don't let fear stop you in your tracks. Don't let fear keep you from doing what you were put here to do. Sometimes, you'll have to walk into the mouth of the beast, and if you do...the beast will just turn into a bunny rabbit.

Charles Holt

"If you don't know what you want to do or what the path is for you, do something. Do what's calling you now, because what's calling you now will lead you down the path to what the call is for you later."

Charles Holt is an Actor, Singer, Writer, Transformational Speaker, and Entrepreneur. Even though he grew up in Nashville, Tennesee, Charles does not recall ever aspiring to be a performing artist. Instead, he dreamed of one day playing professional football and becoming one of the game's most memorable players. Who do think you are?

I am inspiration, freedom and healing manifested in form. That's exactly who I am. All of the things I do in terms of my career - singing, acting, stage, film, television, transformational speaking - are a platform for those things to show up and for people to see them. I realized three or four years ago that I no longer had to try to be anybody or be anything. I realized that as soon as I walked into the room people knew exactly who I was. The only person who was kind of clueless at that time was me. I thought that I had to do certain things or dress a certain way. I finally got it, that whenever I step into the room I am inspiration and freedom, I am healing. That's what I've been put on the planet to be. I'm just using the platforms of stage, film, television, music and speaking to get that message across, to inspire somebody to heal the planet. That's what I'm about. I'm about the greater good of the planet, and seeing in people the brilliance and magnificence that we all have.

What events or series of events led to your discovery?

I've always been guided by divine beings, by spirit, by my ancestors. I had moved to Atlanta to spearhead a new company and a year from the date I started they terminated me. I was talking to one of my friends, who is now one of my mentors, and I was telling him that I got fired. I was actually on the phone with him while I was in my office reading the letter of termination. For some reason, I was not at all shaken by it. I could not understand it. I was sitting there thinking, "I just got fired, I don't know what I'm going to do, but everything is perfect. I am at peace."

The first thing he said was, "You got fired; good, now you can start doing what you're supposed to be doing."

"What is that?" I asked.

"You're an entertainer, Charles," he said.

I said "Okay, how do you know?" This guy was Stevie Wonder's choreographer for his world tour in 1988 and 1989 so I believed him.

I've always had the gift of song. I've always been able to sing and act. I'd do skits and stuff like that, nothing really big. But music and storytelling have always been a big part of my life. So I took his advice and I took an acting class at the Alliance Theatre in Atlanta. That's where my career as a performing artist began. While I was doing a show at The Alliance in 1996, I got a big break during the intermission. I sat down in my dressing room and I heard a voice. I know now that it was the voice

of God and the voice told me, "It's time to move, it's time to go." I knew exactly what it meant and I knew where to look. I immediately went to Oxford Books (no longer in existence) on Peach Tree Street. I thumbed through these books called *How To Be A Working Actor In New York* and *How To Be An Actor In Los Angeles*. I chose New York and moved on July 6, 1996.

I was as green as grass gets, but before I went to New York I said to God, "You know I'm supposed to move here. I'm going. I have \$400 in my pocket, but it's what I'm going to do." I got to New York and a month later I auditioned for *Jesus Christ Superstar*, the national tour, and I was cast. That's where I met Carl Anderson.

Carl Anderson was my first introduction to Agape. Carl was Judas in Jesus Christ Superstar and I was playing Simon. Carl would always tell me if I ever came to L.A. he wanted me to come to church with him. Carl really took me under his wing and helped me out. He said, "Anything you need, you just let me know, and I'll take care of you while you're on the road."

He made his transition before we ever made it to Agape together, our schedules just didn't match, but Carl was very instrumental in my knowing that someone really cared about me out there. It's a big world, or at least it seems like a big world when all of your family lives in the South and you move to New York. My mom had asked me if I was crazy when I decided to move to New York. I said, "No, I'm going because I know that something is calling me," and I followed that voice.

Since then I've had several experiences of voices speaking to me. Not just in an everyday tone, but in a very declarative one. I get input every now and then, and I know exactly what it's about. I've listened to the voice inside, the voice of God, my higher self speaking to me. It's the spirit within saying it's time to do this, time to do that. It's the guidance of inner self and spirit, universal substance, universal consciousness, and my ancestors.

I started a dialogue with my grandfather while I was living in New York in 2003. It came as a result of someone bumping into me and not saying excuse me for the ninetieth time. I was tired of it. I was marching back to give that person a piece of my mind and I heard his voice say, "Don't do it, just let it go, don't get yourself all worked up, is not worth it." The voice kept coming to me, anytime I would get upset or if I thought I was being taken advantage of. I wasn't one to let people just say anything to me. I'd be like, "You're not going to talk to me like

I'm crazy." Then I would see my grandfather's face and hear his gentle voice, "What is that all about?"

One day I described him to my mom. "Who is it in our family who has gray hair, no teeth, broad shoulders, and is easy-going?"

"That's your father's father," she said, "your granddaddy."

I said, "Oh wow, well, he talks to me."

"He made his transition when you were three, and you were the light of his life. He loved your dearly."

"He comes and talks to me," I said.

Then I started speaking to my grandmother, and after my grandmother were my aunt and my uncle, and then more people came. Every time they came it would always be extremely uplifting. They still say the greatest things. I know by spirit inside. It's very sacred to me and I'm so thankful that I have that guidance.

What has occurred in my life since moving to Los Angeles has been miraculous. I drove from Nashville to LA and I got here at 10:30 at night on September the 12th. I stayed in a Beverly Hills hotel, because the Polyurethane on the floor in my apartment was not dry. I woke up the next morning and my car and everything I had in it was gone. All I had was a change of clothes and some toiletries. While the sheriff was on the way over to take a stolen car report, I declared that this is exactly where I was supposed to be. And I knew that without a shadow of a doubt. I just declared that, and when I did, the universe opened up to me. I know that the universe is conspiring for my good. I know that for myself.

So that's how I've come to where I am now. It's about trusting, believing, knowing, and just continuing to go. I have a motto that I got from one of Reverend Michael's sermons, and it's that no matter what... whatever it is that I am down here to fulfill, there's nothing that can stop it from unfolding. Nothing. I don't care what appearances may look like, it will be done.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their purpose in life, what would it be?

I think my advice would be this. If you don't know what you want to do or what the path is for you, do something. Do what's calling you now, because what's calling you now will lead you down the path to what the call is for you later. All paths lead to where you're supposed to be, but you have to travel the path. You have to go towards what looks like the end, which is not really an end. It's just something that leads to another

path. When I do my one-man shows I always tell my students maybe you majored in history, or law, or English, or sociology or business and you're thinking now, "I don't know if I want to go to law school, I don't know if I want to go to business school." If you don't know what you want to do, that's okay, but do something. Do something constructive.

I know that once you get on that path doing something constructive, and something that you like, it will help you. It will catapult you into that thing that you would do without getting paid. All of us want to get paid; all of us want to be rewarded financially for us for what we do. When I started singing, I used to sing for free. Then I got to a place where I was like, I'm a little too talented for people not to pay me. I needed to tell myself, "You're worth whatever money you ask for." So do something that moves you so much that you could do it for free, something that brings you that type of passion. If you don't know what your passion is, do something constructive, because it will help you to getting into that place where what you're doing is your passion. It works for everybody, there's something in it for everybody. Just trust your intuition, go down the road, and keep following the path.

Who do think you are?

My life is really about me being in my joy and sharing it unconditionally with others. That's the playing field I like to live in and on. I'm very turned on to performing in the arts. I love the creativity of the entertainment industry, the arena of laughter, making people laugh, and spreading joy. I feel a sense of accomplishment from writing my

book, *The Art of Comedy, Getting Serious about Being Funny*. It's definitely a validation of my message.

More than that is living life to the fullest every day and opening up new horizons inside myself. As we all know, life is completely an inside job, and I've always been drawn to those who can inspire my inner growth. That has always been first and foremost in my life. It's about being in synchronicity with those I feel a connection with, where others can help me feel my own deeper connection with truth, love and expansion.

What events or series of events led to your discovery?

I was an only child growing up in the city of Philadelphia, and I felt there were certainly areas that were very gray to me. Upon reflection, it probably wasn't the perfect environment, but I think I grew up learning what didn't work for me. In my teen years I tried everything that was trendy like smoking, drugs, and alcohol. Fortunately I was terrible at being trendy. I did it, I didn't feel good about it, and couldn't figure out why I didn't feel good about it. I was desperately trying to fit in and trying to be someone I was not.

Then I came to California, and got into transcendental meditation, which I've been doing twice a day for over 20 years. That led me to eating extremely healthy, and watching what I put in my body. My main focus was to have my body feeling as great as possible and that led me to embracing the world of exercise. I speak on the topic of optimum health and well-being, and it's truly all about the balance of mental, physical, emotional and spiritual. One thing led me to another. It was like connecting the dots in my life. Transcendental meditation led me to Arnold Ehret's Mucousless Diet, which allowed me to purify my nervous system and purify my body. This led me to a plethora of seminars. You name a seminar, and I've done it. I've done a lot of personal growth work and am very proud of it. Attending the Agape International Spiritual Center on a regular basis has been the major excavation of my heart and soul. I took the classes to be a practitioner because I was so drawn to the expansion of consciousness available to me. My body got into the car every single Sunday to go to Agape because my spirit undeniably wanted to be there.

The days of going to places to numb myself are definitely over. Places filled with smoking, drinking, drugging, and processed foods don't lend themselves to optimum living.

We live in a world today where there's so much information about how to have more qualitative living. If you're ignoring it, you're ignoring the possibility of a life filled with inner fulfillment. There are so many trappings around us, whether it's shopping or drinking or over indulgence. Once you find your center and find out who you are there's more possibility for discovering you inner rainbows.

I'd also recommend spending a lot of time in nature to see examples of perfection. Watch and observe the flowers blooming, the trees swaying, feeling the air all around you, and looking up at the sky. That's true perfection. When we know that we are one with that, it's the most exciting journey possible. I'd say that we are given the gift of life from God and our gift to God is what we do with it. I think the key to life is to keep loving more and more. How much more loving can you be? How much more loving are you willing to become? That's the greatest question that one can ask, and the greatest answer is to go for the gold. Give and receive love all the time, freely and with unabashed joy. Enjoy the process of your life at the deepest possible level. Enjoy the whole enchilada!

Who do think you are?

I am a queen, a goddess, and a blessed loyal holy child of God. I know I am here to do great things. I'm here to heal, to bless, and to inspire through my talents, my gifts, and through my service. That's what I think I am on a spiritual level. That's the journey isn't it? To always be able to keep that foremost in my view of who I am.

On the physical level, I would say I am an actress, a singer, and a dancer. On the mental level, where the worry, doubts, and fears live, there is the part that says, "Aw, you aint doing nothing'. You're going too slow." So, as I go along on my journey I'm knowing that I'm in the perfect place at the right time and living my purpose, and that I'm not here to question what time it is. It's about God's timing, and there are so many breakthroughs happening in my life right now. There's this gigantic energy flow coming through me to create more and have it out there on a global level.

What events or series of events led to your discovery?

I always knew that I was here to do great things; I just didn't know what. I've always seen myself as an actress, and "singer" is a label that I'm starting to wear more fully. I am a singer. There are a lot of people who sing, and I thought I was an actress who sang and moved well or danced. Now I'm learning that I am all of these things fully, there are no parts in God, things are fully what they are.

At that time I was working mid-days at a radio station and my boss called me in and told me I was getting a demotion. I said, "I'm not doing that - I can't do that." He told me he was putting me on overnights for a while. I told him, "I am not doing overnights." I didn't know what I was going to do, but it was a turning point for me. There was something else I was supposed to do, so I went on a leave of absence for a while to figure it out.

After a week on leave, I got a call to perform, in a theatrical production in Boston. It was a lead role in a musical that I loved, *Ain't Misbehavin*, so I got to use all of my performance gifts: acting, singing, and dancing. I was being paid well as an actor in a full equity show. And I absolutely took that opportunity to make a change in my career path, because I had gotten disillusioned with radio. I was ready for a change, but I didn't know how to make the change. It took that low point for me to recognize that it's tough for me surrender and let something more come in.

I didn't know what it is or where it was coming from, but I knew there was something greater for me to do. I realized that I am only here to do great things. If you're asking me to do something that's not great, it's not for me. And it wasn't just for my ego. What I was really working on was being in that stillness and being in that presence all of the time. Where it's not just about "How did I look?" or "How did I sound? Did you see me? What did you think?" But knowing that I am here to share a service.

Another turning point was moving to LA. I've lived here for about eleven years now. And another was meeting my divine life partner, Colette

Divine. She and I are featured as Documentary subjects in the film *Who Killed the Electric Car?* She always challenges me and holds me accountable to stand in my truth and my greatness. Making a choice to be with her (we've been together ten years now) has confirmed to me that everything I was feeling and knowing deep within me was true.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their life's purpose, what would it be?

"Should I move here, do you think it's time, should I move here, I've got a good life there, should I stay with this person, should I break up with that person, should be with this new person, should I live here this house, should I do this, should I do that?"

I talked to psychics, highly recommended psychics, looking at it on a spiritual level. What event or series of events led you to your discovery?

Look at what you have done that has been most inspiring, most meaningful and most purposeful to you and synthesize these. This will point you in a meaningful direction. Everything in your life is actually directing you. When you experience tears of gratitude in your eyes, you're on track. So pay close attention to those moments.

Doing what you love and loving what you do is the key to living a fulfilling life. If you look at who your heroes have been, what you've studied most, what you thought about most, what you've mastered most, what you're inspired by most, and integrate them, you'll discover what your mission in life really is.

I wrote my initial mission statement when I was with Paul Bragg in 1972 and refined it fifty-seven times since then. I read it every day. I have it in front of me right now. My mission is what I'm up to; it's the highest priority I have in my life. I've also focused on documenting all the objectives that I intend to accomplish in my life and keep record of them all as they emerge and become fulfilled. I have the largest collection

of goals, and the largest collection of experiences to feel gratitude for, of anyone I know. If you can imagine thirty-five years worth – every single day, that's a lot of gratitudes.

I've been writing, reading and refining my mission statement, goal book, gratitude book and accomplishment book since I was seventeen, and I'm fifty-three now. So I'm a big believer in defining and refining and re-defining and re-refining your dreams, constantly polishing exactly how you would love your life to be, and being realistic and inspired by the vision of your destiny. Making sure it's truly what you would love to have as your destiny. If you can't wait to get up in the morning and go and live it then you're clear and on track. If for some reason you're still not inspired by your life and your mission, then you obviously have not yet clearly defined and refined enough.

Who do think you are?

Who I am is defined by goals as well as passions, and the roles that I play are varied. I'm chairman of an organization. I'm a participant of communities of various sizes. I'm a father and a husband. When you really get back to the concept of purpose, I stand to testify to the genius in you, assisting you in reclaiming that genius capacity and healing the wounded learner in you. So the work that I do flows out of that. It's helping people reclaim the natural brilliance that they are and the genius capacity within them.

What event or series of events led to your discovery?

While I was at the University of Minnesota as a student in biological sciences, I had an opportunity to be trained as a professional hypnotist. At the age of nineteen I began to do individual consultations using hypnosis out of a clinic in the Twin Cities. Two years later I took over that practice, and it was the oldest established hypnosis practice in the Twin Cities of Minneapolis and St. Paul.

During that time I had the opportunity to present a demonstration of hypnosis for a church youth group. I had about ten of the kids in the deep trance state, and I was demonstrating the power of hypnotic suggestion. I told one of the kids, "Your foot is glued to the floor, you can try to move it but you cannot, it's glued to the floor!" and he couldn't move his foot. Since it was early in my career, and I had just learned these techniques, I was kind of surprised and was thinking, "Wow, this works; I'll try something even more powerful!" Then I said, "You've forgotten your name, you can try to tell me your name, but you can't do it. You've forgotten it. Try to tell me your name." As I watched this kid struggle - completely unable to say his own name - I realized that's what we're doing to ourselves all the time. We're taking perfectly reasonable resources of mind and body and we're essentially throwing them out because we accept the suggestion of "I cannot." So, at about 20 years old, I realized my job wasn't about putting people into trances, they're already there. They're in self-limiting, self-defeating trances, accepting a belief in what they're incapable of doing. I realized that my job was to be a de-hypnotist to awaken people from negative, self-limiting trances that they have accepted in life, and to help them reclaim the magnificence of who they are.

If you could give advice to people who are still searching for their purpose in life, what would it be?

There's a great quotation by Ralph Waldo Emerson. He said, "Find your soul, and if it's still alive, poke it with a stick, find out which way it moves and then follow it."

The idea is to tune in to yourself and find out what your passion is. Make a commitment to follow your own passion. You'll always be making the best choices. The second part to that is to stay with it. To stay with whatever it is you make a commitment to and find out which way it goes, where it takes you.

Understanding your purpose and living a life of purpose is a process of discovery. It's not something that you sit down and write out as an interesting pithy phrase. It's really something that emerges. When you start seeing your life as a co-creative emergent activity with a loving, supportive universe that's trying to express itself through you as you, then you know that you have an immense power on your side to get you where you want to go.

Les Brown

"You have greatness within you. Know that and be with that thought on a daily basis. Know that greatness is a choice; it's not your destiny."

Who do you think you are?

I think that the calling on my life is to help people get a larger vision of themselves beyond their circumstances and mental conditioning. I came to that level of awareness in terms of my purpose because of what has happened in my own life: born in an abandoned building on the floor, adopted, labeled educable mentally retarded, put back from fifth to fourth grade, having no formal college training. I then experienced a lifetransforming event when I met someone who interrupted the story I believed about myself, the things that had been said about me, and based upon the results that I had produced at that particular time. I had this limited vision of myself, and as a result of this relationship, it dramatically changed the way I saw myself. As a result of that, in my own mind and spirit I wanted to be that type of person to other people. I wanted to impact and inspire others to get an expanded vision of themselves and realize what was said in The Lion King, "Samba, you're more than that which you have become." That to me has become my theme and the mantra of my life and that's where I have been living from.

What event or series of events led to your discovery?

There have been three events. One, when I was adopted. I believe something that Abraham Lincoln said, "All that I am, and all that I ever hope to be, I owe to my mother." I realized something that really impacted me. God took me out of my mother's biological womb and placed me in the heart of my adoptive mother. So, my mother, Mrs. Mamie Brown, always made me feel special, and I was one of seven kids that she adopted.

The other person who impacted me was Mr. Leroy Washington, a high school teacher who I met my junior year in high school. He was a substitute instructor, and he asked me to go to the board to work something out. I was in his class waiting for another student, so I said, "Sir, I can't do what you asked me to do."

He asked me, "Why not?"

I replied, "I'm not one of your students."

He said, "It doesn't matter, follow my directions anyhow."

The other students began to laugh, because they knew that I was in special education. They knew my twin brother, Wesley, and one of the kids said, "That's Leslie not Wesley, that's DT."

That's what they called me, DT, which stood for the "dumb twin." I said, "I'm not the smart one."

He came out from behind his desk and said, "Don't ever say that again. Someone's opinion of you does not have to become your reality."

That was a defining moment in my life. On one hand, I was humiliated, but on the other hand, I was liberated. The students were laughing at me when I turned around and tried to follow the directions that he was giving me. But at that moment I felt like he was looking at me with the eyes of Goethe who said, "Look at a man the way that he is, he only becomes worse. But look at him as if he were what he could be, and then he becomes what he should be."

That moment was a life-transforming moment because he had given me a vision of myself beyond that which I had believed about myself. Because of what had been spoken to me, the results of my life academically had convinced me that I was far less than what I was.

The other person is a gentleman named Mike Williams, who's been my mentor for the last thirty-eight years. I hired him as my first newsman and through talking in between the records I was spinning, he convinced me that I was more than a disc jockey. I believed that I was a disc jockey. I was "Les Brown, man about town. There were none before me; there will be none after me. Therefore that makes me the one and only. Young and single and love to mingle." So this guy talked to me about having a larger vision of myself beyond radio. He talked to me about being a communicator, not just seeing myself as a disc jockey. He talked to me about seeing myself as a catalyst of action and a messenger of hope.

That vision he had of me I did not see at the time. But, I came to understand that sometimes you have to believe in somebody's belief in you until your belief in you catches up. This gave birth to a Les Brown that I did not know existed. That relationship so empowered me that it inspired me to give up who I was for who I could become and who I am still becoming. I am much like George Bernard Shaw, who was asked if he had it in his power to come back as anyone throughout all of history who would it be? He said, "I'd like to become the man I never was."

That's where I am. I'm still reaching, I'm still searching, I'm still groping and I'm still learning. I'm like the woman who said, "Lord, I ain't what I want to be, I ain't what I'm gonna be, but thank God I sure ain't what I was.

It's because of my relationships with Mike Williams, Mr. Washington and my mother that this Les Brown, who's communicating with you right now, has become the person he is today.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their purpose in life, what would it be?

I would say that number one it is very important that you don't settle for what life is giving you. Judge not according to appearances. There is a mind-sight and then there's eyesight. There are a lot of people who define their lives, and the possibilities for less, based upon what they see in terms of their education, their bank accounts, their circumstances, and what they've accomplished.

Mind-sight you live out of your imagination as opposed to your memory. Einstein said, "The imagination is the preview of what's to come." Go through life with a vision of yourself beyond where you are. If you are aware of what your purpose is, work on it with everything that's in you and through persistence and perseverance you'll discover some things about yourself that you didn't even know. You'll create some magic moments in your life and you'll make an impact with your life that you can't even imagine.

If you don't know, continue to search until you find out what it is that resonates with you, what turns you on, what is it that you could do twenty-four hours a day for free. A career is something you love so much that you would do it for nothing, but you do it so well that people are willing to pay you for it.

Something else I heard that I believe very strongly in, and is the place from which I live my life: Man was not born to make a living, but to live his making; and living his making will make his living. What is the making? Why were you chosen out of 400 million sperm? Once you discover why that is, and what it is you're supposed to do, your life takes on a whole new meaning. But it's up to you.

You have greatness within you. Know that and be with that thought on a daily basis. Know that greatness is a choice; it's not your destiny. Live your life from a place of knowing that you are something special, that you have greatness within you, that you were chosen to be here. Know that there's something you have that if you don't deliver it, if you don't leave it here, then all of the world will be deprived. In historical context, the world will be a better place because you came here and did what it is that you were supposed to do. Move in life with the spirit of expectation, curiosity, discovery, and know that there's always more.

What do you like, what are your passions, what would you do all day long if money were no object?

What event or series of events led to your discovery?

She suggested I study world religions, meditate, understand how my body and mind worked, and understand how energy worked. She taught me the perspective that we're all connected. That humanity and the earth and nature are all connected, and that I could come from a higher power by going deep inside myself and connecting to that.

Next, I met Werner Erhard. I was about twenty-three years old when I met him, and he had just been made an instructor for a company called Mind Dynamics. I took his first seminar for Mind Dynamics and I soon became one of his staff members. Later that year, we created a seminar company called est. About ten people were the original founders.

I spent ten years with Werner as the Vice President of est, which later became The Landmark Forum. During those years I was the spokesperson for est and in charge of all the marketing, promotion, production, and enrollment. I trained the guest seminar leaders and the trainers, taught the seminar leaders how to speak effectively in front of groups, and was in charge of filling all of the events.

During those ten years of my life I learned so much about how one manifests, how one creates results in this universe, about the law of attraction, the power of the word and how we use language, and how to connect with other people. Life since then has been an ever-evolving process. It's being about growing, learning more, connecting more, and been able to make a bigger contribution as I move through life.

As a human being you are always evolving, always emerging, and always expanding. To the degree that you are doing that, you are still alive. And to the degree that you think the learning process is over, you're really in the process of dying.

Who do you think you are?

I am a mentor to many. In fact the majority of my purpose on this planet is to be a beacon and guide to help others define their goals and their mission. A lot of people think I got the name *The Millionaire Mentor* because I only work with millionaires and corporations, and although that's the majority of what I do, I actually mentor many inner city gang kids in San Diego, California. That's where my passion is.

It seems like society keeps telling kids, and even adults, where we shouldn't go, what we shouldn't say, and what we shouldn't do. I thought to myself, wouldn't it be cool to be that one voice of reason that asks, "What can you do? What are you capable of? What could you do with your life if you didn't have any obstacles and limitations?" Then help guide them towards what their answer is to those questions. Everyone has a different mission and purpose on this planet, and it's just an awesome life to live helping people to discover what that is.

What event or series of events led you to your discovery?

I believe that we're hardwired. I don't know that there's been an epiphany for myself, or that one day a light went on. My entire life has been built around being of service to people. Even as a kid, I would do things like help another kid play a sport better, because I realized for myself that I kept getting better and learning and growing by simply helping others around me to do the same. You learn the most when you are teaching others. So, again, I don't think I had some epiphany as much as I realized I was born to be of service and this is truly who I am.

If you could give advice to people who are still searching for their purpose in life, what would it be?

I've come up with a solution for that. In fact, it's something in our film *Pass It On*. It's called the success equation. I came up with this to help people, because a lot of people come up to me and say, "It's easy for you, but how did you actually do it? Is there a system?" I think that a lot of people do this already, consciously and subconsciously. For me, it was subconsciously.

It works like this.

The success equation is: $P + T \times A^2 = Success$

P = Passion T = Talent

 A^2 = Action and Association

It works like this; \mathbf{P} is your passion (What would you do, if you could do it for free?). Then you combine that with \mathbf{T} , which stands for talent, and a lot of people miss this. You hear these late night infomercial guys say, "Go and find your passion" but they're missing something. Just like you see these people on these television singing contests, they have a lot of passion but they're not very talented, therefore they don't keep going. You combine what you're passionate about with your talent, and then include the multiplication of \mathbf{A}^2 , which is taking \mathbf{A} ction with the right \mathbf{A} ssociation.

Imagine if your Passion was that you loved stuffed animals, they're all over the house, you drove everyone else nuts, but you just loved stuffed animals. And say your Talent happens to be working on the computer. You're pretty good on the Internet. Now, how could you take Action with the right Association? And the answer is, your passion or your purpose might just be selling beanie-babies on eBay, because you combined what your passion was with your talent and you took action with the right people. And, that's the true manner, in my opinion, in which all great leaders have found their purpose on the planet.

Dan Poynter

Who do you think you are?

I often ask myself that question. I guess that I'm a researcher and information disseminator. I love to study, I love to research, and I disseminate that information in my books, my speeches, my articles, and of course my website. I don't like to think of myself as being an author, or publisher, or even a publicist. We are all information providers, and we have to think about our audience and provide that information to them in any form they want.

For example, I write books, but some people out there can't read my books. Perhaps they're a long-haul trucker or behind the wheel for many hours at a time. So they can listen to my books, I try to put most of them into an audio format, to serve those people. And we also have eBooks and large PRINT books so that we can serve all of those different audiences.

What event or series of events led to your discovery?

There are a series of things, but I think the most moving event for me was back in 1962. I was taking finals in law school in San Francisco and a friend of mine said, "I know where we can go skydiving." Well, I had always wanted to do that and there was a place about an hour and a half away in Calistoga. So, I finished my exams, went up there on a Saturday and made the jump. I was so excited I stayed overnight and on Sunday I made three more. I was right back there the next weekend. I think my eighth jump I landed in the tree. My ninth jump was a water jump into Clear Lake, and I did pretty well in the water jump competition.

From there I decided that I would rather be a parachute designer than a lawyer. Maybe because they have more friends. (: That completely changed my life, because I was able to turn my passion center into my profit center. I spent many years collecting information and published a huge manual on parachutes, a very technical book that's purchased by the manufacturers, technicians, and designers.

I rose in the politics of the parachute industry and the sport of skydiving, and I've just had a wonderful life ever since. If I hadn't gone out there, if I didn't have that experience of skydiving, I just don't know where I would be today. I just can't imagine that I'd be as happy as I am.

This is why I tell young people today to get out of the house, try something different every weekend. Don't do the same things, don't go out with the same people. Hopefully something like skydiving will grab you and you can turn your passion center into your profit center, turn your avocation into your vocation. Do something that you really enjoy, rather than punching a time clock, doing your job and trying to pay the bills. It seems most people are unhappy with what they're doing. They are unhappy with their job, their lot in life, and they just need more experiences when they're young to help them discover the direction they want to go.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their purpose in life, what would it be?

Get out of the house! Now this may really be hard if you are a person who is introverted, you don't like crowds of people, or perhaps you are so low on the scales of introvert that you're agoraphobic. But you have to force yourself. I'm an introvert; I'm very low on the scale. I work all by myself, I work in a solitary manner, but I forced myself to get out, and that's one of the things that lead me to professional speaking.

I believe it was Loa Tzu the Chinese philosopher who said, "The journey of a thousand leagues begins with the first step." I like to take that further and say that each step that you take reveals a new horizon. Each step you take, each thing that you do, is a learning experience, and that opens up new ideas, new doors, and then you can take another step. Every time you do something new, every time you do something different, you're taking one of the steps.

Benjamin Disraeli said, "The best way to become acquainted with the subject is to write a book about it." Remember Disraeli was that famous British statesmen who was born in 1804 and died in 1881. What he was saying is that in order to write a book you not only use your accumulated knowledge but you research everything that's been done on it before. You read all the other books, you read all the magazine articles, you interview other people, and so on. You come up with all of this information, and then you write your book directly toward a particular type of reader or consumer.

So, if you write a book you're going to learn a great deal about your subject. You may not be the expert on it when you start, but by the time you finish that book, you become the expert on that subject. And of course, everyone holds you in high regard as a published author, and they just accept the fact that you're an expert. As a matter of fact, Joe Vitale points out that the word authority contains the word author. So by definition, you're an authority on the subject. On my website we have some lengthy information kits on how to write, publish and promote your books, and they're free. Each is about 20 pages long and that's at www.parapub.com. Just think parachutes and publishing dot com.

Who do you think you are? What is your life's purpose?

To me they're two distinctly different things. Who I am is more of a "what," and my purpose in life is not necessarily related. So, I may be different than most of the people that you are interviewing. Let me see if I can explain. I'll start with what my purpose is. My purpose in life is to share happiness, peace and joy with the planet by sharing the technique that I co-created called, The Sedona Method. So, that's my purpose. But what I am is the presence of awareness, that's aware of this conversation, yet completely uninvolved; that is the same energy or awareness that is listening both through these ears and those ears; that's seeing both through these eyes and those eyes; that has no boundaries, no location, that's beyond space and time. And it's not just who I am. In my experience, that's who everyone is. The sense of a separate individual is made up. In fact, it doesn't bear direct examination. If you, right now, try to find the separate "you" that you believe you are, I challenge you to find it. I've yet to speak to anyone who can actually find it. They can remember it, because it just exists as a function of mind. It has nothing to do with what's here and now, and it has nothing to do with what we are. Again, in my experience, what we are is effortless, choiceless, pure presence or awareness, being-ness or what ever you want to call it. And it's always here, and it's always now. Now, in the appearance we call life there are imagined individuals, and these individuals definitely have purposes.

That is part of the dance. I feel very fortunate and grateful that this particular body/mind has been chosen or is being used to share freedom and aliveness, joy and peace with the world. It's a great pleasure to have that be what I'm engaged in every day.

What event or series of events lead you to your discovery?

Again, they're paralleled tracks. The purpose I discovered, very fortunately, when I met Lester Levinson back in 1976 (the man who inspired The Sedona Method). I was organizing a seminar for another seminar leader, and Lester came as a guest. I didn't even notice him in the seminar, but when I met Lester I was blown away by who he was. He was calm, happy, centered, peaceful and equal minded, and at the same time he was not at all full of himself for what he had discovered. In other words, he didn't think anything of what he had discovered, he just thought it was natural. I was really blown away by who he was a living example of, so I asked him what he did and he said, "Well, we teach this technique called releasing (The Sedona Method), and it's taught over two weekends, and you basically sit around a table and release." Of course, I had no idea what he was talking about, but I knew that if he gave me just some of what he was a living example of...I wanted it. I took the course the very next weekend, and before the course was even over, I knew that my life was going to be dedicated to sharing his discoveries, and as it turned out, improving them and expanding upon them and reaching a much broader audience then he ever could. So, my life purpose has been sharing this good news with the world. That was 1976, and I'm still very happily engaged in doing that.

Since I've been doing this work, I have continued to explore inwardly and as I've been letting go...at first I was letting go of my sense of inner limitation and manifesting in my life more joy, more happiness, more abundance, more health, more loving and satisfying relationships, and helping literally hundreds of thousands of people to do the same thing. Somewhere along the way, I also started investigating the nature of this person that we believe we are. Through self-exploration and continuing to explore, I discovered that what we are is not the person. What we are is that which is beyond the person, and is even beyond

purpose. Because what we are doesn't need a purpose to be. There's nothing you need to do, and nothing you need to fix or change in order to be what you already are. So, after discovering that, this is now an integral part of the advanced work that we do, helping people discover this for themselves.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their purpose in life, what would it be?

The first thing I would say is: continue the search until you get the answers that you're looking for – whether it be having more money or better relationships or better health or the ultimate understanding of your true nature. Even when you hit obstacles and things don't seem to going the way you would like, just be persistent. As you can tell, I've been pretty persistent. I've been doing the same thing now for over thirty years, and it wasn't always easy. There were times when I guess many people would have given up. But I was persistent and consistent in my efforts to discover my true nature and to help others do the same, and it's bearing fruit. So persistence is very useful.

The other thing is earnestness. If you're earnest in your endeavors to improve yourself or discover you true nature, that earnestness will lead to toward the right source of information. Most of us have so many choices every day in the spiritual path, self-evolution or evolvement, or self help, and it can be very confusing. But if you're really earnest and you follow your heart, your heart will never lead you wrong. Your mind may, and your beliefs and programs from the past may, but your heart always knows. There is a knowingness that I'm calling heart that is just part of our basic nature. This presence of awareness that we are is all knowingness. It's not all knowing, as that implies there's is a person, it's all knowingness. And that knowingness will guide you to the right things if you're just simply open to it. It's always there, always here, always now, and always guiding you in the right direction, it's just that often it has to do things repeatedly to get our attention. So if you trust your knowingness and trust your heart and you're earnest, you'll be lead in the right direction. Just add persistence to that and you're in really good shape.

The other thing that I have found personally very helpful, and has the hundreds and thousands of people that do the work that I do, is that simply holding in mind what you want without letting go, without letting go of the old beliefs and patterns, programs and experiences that

are holding you back for most people is an IOU for failure. The thing that distracts us from our life purpose and the things that we're trying to pursue is all the excess emotional and mental baggage that we carry around. What the Sedona Method does is show you how to shed this emotional baggage so that you don't have to carry it around anymore. To me that's been critically important, and it has been for the hundreds and thousands of people doing this work. It's a critically an important step to do the work required to uncover this knowingness. It's to uncover your intuitive knowing and your clear reason, and also to help you get off your butt. A lot of us know what we should do, but we've chose not to do it or to stop doing it because of all this emotional conflict that we carry inside. If you commit to dissolving it and to letting it go with some technique like the Sedona Method, which is, in my experience, the best one, but it's not the only one. I recommend you do something to dissolve the sense of inner limitation that prevents you from achieving your goals, and staying on course. So, that would be what I would recommend.

Who do you think you are?

I discovered that I am a leader and an inspirational teacher. At first I didn't really accept myself as a teacher. I knew I was a speaker and a writer, but I hadn't really realized that being a teacher was my purpose and that's what I was put on this earth to do. Now I know that my passion has really been discovered, and that's what I will continue to do for the rest of my life.

What event or series of events led you to your discovery?

I know that I am passionate about speaking and teaching people how to have successful businesses. I've been doing this for twelve years, seven of those years full-time. But it only became clear that this was my life's purpose in December of 2006. I attended a breakthrough workshop with best-selling author, Barbara De Angeles for two days, and it just hit me like a lightening bolt, "This is what I was put on the earth for!" The reason I had been doing all these other things in my life, such as being successful in business and building and selling businesses, was to get the expertise and the knowledge to do what I was really put on this earth to do, which is to teach others. That teaching is not only about business, there's a message of personal growth mixed in. My presentations aren't just business seminars anymore, they deal with mental belief systems and inner work. I discovered that teaching in this way is really my true gift.

I was innately transitioning into that type of work, but I didn't realize it until I discovered my own personal breakthrough. professional growth, that's when you become the person you were supposed to be to make a difference in other peoples lives. You cannot fully be of service to other people until you are of service to yourself, and the only way to be of service to yourself is to be true to yourself and never settle for less than you deserve. When you work on yourself inwardly, emotionally and psychologically, along with continually learning new business skills, that's when you really become a master. That's when you become the best that you can be.

The first measure of our building is through our children and our grandchildren, which leads me to number three. It is incumbent upon me that I transfer my true wealth, not just my financial wealth, to my children, grandchildren and so forth so that they can continue growing and being contributors to this world rather than just takers and receivers. I see those as my three primary purposes for being here in life.

I also believe that I have a unique ability to innovate, generate, communicate and motivate. I am an intellectual capitalist who takes new concepts and ideas, systemizes them in a way that people are willing to pay money to learn so they can easily and effortlessly accomplish their true potential. If we can help others develop their unique abilities and talents by implementing systems that allow them to optimize their potential and achieve peace of mind, true happiness, and success that's very rewarding and gratifying to me. I get excited about developing and then communicating easily understood systems that achieve individual, family and corporate objectives faster and more efficiently. That's my passion. That's what I love doing. So I utilize my unique talents to serve who I am.

What event or series of events led to your discovery?

If you always make your learning greater than your experience, then all of your cumulative experiences are the assets that make up who you are. Using number three from above as the example, when I identify my unique talents as being able to serve the other three, that came about as a result of being in the financial services industry since 1973. My passion had been estate planning, working with financially affluent families to transfer their financial wealth into future generations. Along that road I had a unique experience that totally changed my life.

I had the opportunity to collect a very sizable check from a young entrepreneur who was approaching billionaire status. I walked into his office, and he had his head down working, and all he said was, "Lee, I've been wondering, what's a guy like you worth?" When I heard that

statement, because of my own ego, the hair on the back of my neck stood up. I went into an uncalled-for "reaction."

The answer that came out really shocked me, because I said to him (after a long pause and much consideration about whether or not I was going to throw his check into the wind), "To my family, I am worth a heck of a lot. Some people are born with their own particular trials, maybe they're born ugly, or they're born with certain handicaps, mentally or physically, and others have to deal with handicaps physically or mentally that occur after they are born. Your handicap may be that you're rich. I don't think God cares as much about what handicaps we have or how much we have or don't have. What I do think he cares about is how we deal with them." And I just kind of left it there. Fortunately for me, a few long seconds (and lots of sweat) later he replied, "You know I was just thinking the same thing."

This was one of three impactful events that happened right on the heels of each other that caused me to ask the question, "What is my stewardship responsibility to my financial wealth, and when does it end?" quest, I discovered that among families worldwide statistically 97% of all family wealth, or less than 4%, ever survives beyond the third generation. I felt like all the work I was doing was in some way for not. I've come to learn that the intellectual ability to structure trusts and other legal instruments to transfer the family financial wealth has very little to do with the long term result of sustaining that family wealth from one generation to the other. Once we value and develop systems that transfer not just the tangible assets, but the intangible assets of values, character, self esteem, confidence, wisdom, and charity - those intangible assets that we value more than money - from generation to generation, then the financial assets have the greatest odds to survive as well.

The Brower Quadrant and The Quadrant Living Systems are truly designed to transfer all of a family's true wealth, not just the financial. It is very exciting.

There was another event, an intervention of sorts, where I was attending a workshop on public speaking in Canada. The participants, were completely unrelated to my industry and had been listening to me speak. Near the end of the seminar they came to me and said, "Lee, what you are doing is not just for the very affluent, it's for everybody. We see your mission as being one who will share these principles with everybody, regardless of their current financial situation."

Those are but two of several significant events that have caused me to focus on how to discover and establish systems that transfer all of our assets, not just our financial assets, to future generations. Right now, each day of our living life, we can we enrich all of the quadrants in our lives, including the financial quadrants so that we can reach that level of happiness and peace we all search for.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their life's purpose, what would it be?

First, I would suggest that you celebrate who you are and where you are now. In other words, celebrate your accomplishments. I think all great things come from the rich soil of gratitude, and celebration is a wonderful form of expressing gratitude. If you can celebrate your activities of the day, celebrate who you are, the talents and the unique abilities that you have, then happiness comes to you. Unhappiness stems from comparing. When we compare ourselves to others, many times it creates unhappiness in our lives. So, when we celebrate where we are and what we are doing and eliminate the comparisons in our lives, then we can increase the happiness. So, I would recommend first and foremost gratitude and celebration.

Secondly, you must be willing to let go. You have to let go. When most people get a good idea, they want to cling to it, or they've achieved some success in their lives and they've become comfortable. Letting go is huge. Once you've set your vision of what you're capable of, and maybe it's only as far as you can see right now, and you set that horizon for yourself, then to move forward you must let go.

Sometimes you'll have to let go of past habits, past relationships, and past conditions in order to move forward. Surrender to that vision or horizon, and when you let go, then you start moving toward that new horizon, and guess what, you can navigate to that new horizon. The new horizon continues to move with you, and so you get new horizons as you let go.

Who do you think you are?

The core of who I am is a pure center of conscious awareness and will, and by that I mean I'm pure consciousness that has incarnated into a body, and I have the function of awareness and choice. Who I am in terms of life purpose is someone who is here to inspire and empower people to live their highest vision in a context of love and joy. By that I mean I inspire people through my speeches, through the *Chicken Soup for the Soul*® books, and through media projects like *The Secret* that I participate in. I empower people through my books like *The Success Principles*TM, *The Power of Focus, The Aladdin Factor*, and the forthcoming *Effortless Success*TM *Living the Law of Attraction*, my *Breakthrough to Success* workshops, and my monthly "Ask Jack" calls (see www.AskJackCanfield.com) where I give people concrete, practical ways to manifest their vision. That's my purpose and how I work to manifest it.

What event or series of events led to your discovery?

I have to say that discovering my life purpose has been a result of a series of events over time. It just kept forming and eventually it congealed into the words "inspiring and empowering people to live their highest vision in a context of love and joy." I think it's true that love and joy have always been my two hallmarks, the principle qualities of my life. People that know me say, "Oh yeah, Jack's a fun guy. He's very inspiring, and he's really very loving." That part of me has seemingly been there forever.

I started my career as a high school teacher in an inner-city school in Chicago, and then I became a teacher trainer for a number of years.

Back when I was an educator, in one of the weekend human potential trainings that I attended, we were asked to visualize going up to the top of a mountain, entering a temple, and receiving a gift in a golden box from a wise old person, who had descended down into the temple through a beam of white light. We were told that the gift in the box would be a symbol that would represent our life purpose. The gift I received was a golden heart. It is clear to me that the essence of what I was here to experience, express, and teach is love.

Over time, whenever I would think about my purpose, I would get this image of myself climbing to the top of a tall mountain, where I would then gather up a huge ball of light in my arms (the light representing the healing power of love). Then I would take this big giant ball of light, and I would come back down the mountain and hand out snowball sized handful's of light to everyone I encountered. That seemed to be a representation of my teaching, running seminars, coaching, counseling, and doing therapy. When I would run out of light, I would walk back up to the top of the mountain and gather more light. This would play itself out in real life as me going to another spiritual retreat or meditating more—any way to go to a higher level and take in that inspiration of love and light, and then bring it back down and share it with others.

Then there were a number of years that I was a trainer for a company called Insight Training Seminars. The names of our courses I taught were *Awakening The Heart*, *Centering In The Heart*, and *Opening The Heart*; so for a couple of years there I was very focused on teaching people to experience and express more of the love that they truly are.

Paul McCartney said, "All you need is love," and I truly believe that, but what I also find is that in this lifetime here on earth I am equally interested in helping people manifest their vision, but always in the context of love.

Another major event that occurred for me was that I took a 10-day Vipassana meditation retreat. It's an ancient Buddhist technique, over 2500 years old, and you just basically follow your breath for the first three days, and then after that, you just observe your mind as it goes where it goes. You simply observe your physical sensations, thoughts, memories, and fantasies. I found that after about eight days, I got into a very compassionate state. I remember driving home with my wife, and we were driving about 30 miles an hour on the freeway. Everything was so slowed down. The most amazing experience was when we passed a dead cat on the side of the road, and I noticed that there were a bunch of maggots eating the dead cat. I thought to myself, *Five years ago I would*

have really been upset for the cat, and now I'm really happy that the maggots have something to eat. So I had attained a state of pure joy, where I was deeply appreciating whatever reality presented itself, an experience that everything is perfect just the way it is.

Then in 1984, I read a book called *You Can Have It All* by Arnold Patent. In that book he had a written exercise for identifying and articulating your life purpose. The first step was to come up with two qualities and that you most enjoy expressing, and I wrote down *love* and *joy*. Then he asked, what are two ways that you most enjoy expressing those qualities? I wrote down *inspiring and empowering people*. Then he said, imagine the world was perfect from your point of view. What would be happening? And I wrote down, *everyone would be living their highest vision*. I've always believed that when people are living their highest vision—not their parents', society's or their teachers' vision—then the world would work.

It's like everyone is a cell in the body we call humanity, and when every cell is performing its unique function perfectly, then the whole body functions perfectly. It would be as if you were a liver cell, and I were a kidney cell, and Michael Beckwith were a heart cell, and Raymond Aaron were a brain cell, and if everyone were fully being themselves with no holdbacks, then the body would work perfectly. And to carry that metaphor out to the world, if everyone fully lived *their* highest vision, the world would work perfectly as well.

The last thing that Arnold Patent said to do was combine all of those previous parts into one sentence. So I ended up with "to inspire and empower people to live their highest vision in the context of love and joy." For 22 years now, that has been my stated life purpose, my deepest sense of myself, and what guides all of my behavior. I literally ask myself, is this project going to inspire and empower people to live their highest vision? If the answer is yes and I feel drawn to it, I'll participate. If it doesn't, I won't.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their life's purpose, what would it be?

Number one would be to look over your life both past and present and notice when you experienced the most joy. You see, I believe and teach that we all have an inner guidance system and it's our experience of joy. So when you're experiencing joy in the work you do, joy in your relationships, you're on track. You're on purpose. When you're walking

down the beach, and the experience of joy stops, then obviously you're being called to do something else in that moment like maybe go back home and read or write, talk to your friends or pet your cat.

The idea is that normally we can trust that if we're on track we'll be feeling excitement, enthusiasm and joy. There's an opening or an expansion that occurs. If we're feeling a contraction or feeling less than joy, then basically we're off course.

For me when I look back on the times when I was teaching, when I was coaching, when I was speaking, when I was creating products that had to do with expanding human potential and growth, I was really happy. When I'm doing other things, I'm not. So I can then say my purpose is to engage in teaching and coaching and training.

Let me give you an example. In my book, The Success PrinciplesTM, I write about a young woman named Julie Laipply, who was selected as Miss Virginia in the Miss America competition. When she was at Ohio State University, she was studying biology because as a kid she loved animals. Everyone would say, "Oh, you love animals so much you should be vet." However, while she was studying microbiology in England on a Rotary Fellowship, she realized she was miserable. So she asked herself, When was I happy? She was looking for some clues, and then she remembered. Whenever I was in a leadership role, when I was a student leader, when I went to the state leadership conventions for high school, and when I was at OSU and was chaperoning kids who had come to the campus as part of their leadership retreats—that's when I was really happy. She realized that she experienced the most joy out of leadership. So, she went back to OSU and said she wanted to create a new major that didn't yet exist. It would be a major in leadership by combining classes in psychology, journalism, media, and speech. Well, they let her do it, and it took an extra year for her to graduate. But by the time she was 26, she was working at the Pentagon and coaching highranking military officers in leadership. She had found her life purpose what the Buddhists call your "right livelihood" and the Hawaiians call your "kuliana"—, which was teaching leadership.

In my own life, when I look back to where I experienced the most joy, it was when I was learning about developing human potential and when I was conducting seminars and trainings, speaking about, and writing about what I had learned.

The other thing that people can do to discover their life purpose is to do the exercise I mentioned above, in which you write down the two words or qualities that you most enjoy expressing, the two ways that

you most enjoy expressing them and then add what would be happening in the world if it were working perfectly *according to you*. Then combine all of that into one sentence. Someone whose life purpose has to do with peace might say the world would be working perfectly if everybody were peacefully and harmoniously interacting with each other.

A recent attendee in one of my seminars who was a professional organizer wrote, "Everything would be well organized and working efficiently." So the way you see your ideal world, your definition of its perfection, is a mirror back to you about what your purpose is. The things that you get excited about, the things you get upset about are the things you care deeply about.

The third thing you can do is to look at your talents. Ask yourself, "What talents do I have?" You are given the talents you need to fulfill your life purpose. If your natural talents have to do with singing and dancing, then maybe your purpose is to be an entertainer. If your talents have to do with being someone who is intuitive and psychic, it may have to do with being a medical intuitive or doing psychic healing. If your talents have to do with easily and effortlessly persuading people, your life purpose may have to do with communication, sales, or leadership. So look at what talents you've been given and figure out clues they are giving you about what your purpose is. I find that to be really powerful pathway to clarity about your life purpose. We each have a set of what I call "core geniuses" that when we are expressing them, we find that success comes easily and effortlessly.

Who do you think you are?

I've decided my purpose is to inspire people to achieve their dreams, whatever those happen to be. It's important to realize there are two parts to that. I don't just want to inspire people, because a lot of people will feel good momentarily, but not take action or not know what action to take. So to complete my mission I not only have to set the fire underneath them, I have to show them the way.

What event or series of events led you to your discovery?

When I was a teenager, I decided that most of the world I saw around me was unhappy, and what I wanted to do at that time was to cheer them up. I took on this noble cause by deciding I wanted to write comedy, I wanted to write fiction, I wanted to write plays, I wanted to write humorous materials, I wanted to write jokes. I wanted to write things that would uplift people. And I did do that. I created magic tricks, jokes, some entertainment, and I had a play produced in 1979 that was a one-act comedy.

I saw that people did want to be happy, they wanted to laugh, they wanted to smile, but they also wanted to be inspired. I then realized that I didn't just want them to be inspired for the hour or two that they watched the comedy routine, I needed to give then the tools for success. That evolved into me become a self-help inspirational marketer.

I often refer to myself as a spiritual marketer because I've learned from many other milestones in my career, like my book *The Attractor Factor* doing so well, that people really want this. I've come to the conclusion that people like to be entertained, but what they want more than anything else is to feel good. They want to be inspired, they want to go for their dreams and achieve them, and they want to feel like a success.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for life's purpose, what would it be?

Look to what you truly love, and look to what you truly fear. Joseph Campbell said, "follow your bliss," and I often encourage people to follow what they love, to follow their passion, to follow their enthusiasm. I've also learned that if you look into the area of what you're afraid to do, you may uncover the thing that you are supposed to do.

I discovered that years ago when I came out with a book called, *Spiritual Marketing*, which I later re-wrote and re-titled *The Attractor Factor*. I was terrified. I really thought people would think I had lost my lid or something because I was talking about new age things, and creating your own reality, and the law of attraction; things that weren't really talked about before the movie *The Secret* had come out and swept the nation. I was really afraid of it. What I found is if I face my fears and come out with it, more often than not, the world will accept me. More often than not I will have greater applause and greater wealth from doing the very thing I fear.

I had been a conservative marketer for all those years, and I was hiding the spiritual side of myself. When I faced my fear and came out with *Spiritual Marketing*, which led to *The Attractor Factor*, which led me into being in the movie *The Secret*, which led to me being on *Larry King*, a whole long line of things occurred all because I faced my fears.

I would encourage people to look at what you really love to do, and look at what you really fear to do. Either one of those doors will lead to the same place, and that is your ticket to success.

Who do you think you are?

I am a multiplicity. I am made up of a conscious mind, a subconscious mind, a body, and a soul. Each part of me has its needs, functions, and dysfunctions. Each part of me needs to be listened to and accounted for. This is who I am.

What event or series of events led to your discovery?

I have been searching and seeking and am an ardent follower of personal growth for thirty-five years now. So I've put in a lot of work on myself. I have researched many different areas such as quantum physics, positive thinking, mind power, religion, psychology, medicine - anything that has something to do with the human mind. The mind is my specialty. I've written the number one best-selling book, *Mind Power Into The 21st Century*, which has sold over 2 million copies, so I've obviously hit a real note with people out there. I just devoted myself to understanding who I am and the nature of reality so I can effectively work with it.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their life's purpose, what would it be?

Follow your passion. That's the single most important thing that I can advise people to do, because following your passion is real and honest. I made a discovery years ago when I was doing research on my book *Money, Success & You*. What I discovered is that when someone's sole objective is just about making money, they almost always don't. The reason for that is because their whole aim is only money-oriented. Now there is nothing wrong with making money, I mean I am very wealthy myself, but to just go after the money without going after what you are most passionate about can lead you astray.

My advice is do what turns you on, follow what makes you passionate and what makes you excited. Do you wake up every day really excited about what you're doing? If you don't, then you're not passionate about what you're doing. Many people do make a living without being passionate about what they do, but they will never be tremendously successful. You must find something that you are passionate about.

The same is also true in your spiritual growth. It's important to find a system that awakens you, that feels right. It doesn't matter whether it's a traditional religion or a very esoteric practice that nobody knows, just find something that nurtures you deeply and follow it for as long as it nurtures you deeply. When it no longer nurtures you move on to something else.

At different phases of our lives, different things are appropriate to us. What was appropriate to us at twenty-five isn't necessarily appropriate to us at forty-five. Just follow your passion and follow what makes you feel alive. The model that I live by is simple: be kind, be aware, be positive, be joyful, do good work, and live life one day at a time. Do this and you will have a very successful life.

Who do you think you are?

I think that I'm not the "I." I think that I'm silence and bliss, absolute and unbounded eternal, never dying, unchanging, and one with all that is in unity. It's only my mind that gets in the way of me knowing who I am. I love what Nisargadatta Maharaj said, "That I am that."

How we come to that is different for everyone. It's interesting to hear how Nisargadatta Maharaj came to this. Let me share a quick story from his book *The Sense of "I am."*

When I met my Guru, he told me, "You are not what you take yourself to be. Find out what you are. Watch the sense I am, find your real Self." I obeyed him, because I trusted him. I did as he told me. All my spare time I would spend looking at myself in silence. And what a difference it made, and how soon!

My teacher told me to hold on to the sense "I am" tenaciously and not to swerve from it even for a moment. I did my best to follow his advice and in a comparatively short time I realized within myself the truth of his teaching. All I did was to remember his teaching, his face, and his words constantly. This brought an end to the mind; in the stillness of the mind I saw myself as I am — unbounded.

I simply followed (my teacher's) instruction, which was to focus the mind on pure being "I am," and stay in it. I used to sit for hours together, with nothing but the "I am" in my mind and soon peace and joy and a deep allembracing love became my normal state. In it all disappeared — myself, my Guru, the life I lived, the world around me. Only peace remained and unfathomable silence.

What event or series of events lead to your discovery?

When I was young I had a really tough life, but I always knew that there was something more. I started out happy, and then it started to get tough. When I was about 19 years old I was really deep into drugs, and I was thoroughly stuck. I called my brother up and cried over the phone (he was living in Los Angeles and I was living in Northern California). He said to me, "Janet, I just found something so wonderful, and don't worry, everything's going to be okay."

Four days later, I heard a knock on my door and it was my brother. He'd driven all the way up to Northern California with all of his belongings in his car. He packed me up and we moved to Santa Barbara. It was there that I learned how to meditate using the Transcendental Meditation® technique. That was really the beginning for me, when I experienced what they call an awakening (Being awake – Being more conscious).

I love what Maharishi Mehesh Yogi (founder of the Transcendental Meditation® program) said, "Meditation is the direct means of enjoying the greatest happiness, and it's the only means to quench the thirst for happiness on earth. Meditation is the only means to the harmonious development of the body, mind, and soul." I love this quote as well: "Meditation makes the man divine and brings the divine to the world of man."

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their life's purpose, what would it be?

I would say to find a meditation that allows you to transcend. And when I say transcend I mean go beyond the thinking process, go beyond the mind, and experience the source of thought, that state of unbounded awareness. It's that unified field where all knowledge comes from. If God said to me, "you can only take one thing in your life with you, and everything else has to go," there would be no doubt, it would be my meditation program. I have been practicing the TM® technique for 35 years now, and it really works for me. I would say to anyone, find a meditation practice that transcends the mind.

Another thing I would recommend is The Work of Byron Katie. The Work is a simple process of inquiry that teaches people how to identify and question the stressful thoughts that cause suffering. Suffering arises from the mind, and The Work is a way to understand what's hurting us. It's also way to end the suffering and the stress we have. I love this quote by Byron Katie: "I don't let go of my concepts. I meet them through inquiry and they let go of me."

The last thing is to take The Passion Test®. I am co-author of the book, *The Passion Test*, along with Chris Attwood, who is my ex-husband, one of my very best friends, and my business partner. It's a really easy process that aligns people with what they are passionate about, those things that are most important to them. Using the processes we teach in The Passion Test book, it effortlessly draws all of these things to you.

In our book we say, "Whenever you are faced with a decision, a choice, or an opportunity choose in favor of your passions. Choose in favor of what it is that you love." We also say, "What you love and God's will for you are one in the same." It's my experience that when I choose in favor of what brings me the greatest joy, what brings me the greatest happiness, everything else seems to fall into place. If I go in my mind and try to think, Okay what is right and what is wrong, I go absolutely crazy.

It's too big a field in that mind of mine. But when I just drop into what brings me the greatest joy, that's really easy for me, and I keep my attention on those things.

Maharishi Mahesh Yogi said, "Happiness radiates like the fragrance from a flower and draws all good things towards you. Allow your love to nourish yourself as well as others. Do not strain after the needs of life. It is sufficient to be quietly alert and aware of them. In this

way life proceeds more effortlessly and naturally. Life is here to enjoy."

This reminds me of a story that perfectly illustrates this point:

A young girl who collected autographs of famous people was at the airport waiting to board her plane when she saw a crowd of people standing around a small man in a white robe. She knew this man had to be someone well known because of the large crowd encircling him. She went up to one of the people standing nearby and asked who the man was. The reply she received was, "That's Maharishi Mahesh Yogi, a great saint from the Himalayas."

The girl excitedly ran up to Maharishi and immediately asked for his autograph. Maharishi took her pen and paper, looked her straight in the eyes, and said, "I will give you something much more important than my autograph." And on the piece of paper he wrote one word: **ENJOY.**

I truly believe that is exactly why we are here on this planet – to enjoy. When we really drop into the things that are truly from our heart, and we start seeing what we enjoy, then life becomes that state of bliss.

All of us have a special gift. All of us are unique. All of us are here to contribute our gifts in our own special way. When we do that, we experience the greatest possible joy and fulfillment in our own lives, and we spread that joy around to everyone we meet.

Who do you think you are?

I love that as a title. I used to write essays for the local newspapers when I was living in the state of Washington, and I actually wrote an essay with the same title, *Who Do You Think You Are?* When I saw the invitation to participate, I thought to myself, "Now that's going to be a cool title for a book."

It's a hard question to answer because we all have a lot of purposes. But really it does melt down into one, if you really think about it. I've tried to run away from this twice now and, luckily, I have people in my life that were bold enough to confront me and say, "You can't run away from this, it's going to just chase you down and haunt you." They were right. It did. I had to belly up to the bar and just do it on a large scale.

For the last 30 years, I would say my main purpose has been to talk to people and help them really get down deep into the core of their awareness to find out what extraordinary thinking is for them. What part

of them is open to that method of thinking? From here, they can seriously just look at what their motivations and options are for behavior.

My main calling, the thing that really lights up my heart and soul, is to be a writer and see that skill open doors for people. I want to see what extraordinary thought is all about. In essence, I want to open the doors to extraordinary thought through practical applications they can easily use every day. The way I write is especially conversational; it's very stream of consciousness, and that disarms readers. I think that the goal of my work is to help people change their minds, if they wish, and realize that it's going to change their lives. It also opens their hearts, which is critical to success in any area of life.

I think the basis of any extraordinary thinking is love, you know, truly walking it, talking it, being it, doing it, trusting it, and realizing that we're born of and to it. We are born to greatness, and the greatest thing we'll ever do is love people and love ourselves to the best of our abilities. More than likely, when this thing is all said and done, and we're at the end of it and everybody's eyes are wide open, we'll all be looking at each other and saying, "Wow, what was your lesson, what was my lesson? I think my mission was to love and allow myself to be loved."

What event or series of events led to your discovery?

Mostly, I think it was the way that I was raised. I actually ran away from home when I was fifteen. I had been abandoned by my mother at a much earlier age and was being raised by my father and my grandfather. I loved them, but desperately felt much was missing in my life. If I stayed, it would always be that way, as it had been for many before me. I had to go.

My grandfather was a man who had love dripping out of his pores. He and my father were both circuit-riding preachers and that meant that at any point in time they had four to five churches each. Granted, most of them were little country churches in Missouri that had maybe twenty-two members and they were all cousins, but I had to go there all the same. I followed my dad and grandfather through their journeys. They were both rebels, so I picked that up from them. That's why my books are called *The Rebel Writer* series. They were rebels that colored outside of the lines all their lives and I write and live outside of the lines, too.

My grandfather was like an angel to me. He was the one person that always reminded me that everything is about love, and that we're all more wonderful and more beautiful than we imagine. He taught me that we are all a product of our thoughts; so to make it easy, always think good thoughts. He was there for me when I needed someone. There were other people in my life that were extreme opposites of that. In my family history there has been tremendous turmoil. If I did not have extraordinary thinking and my grandfather's love to count on, I don't know how I would have made it.

It's been a rough ride for some of my siblings and for me, at times. I think it's hard when you're a preacher's kid and granddaughter and you're taught all these things about love, but because you're in so much pain you don't really apply them. My grandfather was the shining light, a true rebel, and when we moved away my dad tried his best to keep everything together, but there was deep and unresolved hurt and such pain running through the entire family from divorce, betrayal, things we all deal with. My mother had abandoned her kids and there were a lot of us. As hard as my family tried to downplay it, that had an effect on our thoughts. Also, we lived in unbelievable poverty when I was growing up, and that can make you feel poor all of your life if you do not get a hand over your thinking.

Even though I saw all that pain, I could always see beyond it. I was constantly in the middle of everything saying, "Can't we all just get along?" Just like Rodney King. The bottom line was, *no*; that just wasn't going to happen. I wanted to focus on what was really important but no one was listening.

In the end, siblings made the choice to hold onto their anger, their pain, their victimhood, and their "I was abandoned" thoughts. They chose to clutch onto all of that with gusto, and I don't think they realized (and maybe they still don't) that it becomes a prayer. That's an affirmation; it's a structure they built a house on. Holding on to such things will define you, your relationships, and how you live. Consequently, they've had truly difficult issues and, for the most part, I haven't had as much because I left all that behind. I'm not sure exactly why I ran away at 15, but it was the single most important thing I ever did thus far. Maybe I just walked very fast to find comfort that I felt was lacking. I made a rebel choice.

I can remember being thirteen and knowing that I was going to leave. No one believed me. I knew there was going to be a time when they'd wake up and say, "Oh wow, where'd she go?" I recall sitting on the steps at my dad's house in a little country town in Missouri on a summer day. My sister had just graduated high school that afternoon and I recall thinking to myself, "When I walk away from all this, I'm really

walking away from *all* the negatives, too. I'm going to build a new life. I'm going to become a new person and I'm going to live a new way. If I learn anything from all of this, I'm going to share it, and I'm going to write about it."

I wanted to go to L.A. and work with actors, musicians, writers, and directors and talk to them to learn their ideas. I wanted to seriously communicate with them, find out what their thoughts were, and I did that. I walked away from all the unconstructive stuff to start anew. Later, I tried to heal the family relationships but there just wasn't an opening to do that. Leaving home was my turning point, and I think the biggest lesson was this: you *have* to make a choice. You really can't have it both ways, or serve two masters, as they say. I realized that my mom left because she could not breathe and could not fly. I had done the same thing. Today, it is easy for me to fly out of any dark reality.

I choose not to focus on the negative in my childhood. There have been a few people that have read my books and wanted to make public comment about how sad my childhood was, but I don't allow it. To me, it was such a tremendous gift. It is a treasure and I honor and respect this truth. I could not get seen or heard, of course, but that taught me to find my own voice. Still, I don't ever want to say that bad things happened to me. I really believe that the universe used all of my past for good. When I was twelve years old I was taught that before you go to sleep at night you say your prayers, so I would always kneel down by my bedside and say my prayers. I would say, "Use me as an instrument. I'm not going to ask you to heal all this other stuff, just use me, use me up, use me."

It's been a little tricky in the sense that I have not done the public life as well as I wanted to. I'm a lot better about it now. I'm much more open. Previously, when I reached a peak of "fame," I walked away. I've faded away twice in the last thirty years and took the time MIA reviewing my thoughts, intentions, and lifestyle. During that time of reflection, I've received a lot of support from the celebrity community. Most of my friends are celebrities, which has been very interesting, to say the least. It has ups and downs. I've seen what has happened to them in the fame game and I probably had the feeling that I was going to lose something of myself in the process, as they had.

It was actually my daughter that ultimately said, "Wait a minute Mom, walk your talk here. No one can take anything away from you unless you let them. You know that. So, just go out there and knock that wall down and whatever comes, comes" That's where I've been for quite awhile now. Each day, fame knocks, I answer with a smile, and I'm more at peace with that in my soul.

I estimate that the events that shaped me in my childhood were simple things. I saw what I didn't want to be; the ways I didn't want to live; the things I didn't want to do, and then it was up to me to dig down deep inside and discover how to get past old programs. I had to use all of my experiences for good as a powerful tool instead of turning myself into a victim and believing that I couldn't do any better than what I'd known. I couldn't allow myself to surrender to such dark images. Instead, I surrendered to love. I found out that there was a gift inside of me that had never been opened, so I opened it myself. It is my prayer that many others across the globe use my work to open the gift that they are to the world.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their life's purpose, what would it be?

My grandmother used to always say, "Where there's a will, there's a way." I really believe that's true. I talk to a lot of people on a daily basis and I hear a flood of can't-itus! It's caused, by saying over and over "I can't, I can't, I can't." I believe that our thoughts are things and they're exceptionally powerful. Our thoughts are our prayers for what we want. Be extremely mindful!

I would also say, "Change your mind, change your world." Where there's certainly a will there's absolutely a way, and there will be a way even if you don't see it right now. As long as you trust that it will be shown to you, you can't miss it. When you come to the table of life

prepared to stand in that space and arrive ready, it's going to be shown to you. You will find the way. You'll be led on that path, and your job is to just be open and watching like a hawk. Be exceedingly clear about what you want and what you need, and allow the universe to be in you, for you, through you, as you, and to guide you. Surrender to that. Trust and act accordingly.

This universe will shape itself around your thoughts; that's the truth. Keep your thoughts clean; keep the weeds out of your garden. Don't give in to the naysayers. Don't allow that, because they'll give you a hundred reasons why something shouldn't work. So many of us are born with gifts and deep desires, and if anything is tugging at you in that way, it's a signal and you've got to pay attention to it in earnest.

I tried to walk away from writing, especially rebel writing, but it was just so hard to live with such a decision because the need inside me to write was always burning. I was driven to do it, and particularly to write about extraordinary thinking. A friend, Julian Lennon, has talked about this and what it was like for him when he took a sabbatical from his music for a few years. At the time he walked away from it he was thinking, I'll never go back to it; I'll never do that again. But, in the end, it just hounded him. It burned in his soul and he had to return to it.

I suppose I just want people to know that if they have that deep inner urge, that tug, that pull, that something inside that's very strong, the worst thing you can do is not do it. I'd love people to remember that they were given the passion inside of them for a reason. It was to use it. If you do have to take a break, don't beat yourself up, but don't take too long. Hurry back!

Who do you think you are?

So many people are still searching for their answer to that question, and the business that I am in is helping people to find their passion. I found my passion when I was a very young girl, and my passion is helping others be the very best they can be. The mistake I made was that I had to change that later in life to helping others *and* myself to be the best we can be! You see if you don't help yourself along the way, you may start getting resentful toward the people who you're helping.

I thought everybody's passion was the same. I thought everybody wanted to help others be the best they could be, and give them all the information they could give, and I found out that is not a true statement at all. That's why I wrote the book, *What Should I Do When I Grow Up? Now that I'm 40 50 60.* I finally realized that we just keep getting older and asking the same question, now what?

What event or series of events lead to your discovery?

Owning an executive recruiting firm, asking and interviewing people, and really understand where they were coming from. I was a school teacher and I would watch these little children light up when they got the "Ah Ha" about their passions or what they wanted to do or be. It was the same in the office. I would ask an adult what they were best at, or what their natural abilities were, what would they really want to do if they didn't have to earn money? Then I kept remembering what a joy it was and how pleasurable it was for me to watch them discover their passion. I've always been the queen of asking the right questions, and in the book I call them purposeful questions.

If you could give advice to someone who is still searching for their life's purpose, what would it be?

Well the answer is so obvious to me because it's what I've tried to put together for twenty years while I'm interviewing people. You have to understand yourself as well as you possibly can, and know who you are. The way that you do that is by asking the right kind of questions of yourself. You can even ask living questions (living with the question about yourself for a week) and keep on figuring it out. What you need to do is to find the ingredients to your passion and to the next chapter in your life.

For me there were about seven different points to my ingredients. Once I found those ingredients, as I walked into the first position that I interviewed for, I knew I was at home, and I knew I would be successful because it had all my ingredients.

In my book, I have about one hundred and twenty questions that help people to discover what their passions are. For example, one question is "what was your favorite job that you've ever had, and why?"

People will say things like, "Well, when I was sixteen years old I worked retail, and I didn't get paid anything, but I loved it."

I say, "Oh really...why?"

"Well, everybody left me alone. I was on my own."

You can see that person wants independence. That's one of their ingredients. It's just about asking questions like that, and finding out what the key ingredients are. I came up with a process of how somebody can do that. It's such a good feeling to know that if they ask the right questions, explore their passions, their obstacles, their desires, and natural abilities then they'll find out what is right for them.

Who do you think you are?

I have a variety of purposes in my life. I'm a father, a husband, and a grandfather. In terms of my interaction with the world, I make a difference by bringing greater awareness to how people can live with greater integrity in congruency with who they truly are as loving human beings.

I'm most famous for my work in personal relationships between men and women. But my whole life has been committed to personal growth and developing my inner potential; so that I could assist others in developing their full potential. I wanted myself and others to be fulfilled in life, to create a life of abundance, a life of love and a life of service. Throughout my life, my primary focus has been in the service of others. My success wasn't a complete surprise. I had always wanted to be successful, but more importantly I wanted to be of service and be successful at that. My notoriety has come through one of my talents, which is to assist men and women in understanding their differences so they can find greater peace and love in their relationships. I truly believe that is a foundation for people to create a more fulfilling life outside their homes as well.

What event or series of events led you to your discovery?

I had an epiphany at age nine when I saw the movie War and Peace. It was after that movie that I had an experience of expanded awareness of the world being a very divine place with light shining all around me. I knew that I was here for a purpose and that purpose was to contribute to bringing peace into this world. That experience has been forgotten many times, but it is the foundation of who I am and what I hope to achieve throughout my lifetime: to bring greater peace into this world of turmoil, Love is greatly needed, as well as consciousness, chaos, and hate. awareness of how we consistently create our own problems rather than accessing our potential to solve them. This was reinforced when I went to a lecture on Transcendental Meditation in 1969. At that lecture I heard that meditation was a tool for developing your full potential as well as creating peace in the world. I thought wow, this is really great! It harmonized with a chord in my heart, which wanted me to be all that I could be, to bring peace into the world, and to make a difference.

I began studying under the Maharishi, who founded the Transcendental Meditation Movement. He was a huge influence on me because he was somebody who was actually out there doing it. During the time I worked for him, he developed one of the biggest personal growth organizations at that time. It was international, millions of people were participating in the programs. I was a part of organizing all that as his student and personal assistant.

Over the years, I developed a teacher-training program with him to train teachers of Transcendental Meditation. After nine years of

studying with him, I moved on into my own life to find something that I personally had to contribute. I didn't know what that was, but I gradually became aware of how I could apply my talents differently from the way he had and still contribute to the world in a big way. That has been my motivation ever since.

If you could give advice to people that are still searching for their life's purpose, what would that be?

Keep your heart open, be true to yourself, and continue to follow your heart even when it doesn't look like things are falling into place the way you want them to. There were a series of events in my life that didn't seem positive, but actually ended up leading me in a positive direction. For example, the nine years I spent with the Maharishi were very fulfilling. Yet during that time I wanted to help my brother, who was bi-polar, through meditation and yoga. I thought that doing meditation and yoga might help, but it didn't. When this didn't help him, I stopped.

I left the TM Movement and moved back to California to study psychology, in an attempt to help my brother in his plight. I was unable to do that successfully before he committed suicide. It did put me on a new path, however, which was to study psychology, and to begin applying psychology. While I was hoping to help my brother, I discovered a talent for counseling couples. I could have never foreseen that I would go from being a celibate yogi (Indian term for monk) to becoming an expert in personal relationships.

You never know what's around the next corner in your life. You just have to keep following what you feel to be true, and what's most important to you, and the universe will support you, but not always in the ways you think it should.

Who do you think you are?

I think that evolves a lot for people over time, based on life experiences and how we contribute to the lives of others. Right now, I think I'm a guy who cares about improving how people work and how they work with each other. That can take many different forms. I've always thought of myself as the mirror rather than the light. I've discovered how to enable people to contribute to the world in ways they may not have imagined, and to become more effective at what they do and how they work with each other. That's my mission right now. It would be interesting to ask people that question at different times in their lives, and see if they still saying the same thing over a long period of time.

What event or series of events led to your discovery?

I grew up around a great deal of scarcity. Early in my life, I found myself on a path that people would consider traditional success. I really wanted to gain business power and make money, because that was never in my family. That was not a possibility for us when I was growing up. I was able to start an early business career, and as I did that and had some early success, I discovered that people who had business success were not any less dysfunctional than I was. They would be suffering in a sense of betrayal of success, where the traditional definition of success was money, fame and power. That's what it actually says in the dictionary, amazingly enough. What people find is that there is usually a betrayal of those values, and that's not really what drives your success in the first place. It's certainly not what gives it meaning or purpose in your life.

I've come to a place in my life where I believe that this is the highest and best use of my time, and I can make a contribution in terms of being able to help you determine what your purpose is. The secret to success is finding meaning, finding what you can contribute to others, and combining those with some core passion, then turning that into action. Those are the ingredients people are looking for. I think people have to find their own sense of success rather than relying on others to define it for them, which is usually the default in people's lives.

I started an early career in the investment business on Wall Street and now I've ended up teaching, writing, and speaking all over the world about how to create success that's built to last.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their life's purpose, what would it be?

Stop and think how you define success in your life? Personally. Not a politically correct answer and not the answer that you're supposed to give your boss. We did a worldwide success survey with people who have had a big impact in their field for at least twenty years or more. What we found that was universal among all of them was that there are three essential dimensions to the definition of success.

The first, as I stated above, is doing something that really mattered to them. Usually we get sidetracked. For instance, I was talking to Warren Buffet, one of the world's greatest living investors and one of the world's richest people, and he said that people come to him all the time asking him for career advice. They'll say they've found a core business that they want to do, and maybe have an action plan, but the passion is often missing from their plan. They say, "I'll do this because it's the right thing to do for a few years, then I'll get back to doing something that I really love." Then two, three, or five years will pass, and they'll check in again and they'll discover that they're still not doing what they're passionate about. "I'll do that in my next job," they'll say, "Or maybe in my next company or with my next promotion."

Warren said, "Mark, living your life always putting your passion off until later is like saving up sex for old age. It's a really bad idea." What we found is that it's not just something that gives you less enjoyment in your life, it's the one thing that makes the difference between those people who have an average experience in life and those who are able to contribute greatly to a career or profession for a long period of time.

They found some higher purpose, something that really mattered to them, and they care about having an impact on other people. Then they found a way to pull all of that together by creating goals and objectives to accomplish it.

It was all about purpose, passion, and a sense of performance (being able to get things done). I wish I had learned that earlier in life. Anyone who's even thinking about making a run at a successful career should abandon being advised, in a sense, by other people. No one can tell you what matters to you and what your core passion should be. They can help you in the process of putting your goals together or learning how to achieve goals, and that's a really important skill. But those other two pieces were really important to those successful people. The outcome was sometimes money, fame, power or traditional success, but it never

really came in a lasting way until they started with something intensely personal that had meaning to them. That is my universal suggestion for getting involved with something that's going to give you a long-term success built to last.

Who do you think you are? What is your purpose?

I'm here to eradicate the burden of emotional fears. I'm here to support people in understanding how fear operates in their lives, and I'm here to set the world free. I have a particular view of fear that no one else has. I see the world through the eyes of fear of freedom. I see fear as the number one reason the world exists the way it does, in our frustrations and unhappiness. It's the reason that we don't have access to our passions, and the reason we don't have access to our purpose, because we are afraid to see it. When somebody understands how fear operates, they can then begin a relationship with fear that no longer stops them but actually propels them. It's really about creating a relationship with fear that moves somebody to the next place.

What events or series of events led to your discovery?

When I was fourteen years old, my father murdered my mother and committed suicide in front of me, and it took me twenty years to recover from that day and what had preceded it. I started going to therapy, doing workshops, reading books, and nothing really helped me get past the barriers that I perceived in front of me. So I started creating my own exercises, basically to save my own life. That is the premise of Fearless Living and the premise of what I teach. Once I understood that I didn't have a list problems, I really only had one challenge and one opportunity (which was to understand and master fear), then my life took off and blossomed. My whole world really began to make sense.

Most people think they have lots of problems and they think they're not good enough. I'm here to support people in embracing their humanity, because fear has stopped us from doing that. I had to learn how to embrace my own humanity to save my own life.

After my third suicide attempt, I was leaving the hospital and I realized that I'm not very good at killing myself. I thought to myself, "If I'm going to stay on this earth, which I wasn't really thrilled about, I had better figure out a better way to do it." I realized that fundamentally I didn't think I was good enough. I think this is the message that most of us receive at some point and buy into, and therefore don't follow our purpose and passion.

The very first exercise I did was to get a calendar and some stars. Do you remember back in kindergarten when you did something right they would give you a star? I decided that every time I did something kind, loving, good, or something that hard for me, I would put a star on the calendar. I wanted to see if there was still something good in me because I had been telling myself that I wasn't good enough for so long. After a month, I had a calendar filled with stars. And that was my turning

point. I realized that I was waiting for the world to acknowledge me when I had not even acknowledged myself.

One of my core beliefs is that our willingness to acknowledge ourselves on a daily basis builds our self-confidence and self-esteem giving us the courage to take the risks that we really want to take. When you acknowledge yourself on a daily basis, you now have permission to go to places you never thought were possible. I ask people to acknowledge themselves a minimum of five times a day, and to do what I call stretch, risk, or die. You must acknowledge yourself for something that's uncomfortable, not just for going to the gym if you already do that every day. It doesn't have to be an action; it could be a new thought. Just a new thought is scary for some people. You'll know you're fearless when you're willing to be comfortable being uncomfortable. That's the name of the game! If you are comfortable being uncomfortable, then your feeling of being uncomfortable, which is fear based, no longer stops you.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their life's purpose, what would it be?

The answer to that question has already been revealed to you and the only reason you can't see it is because fear is covering up your ability to actually access it. Everybody has passion, everybody has a purpose, everybody has a life force within them, and everyone has what I call an essential nature that is attempting to express itself at every turn. You either express that essential nature through freedom, fearlessness, or it gets thwarted by fear. So if you're not living your purpose, if you're not expressing your passion, then you're not self-expressing, you're not accepting your self, and part of that is you're not embracing your humanity. You're caught up in the fear-based mentality of "I'm not good enough" and you're waiting for the world to give you permission.

The bottom line is this: the only thing stopping you is fear. When you start to realize that no one is stopping you, no thing is stopping you, no thought is stopping you, and no behavior is stopping you, it's just fear, then the shame fades away, and the fear moves aside, and you're able to listen to what's waiting to be heard for your ears alone. Fear keeps a bunch of wax in your ears.

Most people aren't doing the work to eradicate fear. What they're doing is trying to find their purpose and passion, but too many people do not have the purpose and passion that's really right for them. They were given to them by somebody else, because they don't understand that fear

made the choice for them. Unless you really have a relationship with fear, unless the fear becomes a good friend, and you understand how it operates, fear will make your decisions for you.

Who do you think you are?

What a powerful question. Who I am is the same thing that, in my experience, all of us are: infinite, eternal, unbounded, without limits, without restrictions of any kind. I think the miracle of this is that discovery at my own deepest nature.

It's as if I created this game for myself in which I allowed myself to forget what I've known before. Since I have this infinite potential, I created the forgetfulness to forget who and what I really am, what my real nature is, and created a world in which I have the opportunity to

rediscover who I really am. I created within this experience a world that appears to exist, and all the clues along the way are there to guide me along the path.

I created books to teach me, I created teachers, mentors, and masters to give me direction. It's a more and more amazing and miraculous experience as that nature of who I am becomes more and more expressed. I've come to the conclusion that the process never stops and because of being infinite, there is no end.

Some people may say, "Well, who do you think you are? God?" Some would even say harsher things. When I speak in these terms it is not the "I" which has been given the name "Chris Attwood." It's the "I" at the level where God, the Creator, and the creation are no longer separate. I, Chris Attwood, don't think I've created this world with all that's in it. I, that is present everywhere, at all times, and in every moment, has done this creating. That "I" realizes the sense of separation and differences is an illusion I have created in my own infinite nature with my own infinite power.

The "I" who is called "Chris Attwood" seems to have arrived at being okay with everything that is and being okay with every experience that is. Do you know the story of Hansel & Gretel? The kids were carried away by the evil witch and they left breadcrumbs along the way so that they could find their way home.

I've come to realize that the breadcrumbs that each of us has left for ourselves, are the things that we love, the things that we care about, the things that matter most to us. It's no accident that we love the things we love; it's no accident that we care about the things we care about. Those, in fact, are the things that we've created to lead us back to who we really are, to our own true nature. These things help us to rediscover that, and allow them to blossom in their full glory and delight. I've come to realize that the only job that any of us has, is just to live in a state of joy and fulfillment, and to do that in every moment and in every experience that comes up in this apparent life that we are living.

One of the things I love about this body-mind called "Chris Attwood" is this particular personality loves having fun. In fact, *The Passion Test* is all about discovering what matters to one in one's life, what it is that one loves the most, what one cares about the most, and then aligning one's life with that, following those breadcrumbs I spoke of earlier. What I love most is having fun with everything, and it's such an adventure to discover how to have fun with every experience, whatever

it may be, even the experiences I have labeled as "bad" in the past, or as not being evolutionary, or as not being helpful.

The path of discovery of who "I" am is the pathless path. One of the interesting paradoxes of life, this apparent world that we've created, is that opposites exist simultaneously all the time. As a result, it's not possible for the intellect to be able to reconcile them. One is the idea that I am infinite, eternal, and unbounded and yet at the same time I experience myself as bounded, limited, and living within the context of a world with apparent rules and natural laws. Yet both things exist simultaneously and the only way for us ultimately to come to a place of peace with who we really are is to be able to let go of the intellect and simply experience both realities simultaneously, as both are expressions of the nature of who "I" am.

What event or series of events led to your discovery?

For me the path began when I went to University. I went to the University of California, Santa Barbara and lived in a place called Isla Vista, right next to the University. It was a time of great upheaval in America and in the world. The Vietnam War was going on and in Isla Vista there was a big structure in the middle of town, which was the Bank of America building. It had been built like a fortress.

Within a few months of my arrival at the university there was a big outrage for a variety of reasons. Thousands of students went out onto the streets and some of them broke down the door of the Bank of America and burned it to the ground. All night there were people clashing with police and there was a lot of drama.

I was there trying to figure out what was going on and what my part was in it. At one point I thought, "Well what really matters to me, what I'm really committed to, is to making a significant and positive difference in this world and changing the way in which people relate to each other." What I was seeing there was war, a battlefield in the streets of this university town, and I thought there had to be some better way. So I worked very hard and I became part of the resolution. As the Planning Director for the Community Council, I helped to create some great projects.

But I was soon full of stress, overwhelmed by everything, and there was so much responsibility thrust on me at the age of twenty. I didn't know how to handle it. One of my friends told me about this thing called Transcendental Meditation® and suggested that I go hear a lecture

about it. He said it was a great way of eliminating stress, so I said, "Okay, that sounds good."

I went and listened to the lecture. They presented the first scientific research studies that had been done on meditation. I decided to learn the TM technique. From the first time I closed my eyes, I noticed there were some very significant differences in my experience. Over the next three days they told us about higher states of consciousness and the ability to go deep within and to experience aspects of reality that maybe had never been activated before.

To be frank, at that time I thought it was all a bunch of bologna. But, I could tell something was happening and so I continued to practice the technique and chose not to worry about anything else. Over the next year I practiced TM regularly, but I was still working sixteen, eighteen, twenty hours a day and was still dedicated to transforming the world.

In the next year some remarkable things happened. I was able to accomplish projects that I never thought I could accomplish before. I was able to get the whole community re-zoned and get students bus rides without charge, or for a low monthly fee. I was able to gather thousands of people for various projects. It was a very dramatic time for me.

As I continued to meditate, I noticed an increasing level of calmness and ease with everything that was going on, even with these very big and seemingly major events. After a while, I stumbled upon the opportunity to get some advanced training, and I ended up becoming a teacher of the Transcendental Meditation® program. After being a TM teacher for a time, I went back out into the world to get a job.

I ended up getting a position as a bookkeeper for \$5 per hour at a firm that sold government securities as investments.. I decided I wanted to learn everything about what that company did, and after just nine months on the job, I became President of the company. I got to a point where I realized that as much as I was achieving in the world something in my life was still lacking. It wasn't deeply fulfilling to me, but I continued to meditate through it all.

One day I thought to myself, maybe it's time for me to take some time off. I actually ended up taking ten years off, and I participated in a program of extended meditation. I spent ten years meditating anywhere from four to eight hours a day and I began studying the Vedic literature of India. This ancient literature provided profound insights about who I am, about the nature of life, about the structure of creation, and the structure of life. That was an amazing time.

Coming out of that I quickly re-immersed myself in the world. During my "time off" there was a program of celibacy, so I hadn't been in any relationship at all for ten years. Within a few months I married, and five years later I got a divorce. I went through a series of jobs that my mind told me I could do, and I was able to do reasonably well, but they were not things that I loved to do.

After about eight years, I finally began to rediscover the things I really enjoyed doing. I was able to go back to working in a way that fulfilled me and I enjoyed great success for a while. Then I realized it was time to take a break again, so I went back to the previous program for a year.

After another year of extended TM practice, I was introduced to a woman by the name of Byron Katie and "The Work." I was introduced to The Work through my ex-wife Janet, who is now my business partner and co-authored *The Passion Test* with me. Katie created a very simple process of self-investigation she calls "The Work," and doing this simple process I found myself very quickly investigating the truth of concepts and ideas that I had held to be true for a long time. It was through this process of investigation that I came to let go of beliefs that had previously prevented me from being able to really experience and enjoy life.

In the Vedic Literature there is a reference to things that are called Vasanas. It's a Sanskrit term essentially meaning habits, the mental, physical, and emotional habits that we form. The Vedic literature talks about good Vasanas and bad Vasanas. Bad Vasanas may be things like addictions, alcoholism or drug use, the things that don't help us to understand or to realize our own nature.

Good Vasanas are habits that help and support us in coming to realize who we really are. Good Vasanas are things that many of us have heard of or maybe already do, like yoga, breathing exercises, meditation, going to bed at a reasonable hour, or getting up early. The whole field of Ayurveda, the ancient system of health in the Vedic literature, is built upon the concepts of good Vasanas, things that support our health and support our experience of life.

In the Vedic literature there is a statement that good Vasanas are helpful, and are useful along the path to realization of the self with a big 'S.'Yet, in the end, liberation requires letting go even of the good Vasanas. Letting go means letting go of our attachment to them, letting go of our belief that these things are necessary or required for us to live a happy, fulfilled, or joy-filled life, that these things are somehow necessary for us to know who we really are.

That has been the story for me, coming to recognize over and over again this play of consciousness, this play of the mind, and then the process of letting go and letting go and letting go and letting go over and over and over and over again.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their life's purpose, what would it be?

The first thing I would say is to recognize that it's not an accident that you love the things you love. I said this earlier, but it's such an important point that you love and care about the things you do.

These things are important to you for a reason, and are the things that will allow you to live your purpose in life. These are the things that will allow you to discover who you are and to be able to live your life in joy. Your job in this incarnation is to live in joy, and to align your life with what you love most. Doing this provides a very simple yet profoundly powerful method of getting clear on what's most important.

The second thing I would encourage people to do is to find a means, a technique, a tool, or a mechanism that allows you to transcend the field of duality. As long as the mind remains in that field, and we remain in the field of illusion, we will remain in the field of what is not real. It's only by transcending that field and going beyond that field that we're able to experience who we really are, which is beyond the pairs of opposites. For me that technique has been the Transcendental Meditation® program. It's a very profound process. There are an infinite number of ways that one can transcend the field of duality, to go beyond the experience of separation, the experience of this and that.

The third thing I would say is to investigate the thoughts, which keep you feeling separate. Investigate the thoughts that create suffering or unhappiness in your life. As long as you still find yourself suffering, it means that you're holding on to some belief or concept that is not true for you. The fact is, when we argue with reality we always lose. Investigating our thoughts means investigating what is really true for us. It's amazing that when we ask questions the mind searches and will give us the answers. So it's just really a matter of asking the right questions.

For me The Work of Byron Katie has been a powerful tool for that, because Katie's process of investigation is so simple. It's just four questions and what she calls a turn-around. Those four simple questions can be used to investigate any thought that brings unhappiness - Is it true? Can I absolutely know that it is true? How do I react when I have that thought? Who would I be without that thought?

These questions allow you to go deeply within and get to what's really true, because the nature of who we are is the expression of opposites. Investigate the thoughts that keep you separate because when you investigate these thoughts you'll discover that the opposite of what you believe is as true, or possibly truer, than what you believed.

When you discover that the opposite of what you were telling yourself could also be true, then it opens you up, it creates a bridge of compassion between both those pairs of opposites. When the thoughts that have been causing suffering are in the emotional field, investigation creates a true bridge of compassion that connects us with everything and everyone around us.

The fourth thing is what Janet and I call 'Nature's Guidance System.' Nature's Guidance System is simply that we have created within ourselves the ability to know what the correct direction to take with our life is at every moment. The way we know it is by how we feel.

All of us know what it feels like to feel expanded. At those points we feel full, we feel happy, we feel turned-on, we're loving, kind, compassionate, and generous. Those things are a signal we've created for ourselves to show us that we're on the path of purpose, on the path of discovering our own nature, on the path of discovering the reason that we live in this world and this life to begin with.

We also know what it's like when we feel contracted, when we feel shut down, when we feel the opposite of loving. We feel separated and disconnected and anxious and worried and frustrated and angry and all those things that we generally label as bad feelings, or uncomfortable feelings. Yet those things are no more bad or good than the experience of day and night. When it's daytime outside do we say, "Oh, this is a bad thing, it needs to become night"? Or when it's night out do we say, "Oh, that's a bad thing, it needs to become day"?

No, of course we don't, because we understand that those are just different phases of life. These feelings (what I call expansion and contraction) are neither good nor bad, they're simply messages or signals to us. They're signals of what we are to do in that moment. So, 'Nature's Guidance System' is the realization that sometimes you feel expanded and sometimes you feel contracted and neither is good nor bad. They're simply messages allowing you to know that when you feel it's time to take a break, it's time to rest, or it's time to go ahead, take action and enjoy the fruits of that.

Life is a miracle. It's here for our delight and enjoyment. Whenever there is a time that it doesn't appear that way to us, then we're being guided to go deeper, to step back and reevaluate.

The real miracle of life is that the infinite, unbounded, nature of life means that every single one of us have the ability to experience our own nature as that same infinite, unbounded potential of life and to enjoy the delight of having all possibilities available to us. Wow! How cool is that?

Who do you think you are?

I think that will be a question that I continue to for answer the rest of my life as I believe self-discovery is an eternal mission. At this point, who I am is really simple; "I am" is me. I've spent so much of my life comparing myself to other people, trying to meet external standards, or chasing expectations to figure out who I am, so it's such a relief to be at this point and say: Who I am is Christine and that's it!

What event or series of events led to your discovery?

Disappointment's led me to my discovery. I am not a big risk taker. I like to play it safe, and live life according to a plan. I have always been fairly Type A - the kind of person that makes my bed every day and has a place for everything. But life had a different plan than the one I envisioned for myself.

I had planned to have a great career and I did everything I was supposed to do. I did really well in high school, went to a prestigious university college, built up my resume in college so much I had to type it in seven-point font just to fit it on one page. Then I moved out to L.A. to pursue my dream of working in the entertainment business. I worked my way up to being one of the youngest agents ever. I was a television literary agent representing writers and directors at the age of twenty-five, sitting in my beautiful office in Beverly Hills, with an assistant who sat outside my office, and I hated it. And I hated who I was becoming – stressed out, competitive, irritable, and void of any sense of self.

At that point, the answer to "who do you think you are" would have been, "a bitch." I had a bad attitude and I didn't like that about myself. I hated my job and I didn't know what to do. I realized that trying to make myself feel more confident had perpetuated my whole career path, and the entertainment industry was the adult version of the popular crowd that I was never a part of as a kid. That's why I was drawn to the industry. When I realized that I didn't like what I was doing, I was confronted with the questions "who am I and what do I really want?"

Another humbling experience was getting engaged. Again, I did everything the way I thought you're "supposed" to do it. We dated, lived together, talked about all the topics you're supposed to discuss when you're dating – like religion, family, finances, and so on - and then got engaged. Six months before the wedding my fiancé said, "I'm not marrying you, sorry." Career disappointment and a broken engagement were not major traumas compared to what others have had to endure during life, but they really did shake me, because I didn't expect them. Life wasn't going according to my plan!

I started to realize that who I was trying to become was a version of something I thought I was supposed to be. The result of this was that I wasn't authentic at all. I was just trying to play a role that I had scripted for myself without having enough information about what I really wanted out of my life.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their life's purpose, what would it be?

Once I started to really looking within, instead of externally, for my purpose, I discovered an intense pull to the possibility of all people loving themselves and their lives – but I had to start with me. I had to learn how to like myself and like my life independent of what I was doing or who I was with. Not comparing my life and myself with other people, not trying to live up to some standard, not trying to chase expectations, and knowing that external things could never quench my thirst. I believe that knowing your purpose and true happiness can only be discovered when you not only love yourself and your life but you actually like it too.

The advice I would give anyone who is searching for their purpose is to look in rather than out, look at the life you have and see if you can fall in love with it and yourself in the process. Then see if you can really like it. When you start there, the rest of your life unfolds in a magical way, and it mirrors what you're feeling on the inside. This is the whole principle of the Law of Attraction! If I'm really liking and loving myself and my life, then I attract more of the type of things into my life.

Now, I can't say that I practice this at 100%. I have days where I'm extremely hard on myself and I'm critical, or I look at someone else's life and say, "I want that." Then I realize what I am attracted to about their life is their happiness. So I gently remind myself, "Wait a second, this is your life, you only get one shot at it and you might as well like what you've got because it's much more enjoyable when you do."

I like to think of the word inspire – INspire comes from INside. A lot of us say that we want to inspire others, but in order to do that, we have to feel something inspirational inside of ourselves first. Inspiration and our sense of who we are cannot come from ego, stuff, money, or a really great speech. It's comes from something deeper – a much, much bigger. And the best news is, we all have it inside of ourselves, we just have to commit to rediscovering it and reminding ourselves of who we truly are.

Featured frequently as a guest lecturer at colleges and universities and making regular appearances on TV news programs, Sliwa's message is one of hope, combined with a healthy dose of common sense.

Who do you think you are?

As a youngster, I never perceived that I was here to develop self, to have worldly possessions, or to dedicate myself to improving myself. I was born into an old-style hard-core European Roman Catholic arena in which I was weaned on the fact that poverty and lack of resource would bring you closer God, and that we are all God's children here to serve others, those who can least help themselves.

I realized at a very young age that I was in good physical shape, and had control of my mental faculties. I would always say, "But for the

grace of God there could be I," the person without an arm, the person who is feeble, the person who is not in control of their mental or physical capacities, the person who is homeless, the person who is destitute. I always looked at the glass being half full, as opposed to many who would believe that it was half empty.

As I matured and became more educated and worldly, I recognized that armed with some of the human resources that I had been provided with either because of genetics, care, input, understanding, or my parents and extended families desire to mold me that I had a mission to undertake, even though I had no idea what that mission was.

There was a definite natural draw to say that whatever time I would spend in this world would have to be dedicated to improving matters for other people, and not just for self. Growing up in the 60s and 70s, it was clearly a time when young men and young women were venturing out, giving up worldly goods and desires, to try to make a difference in people's lives and to change the world for good. They ended up exasperated; they ended up apathetic and indifferent and becoming immersed into a world of I and me. I think I just blossomed into thinking about us and we. And more importantly, based on that old Roman Catholic worker's tradition of knowing that there will be nine failures for every one success, I knew that this mission, whatever road it would take me on, would be strewn with failures and set-backs and that I'd better start preparing myself. I knew that I'd better get ready.

What event or series of events led to your discovery?

It was clearly the time that my father spent with me. He was a merchant seaman, so he was away most of the time, but he gave me a global view of things. I wasn't contained in a parochial or insular community. It would have been very easy to become immersed in that, because I was in the ethnic enclave in Brooklyn that consisted of the Jews and Italians. You could become very provincial, as opposed to very open-minded or global. My mom would consistently give of herself as my aunts would also. I was surrounded by females constantly attempting to give, give, and give more, and deriving a great deal of satisfaction and a great deal of fulfillment from that. You could actually see them being almost euphoric every time they would help someone.

St. Francis of Assisi influenced me as well. I saw a movie made about him at a very young age, giving up all worldly desires and resources,

and just going on his particular mission. Then I found out about my mission after a series of involvements in all kinds of community service.

I was recycling, when it wasn't at all popular, when you were called a "junkman." There was no such thing as ecology or environmental awareness, no term for recycling, so you were determined to be a junkman if you collected bottles, newspapers or cans to be used to once again. Then there were the community cleanups I organized in my young adult years.

I began to wrestle with the demons of crime and to see the root causes. A society that originally brought us up to believe that we are our brother's keeper could turn and suddenly acquire a malaise of "mind your own business." That's when I decided to fight for what I knew what was right, no matter how many people thought I had the furniture upstairs and rearranged in all the wrong rooms.

I organized it in a very unorthodox way, as a visual presence in red berets, red satin jackets, and white Guardian Angel T-shirts without any weapons, without any special powers or privileges. We just empowered ourselves. The weak, the helpless, those who have always been resigned to sitting on the sidelines being told government will enable you, government will take care of, you're not capable, you're not strong enough, you're not smart enough, you haven't got a college degree, you don't have the mental capacity to control yourself emotionally. I discarded that and said, "From within this resource of humanity can come the answers." It had to do with a respect for one another and coming to the aid of others even if it meant risking your life in the process.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their life's purpose, what would it be?

There are two types of satisfaction in the world. There's the satisfaction of building and improving your own life, your own self-worth or your own self-esteem. I understand that for a lot of people you really have to do that first before you can go on to the nobler mission, the mission that has a higher calling. To give of yourself to those who can least help themselves, and empower them.

In terms of finding the vehicle, it's got to be something that you're passionate about. Something you eat, breathe, and sleep 24-7-365. Something you're totally obsessed about, where you feel you can make your mark on society, so much so that you become energized. You even take something as important as sleep and begin to think of it as not being

necessary, almost to the point of the philosophy that "there will be plenty of time to sleep when you're dead." You've got to scrape the barnacles off your backside, get your rear in gear and get right into it, and suffer all the setbacks so that you can eventually start accruing successes.

I would say that passion, first and foremost, is what people must discover before they're going to be able to find what it truly is that empowers them, fulfills them, and gives them a sense of purpose as to why they're on this plane.

Alan J. Nuñez

"Be willing to hear wisdom from the most unlikely places.

You just never know where you will find it."

Dr. Al Nuñez graduated magna cum laude in 1982 from the Los Angeles College of Chiropractic.

Dr. Nuñez has been researching and developing the 3-D chiropractic technique, or 3-DCT, for over twenty years. 3-DCT emphasizes that you can't just treat the back without treating the front! The back muscles are often tight in reaction or in compensation to tight muscles in the chest or deep in the abdomen.

Dr. Nuñez has found that frightening or traumatic events in youth often leave children or young adults with tension in their chest or stomach, which can become chronic or rigid over time. Due to the flexibility inherent in the young spine, these chronically tense muscles can cause distortion or changes in the curvature of the spine. To put it simply: Emotional tension leads to physical tension, physical tension over time leads to rigidity, and rigidity is morbidity, meaning symptoms.

3-DCT is a non-force chiropractic treatment in that there is no twisting, popping, or cracking involved in the adjustments of the spine or limbs. Dr. Nuñez found that when the muscles are relaxed or balanced that the bones move quite easily and a gentle thumb thrust is all that is needed to restore motion to the joints.

In addition to 3-DCT Dr. Nuñez has developed a myofascial technique designed to release or break up chronically tense muscles in the body. It is called *Pressure-Plus-Motion* or PPM. PPM works hand-in-hand with 3-DCT to more permanently relax the body and even more importantly it can be taught to the patient! Patients learn how to help themselves so they don't need as many chiropractic adjustments to achieve relief, and their adjustments and pain-relief lasts longer.

Who do think you are?

My philosophy of life affects everything I do. I use the same principles in my home, at work, at my Kiwanis club, and at my church. I think I learned a lot from my father during my childhood. He was an alcoholic,

which is a very self-centered viewpoint and leads to a lot of problems, and I would say that I developed those qualities in my youth. I, too, was self-centered.

I'm now what I call *We* centered. I learned the principle of considering "both you *and* me" in the Adult Children of Alcoholics (ACA) 12 step program. The first word in step one is *We*, *not I*. Now, when I'm making decisions, I consider what's best not just for you, not just for me, but what's best for us. I would say that's my main guiding principle. Whenever I'm interacting with a person or an organization, I don't want to forget your needs, I don't want to forget my needs, I want to consider everybody's needs. Whether I'm dealing with my kids, my patients or my service organizations, this is the main guiding principle that I live by.

I used to give to other people, and I thought I was very generous in giving and loving, but there was always a hook. I was giving, but clearly I wanted something out of it. It wasn't a true gift. I like to ask, "When you give, is it a gift or a payment?" In the past it was a payment, and I had to learn that there are no strings attached when it's a gift. Now when I'm working with my patients, I'm always considering what they want, what I want, and how can we create this relationship in a mutually beneficial way. It's not just about what I want anymore.

What events or series of events led to your discovery?

Growing up with an alcoholic father included dysfunction, unpredictability, and instability in the home. Because of that environment, I developed a tendency to try and find my own principles and to figure out life by myself. What I developed were the principles that life should be fair, that life should be logical, and that I should always know what to do in every situation, even if I have never been in that situation. Those were my philosophies as I was growing up, and those philosophies basically ruined my life. They were very idealistic principles.

I lived in those principles through my junior college years and then I got married after I got my first job. I was married for five years and then I got a divorce. That divorce kind of drove me to question my principles and question my philosophy. So I started my quest to learn about myself and to see why my philosophy didn't work.

I took some self-help workshops, studied various texts, and eventually ended up in the 12 step program (ACA). It was in that program that I developed the principle that it's not just me, it's not just you, it's us. This is what guides me through my life. While attending the 12-step

program I also learned that life gets better, and as I continued to attend my life got better and better.

I met my life-mate in the program. I had to grow spiritually to handle that challenge. After we were married for a while, I realized that I wanted more. I wanted a child. I needed to grow even more to handle a child. I continued a philosophy of continual spiritual evolution. I'm always pushing myself to grow, because I don't know how good life can get. How good can life get? There's a phrase I use, "You don't know how good you can feel until you feel that way!" So I keep on pushing myself. Life is already great, but could it be better? Maybe!

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their life's purpose, what would it be?

Always be a learner. Be willing to learn from others, and don't think that you know it all. Be willing to hear wisdom from the most unlikely places. You just never know where you will find it. In the Old Testament there is a story where God once spoke through the jawbone of a donkey. You just never know where wisdom or truth may come, and you have to be ready. Be ready to hear God speaking at any time. You never know whom God's going to speak through. Develop an attitude of paying attention. Never discount who is talking, because it might be just the message you needed to hear.

Who do you think you are? What is the purpose of your life?

I can speak to the vocational purpose of my life; I can't say with any certainty that I know my purpose on a larger level. My vocational purpose is to use acupuncture to educate and for social change in health care, primarily on behalf of working class people.

What event or series of events led you to your discovery?

I was one of those kids who always wanted to be a doctor. I grew up in a working class environment, though I didn't figure that out until later. My family was really into advancement through education so I went to a very good college.

I felt really out of place, but I couldn't pinpoint it as a class issue until later. I probably didn't end up being a doctor because I had an inner dissonance about class. At one point I realized that if I became a doctor I would be in a different class from where I came from, and everybody I was connected to, so I chose acupuncture as a field hoping that it might be different. It took me about 10 years to realize that it wasn't.

The way health care works in this country, anything complementary or alternative is really only available to people who have a disposable income, and that really bothered me. I wanted to do something about that, so as a result, and with the help of my partner, I came up with an alternate business model for acupuncture that works well for working class people.

We were able to create a thriving business for ourselves, and we began to offer that business model to other people. We had a vision of health care in this country being dramatically different, one where it doesn't have to be divided between the "haves" and "have-nots." There are certain types of health care (and I feel acupuncture is one of them) for which there is no reason everyone shouldn't have equal access.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their life's purpose, what would it be?

Based on what I've learned, I would say be yourself. Don't try to be somebody else. If you want to help people, think about how you can help people who are like yourself, because solidarity is more powerful than charity. That's definitely one thing I've learned. When you're working for people who are really like you, then you end up working with people who are really like you, and that's really empowering for everybody. It could be easy to get stuck in the helper role, and that isn't really sustainable either for the helper or the helped. If you want to avoid that, look for ways that you can be yourself, give yourself, and be involved in the concerns that are primary for you, as opposed to somebody else's concerns.

Since I was the oldest child, I was more pampered than my siblings. When it came time for my birthday, there were quite a lot of blankets to hand out to the poor people. The driver drove us into the neighborhood and we saw all the people on the street, so we pulled over and gave them all blankets. That night I had the most satisfying feeling inside that I could ever imagine. I realized that although having parties and receiving jewelry was fun, it was certainly not satisfying. I would rather do something for those less fortunate, who have so little. I thought giving would be the most wonderful feeling and the most satisfying to me. And it was.

If you can give advice to those who are still searching for their life's purpose, what would it be?

First you have to know yourself. I think most of the time people are trying to find out about what other people are doing, and they don't look at themselves. If you start finding out who you are and what you want in life, I think you would find you purpose. I think that 80% of the time, most people are worried about what he looks like, or what she is doing right or wrong, or if he or she tells lies, or if they'd take money. But they are not looking at what they, themselves, are doing.

In a quiet moment you may think, what do I want to be, what do I want? Even if you wanted to smoke a cigarette, if that's what gives you the most pleasure or calming thoughts, then you should do it. In those calm pleasurable moments I believe you will find your purpose and what you came to this life to do.

Who do you think you are?

Who I think I am is who I think we are. I think that we are pure potentiality. We are the choice point as energy beings or spiritual beings in a physical body. We have the capacity to choose anything. Science has shown us, beyond a shadow of a doubt, that what we think is what creates our reality. It certainly creates our experience. Using waveforms as an example, there are waveforms of energy in constant motion in a chaotic manner in every direction, and I think that we are the place where the in wave and the out wave meet. We have the capacity to choose any experience we desire.

We are source energy in the body here to experience ourselves as co-creators. Meaning, if we choose something to be difficult, it's difficult. If we consciously choose something to be a smooth experience, it is. I think that the purpose of our lives and who we are is a synonymous thing. It's really the same conversation.

Oftentimes we have experiences that are difficult or challenging, and then because of the experience, we have the opportunity to define who we are. For example, if something happens to make us feel that we are inadequate in some way, we began to develop a belief that we are inadequate. Then another thing occurs that validates that belief, and we start to look through a lens of inadequacy, constantly looking to validate the truth of that, because the subconscious mind is always collecting this kind of information and recording it.

Whatever the subconscious mind has recorded it wants to validate as true, because its job is to keep us safe. Its job is to keep us from danger, and one of the best ways to keep us safe is to keep us around things that seem familiar. Any validation of a previously established belief reaffirms the familiarity from a vibrational standpoint, from an energetic standpoint; it creates the environment feeling of safety for the subconscious to relax in. Even if it were miserable, it would rather maintain the same rather than step into the unknown.

In the moments where we're defining who we are relative to the experiences that we're having, we have the opportunity to shift, or to step into the front side of the model and say, regardless of our relatives, regardless of our relativity (the experiences we are having), what would we be experiencing if we could have it any way we chose? If I were out on the front side of that, I now have the experience of empowerment. I begin to have the experience of what freedom feels like. Then even in the face of negative circumstances, if I choose to bring forth a different experience from the inside out, I am experiencing my greatest capacity, I am experiencing pure potentiality in the body in human form.

I think we come here, to this dimension, with our consciousness to have that experience. We come to the third dimension where duality exists. We know hot because we know cold, we know joy because we know sadness, and it's in between those polarities that we have the opportunity to move in whatever direction that we choose. We've just never really realized the power that we have on a conscious level en mass. Our culture, our societies do not operate in the full potentiality of that system. The reason we come here with our consciousness and our awareness is so that we can have that experience of choosing. The energy

that is emitted in the moment of choice is elating, it's blissful, and it is, I imagine, what we believe heaven, the divine, or abundance to be. It's about choice.

We are pure potentiality taking on human form so that we can experience ourselves as creator (God source energy in the body), with the opportunity to experience what we choose. Just for the feeling of it. Just for the experience.

What event or series of events led to your discovery?

I grew up in the environment of natural health care. I grew up in an environment that spoke toward empowerment on an emotional level and intellectual level. It was definitely in the choice arena about what you do with your health, and the basic premise that the body has the ability to heal itself rather than being medicated or surgically altered. There's a reason if the body isn't healing itself, there's a reason for it. We would do ourselves a great favor to be in search of the cause of why the body isn't healing itself, rather than to seek out the next best treatment for the symptoms that result from the fact that the body isn't operating as it was designed and intended.

Growing up in that environment, I knew that there was a natural flow, that there is a grand plan, that all things really are intended to work out. For instance, I've never taken a medication for an ailment. I've never had a cold and gone to the doctor, received an antibiotic and taken it. It's just never happened in my 46 years. I know that the body can heal itself, yet I was riddled with stress, internally and on an emotional level. I was not at peace and I was really struggling to find my own application of that on a personal level, on an emotional basis more than anything, and so I sought out meditation. I sought out a lot of things that our culture would define as aids in that department.

I had some experiences, multidimensional experiences, through meditation that completely shifted my perception of what is real, and who we are. It didn't come easy. I was a perfectionist, and I wanted to learn how to meditate right. I was in a room with 300 other meditators who had been meditating for 30 years. I was constantly doing what I did at the time, which was judge myself, and I assumed that I wasn't doing it right. I practiced, tried it, looked around, made sure I was sitting right and breathing right and doing all these things in a perfectionist kind of way.

I exhausted myself at a particular meditation event to the degree that I couldn't worry about it anymore. I just couldn't think about it anymore. I had asked to help at this event, so I was up all night and all day running around trying to make the event happen correctly. After the third day, my mental capacity was exhausted from only getting an hour of sleep a night. I went into the main ballroom where the event was taking place and I just sat down and decided to chant with everyone else and stop worrying about it. In that process I had a life altering experience, with high frequency light, and it completely changed my version of reality. I experienced myself as a self that was not in the body.

It took me several months, if not years, to integrate that. I'm still integrating all of the implications of that experience. During this process, I experience a stillness that allows me to see that everything happening in my life, without exception, is in service to the unfoldment of my realization that this is the true me. That the temporal circumstances of my daily life, the ups and downs, the successes and the disappointments, are all part of the unfoldment which is offered to us with great grace. It is all pointing us in the direction of a realized notion that we have the capacity to utilize this life experience as a playground of adventure and discovery. When we see every event from that perspective, we are set free.

I see even the most challenging events as the opportunity to grow into remembrance. I don't really know how else to say it, except that it is to allow me to remember that I do have choice in the face of every situation, and when I exercise that choice, I experience myself settled and empowered, so that the degree of freedom far exceeds the challenge. I am no longer in a tunnel, controlled by the circumstances. I can see a much broader explanation of why these things are occurring, and how they are serving my own personal empowerment.

All of the events that have occurred in my life since that meditation experience have been looked at with that perspective. The most beautiful and amazing thing about it is that every single event since then has pointed towards my freedom, towards my empowerment, and it keeps escalating. So much so that even as potentially devastating things occur in my life, I don't see them in that way. I allow myself to feel the experience.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their life's purpose, what would it be?

I know that this only happens when it can. It can't happen until one comes to the center point within themselves, when they allow themselves to just sit down and be with themselves and completely accept what they are experiencing as valid, and also temporary. If they can allow those two concepts to come together at the same time within their own personal space and in their hearts and minds, then they can experience that magical aspect of being human.

What that boils down to is listening to their gut feelings and the nuances that are trickling up towards their consciousness from their body. Their body is a feedback mechanism that is constantly revealing to them the truth of what's happening. If they can just be present with all of those feelings that are coming up, the ones that are the most eternal or the most True will prevail, and those that are the flickering evidence that we operate in a fear-based manner are only temporary. Those fearful thoughts disappear when we just hold fast to the idea that we are equipped with everything we need. The search is really what keeps us from finding.

I think that it's important to have curiosity and certainly look at this adventure as a grand mystery, but to also realize that we hold the key inside. It's found in the hearts and in the wisdom centers low in our abdomen, and really the mind is supposed to be the servant to those things. Those parts will steer us accordingly to the evidence and information they're receiving from the inside, not the outside. Everything in the external environment is the effect of this. If we can really operate from this internal guidance, then we are much more likely to create a life experience that is in alignment with the Truth of why we came. It will become self-evident, and it won't be because of something from the outside.

What I can do is express what I've been through, but if someone is actually searching for a long-term solution, and not just something to get through the night, I think my suggestion to them would be to seek and find their spiritual center. Whether that's through a religion or through a journey into nature, or whether that's through a practitioner of spiritual awareness, a church, or a guru. Who do you think you are?

Who I am is joy, appreciation, and outrageous possibilities. I choose to spend my treasured time teaching about the message of our emotions and experiencing the joy of living in alignment with them. I listen to my emotions at every possible opportunity. The joy and purpose of my life is, quite literally, allowing myself to experience joy!

I'm here to live joyfully every moment I can. I'm here to follow my bliss. I'm here to feel "good." Paradoxically, I'm also here to fully experience and inquire into the messages hidden in the pain and resistance of life and remember in those moments that joy is still possible—even when it feels as distant as the stars.

What event or series of events led to your discovery?

About twenty-five years ago I became quite terrified and depressed when I realized my decision to leave seminary might condemn me to hell. I'm not sure what I was actually most scared of at the time, being rejected by my peers, being rejected by God, or the pain of rejecting myself for renouncing my identity and sense of life calling.

This crisis created a deep yearning to understand who I am and why I'm here—such a deep desire that I now spend much of my life

teaching about how to inquire about and live in joyous alignment with our chosen life purpose.

It had become quite clear that I couldn't complete seminary with integrity because the church and I just didn't see eye to eye on the subject of emotions. They tried to suggest that some emotions, like love, were okay to have, while others like anger, were not. I figured that if God had designed the human body with emotions, they must all be important. Not some more than others. In fact, I was quite clear that my emotions were some sort of feedback system for spiritual growth. I thought that since spiritual growth was God's intention for me, I had better let go of my attachment to being a minister. I had better just trust that come Judgment Day, God would understand my decision.

Fast-forward twenty years and I'm listening to a tape my brother was playing by Esther Hicks on the subject of attraction and manifestation. Bear in mind that after leaving seminary, I had spent a good portion of the subsequent 20 years of my life as a counselor and psychiatric social worker continuing to obsess on the nature of emotions. I heard Esther say something quite extraordinary that blew my socks off. It was so deeply aligned with most of what I had learned in the field of psychology and yet so new and revolutionary and simple and obvious that I was rendered stunned and speechless. It was such a powerful revelation, that I can remember exactly where I was the moment I heard it. In fact, it may be the most valuable thing I've ever learned in my life.

What Esther said was this: our emotions are indicators of whether our thoughts are aligned with our desires. The feeling of joy is a physical message letting us know that the thought we just had was aligned with our desires (e.g., a thought of gratitude); when we feel emotional pain, it's a wake up event letting us know that we just had a thought that is not aligned (e.g., a judgment of others or ourselves).

In other words, our emotions simply report to us the content of our most powerful thoughts. They neither tell us what to do, nor if our thoughts are good or bad (something that I used to believe). They don't tell us if our judgment of someone or ourselves is right or wrong either (something I also used to think). They simply awaken us from our obsessively mentally focused lives to tell us to pay attention to the last thought we had so that we may choose to generate more of those thoughts (e.g. of appreciation) or less of them (e.g., negative judgments or painful past or future thinking). That's it. Our emotions are simply an impartial indicator and wake-up call about our thought-desire alignment. Our bodies have been telling us all along that having thoughts of love and appreciation

and peace are fundamental to our being and fundamental to our understanding of life, who we are, and why we're here.

Hearing, testing and knowing this truth put me on my current path of discovery.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their life's purpose, what would it be?

The only satisfying answer to this question will come from the private and silent inquiry of your heart. Who outside of you can tell you how to live in alignment with your uniquely precious and individual needs, desires, and passions? It is you. It is only you. Are you willing to allow yourself to have and relish them?

I have found the writings of Abraham-Hicks, Eckhart Tolle, Marshall Rosenburg, and Byron Katie especially helpful reminders to rely on my own "knowing," live life in the present moment, and notice the messages from my body, rather than from my silly mind chatter.

You are doing so well at this game of life. There's a broader spiritual part of you cheering you on moment to moment. It does so through your emotions. Each time you allow yourself relief from mindpain, find a moment of stillness, or a way to appreciate your world a little bit more, you connect with that broader dimension of you and fulfill your magnificent purpose.

And remember, all your answers are here, right now, rather than in an imaginary future. They have always been here waiting for you to feel and welcome them. Now is a good time for you to tune into the messages of your emotions.

Who do you think you are?

I'm a servant of God.

What event or series of events led you to your discovery?

It's by the grace of God that that comes. We can think that there's a series of events that led to this, but cause and effect only takes place in the material world. In the spiritual world, there is not cause and effect, so there's no event that actually brings God realization. It is a gift of God that comes, and we do our best by whatever work we do on ourselves to attain enlightenment and become our true and divine god-like selves. And this works in our favor.

I first got on the spiritual path in this lifetime, at around seventeen years old, through prayer. I think if there's really any type of event that helps people to attain God-realization, self-realization, to recognize who they are and their relationship with God and how life works it's through prayer. God is in the heart of every living being (Mother-Father God). So, everybody is always in close contact with the divine witness and the divine guide. I would say, whatever anybody wants, whatever it is spiritually or materially, you go to the source and sincerely do your prayers, as this is always has worked for me.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their life's purpose, what would it be?

Pray and ask for what you want and at the same time really have an open mind, because what will happen is this: prayer is always answered but sometimes we turn our back to it because we don't want to learn anymore, or we don't want to hear anymore, or we're really fixated on our beliefs or our past conditioning. That's what I have found is the biggest stumbling block, because people have a concept of who they are but the concept of who they are may not be who they are. They have a concept of how life works, which may have nothing at all to do with how life works.

I would say that when they ask and pray to really have an open mind. Then when knowledge comes to them, before they eliminate it, really meditate on that and ask for guidance. I would also recommend that people study the teachings of Jesus. I like the four gospels: Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. I'd also recommend they read the Bahavagita, which is a very powerful book on the distinction between the self and the body and our purpose and mission in life. In these teachings, which are usually somewhere in the teachings of the great religions of the world, there are the principles of life. When they understand these things they can learn to apply them, and the basic thing is that we're here to become

a supreme human being, and a supreme being is already living in the kingdom of God.

People can contact me on my website, or whatever teacher they feel guided to, and they'll be in the right place at the right time. Right where a person is, they can have it all. It's really about love and flowing in love all the time. What we tend to do is get caught up in all the problems, focus on the problems and fear the future or lament the past. All of that is destructive. It's a real training of the self to keep the consciousness spiritualized and in relationship to God, and seeing God presence in everybody and everywhere. We can have as much love flow through us as we are willing to.

Lawrence Edward Carter Sr.

Lawrence Edward Carter Sr., Ph.D. is the first dean of the Martin Luther King Jr. International Chapel, a tenured Professor of Religion, and College Curator at Morehouse College since 1979. He is formerly an instructor at the Morehouse School of Medicine in the Master of Public Health Program. For 45 years, Dr. Carter has studied and worked in fourteen American universities, colleges, and professional schools; spoken at more than 80 different colleges, universities, and seminaries; received over 500 speaking engagements from eighteen denominations; and traveled to 35 foreign countries. He has made over 60 radio and television appearances.

Currently, Dr. Carter teaches Psychology of Religion, Religion and Ethics, and The Life and Thought of Mohandas K. Gandhi and Martin Luther King Jr. at Morehouse College. He has also taught "Introduction to Spirituality and Health" at the Morehouse School of Medicine.

Who do you think you are?

Vocationally, I think of myself as a servant, who is here in order to fill in some major gaps in the staff at Morehouse College, and to help people not forget the life and work of Martin Luther King Jr., Mahatma Gandhi, Daisaku Ikeda and Prince El Hassan bin Al Talal. It is in the spirit of these great world teachers that I am here to bring peace and harmony by nonviolent means. Helping others develop their potential to the fullest and to express everything that is in them is the essence and fulfillment of what I've been doing professionally for nearly 40 years.

I write hundreds of references for people to get into the highest ranked graduate schools and jobs as well as raise money for scholarships. By helping people with their personal, developmental, and experiential crises to become free from doctrines and outdated world-views, the frontiers of ignorance are pushed back and transformation picks up speed. In order to leave the world more beautiful than I found it, I find myself picking up trash everywhere to keep mother earth from being trashed, and though in certain conflicts I'm often on the side of the underdog. I am always oriented towards being a prince of peace.

What event or series of events led you to your discovery?

It happened around the age of 15 when my pastor insisted that I be part of the Prince of Peace Speech Contest. I had never competed in any kind of contest like that. I had to choose a speech from a collection of speeches about peace, memorize it, and deliver it. In the process I learned a lot about the atomic bomb, its cost, and the damage it could do to people and property. It was eye-opening to realize what money used to build the bomb could pay for in a peace-oriented society. I was shocked and could not imagine that anyone would ever drop an atomic bomb.

After learning of Hiroshima, the place where the bomb was dropped in 1945 and the nuclear classroom of the world, I, along with several of my students, visited Hiroshima and was devastated. If the American people could see what the atomic bomb did to Hiroshima, I believe they would become socially active today, and not radioactive tomorrow and they would not be in favor of war as enthusiastically as they now are.

Also when I was 15, I discovered the *Life Magazine* coffee table book on the great religions of the world. I asked my mother to buy it for me for Christmas. It was at that age that I discovered different ways of being religious and started believing that every religion had its own brand of wisdom; that the wisdoms of all faiths, including Christianity, were similar and held a common wealth. I thoroughly bought into the ideas of Matthew Fox's book *One River, Many Wells*. For quite a while, I had been looking for a pattern that united people across all boundaries in order to bring about global peace.

Now I am in academia using the liberal arts to inspire and educate global citizens and ambassadors of peace. I have always been a reconciler trying to negotiate understanding when there was conflict between individuals and institutions. I was born on September 23rd, 1941 on Walnut Street in Dawson, Georgia at 5:30 p.m. which classifies me on the zodiac cusp, as a Libra, symbolized by the scales of justice. I've always tried to bring balance.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their life's purpose, what would it be?

Keep reading, taking adventures in travel and eating not as a tourist but as a pilgrim. Keep exploring and learning how to listen to your own inner voice, because when you are "still" the Universe reveals its secrets

in your daily experiences. We discover our purpose and reason for being in our activism; a vision then comes to us of our place as planetary citizens. We are pulled by our passion for such a long time, we fail to realize that we are living out the definition of our names.

For instance, my name, Lawrence Edward Carter, three British names: Lawrence means "poetic prophet," Edward means "the guardian of the treasures," and a Carter is the person who carts things around...like a coolie who pulls passengers through a city in the Orient. I am the poetic prophet who is guarding the treasures and who carts souls into heaven, an awareness that heaven is within you as ever-expanding good.

Just doing what you enjoy doing, what makes you happy, what fulfills you is one way of discovering your purpose. Your destiny, I believe, is written in the meaning of your name. It is engraved in your heart and it will not pass away until you fulfill it. I believe I'm fulfilling my destiny here at Morehouse College, helping thousands of young men, particularly those interested in the ministry.

When I was about fifteen I promised that I would send hundreds of young men and women into the Christian ministry and it has happened. I have sent hundreds to seminaries, schools of divinity, and schools of theology, many of whom have graduated with their Ph.D.s from the leading research universities, some of whom studied abroad. This will be my legacy to Morehouse College. These young people will be the future drum majors of justice and peace, helping us grow up into democracy's crown.

Who do think you are?

I've had the same mission statement for thirty years. It is to create civility in a troubled world. I work with individuals and companies talking to people about their purpose, creating higher levels of communication, and breaking down the differences in gender, religion, ethnicity, sexual orientation, and age. I'm trying to bring one-hundred-and-forty cultures together in this country, and four generations, and it's no small task. I want us all to see ourselves as one organic system that creates civility in the world.

What events or series of events led to your discovery?

There's a famous question posed by Oprah: what do you know for sure? What I know for sure is that there is no certainty. Any time that we have a choice it creates suffering. It's been the awareness of the importance for discerning truth that has been my discovery. Not that I have a belief

system, because I don't. The amorphous challenge of just being present in life is enough for me.

What led me to that was this: I wrote a book, and the book came out at the time when the United States military went into Afghanistan. I did a twenty city national media tour. I didn't get all the press I wanted because there was nothing on but war news. ABC, NBC, CBS, FOX...everything was war news. When I came back I spoke with a woman who I knew and trusted and respected, and I asked what I should do.

She looked at me and she said, "Phyllis, let it fail."

I said, "What you talking about? I spent the last two years of my life trying to create success on this project."

"Let it fail," she repeated. "The only thing that can bring you peace is to let it fail, and then watch what happens."

I went home, rested, and decided that I would go on with my life and see what happened. The book has done well, and that was three or four years ago. I try to use that philosophy in everything I do now. Just wear life like a loose garment, and do the best I can on projects. It's not about making them fail, don't get me wrong. I can't control the outcome, all I can control is what I did. I wrote the book, and I did the best I could.

If I don't invest my soul in all my projects, then I can't get hurt. I've had more success in the last four years than I ever had in my life, and a lot of it is because of that. I know this sounds counterintuitive to someone in business that wants to be a success. But just try it.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their life's purpose, what would it be?

I'm a philosopher. In the last few years, I've begun to study philosophy. Not in lieu of pursuing my ultimate purpose and career goals, or by looking at the spiritual or the health sides of my life. But to truly explore philosophy and find out what's true instead of searching outside for the right answers.

Just choose some philosophy to learn how to deconstruct your ideas and beliefs that you hold so dearly, because they pass, and all of a sudden one year you may discover you don't like licorice any more. It's true! A lot of the beliefs we've had since childhood, like that this country is safe and would never have war, or that I can have all the ice cream I want. We need to readdress some of the principles in life that have been our guiding light.

Instead of trying to move forward with new beliefs, why not dismantle the ones you've got and live belief free? Believe in nothing but the present and the principles that guide our moral structure. Experiment with freedom and see where that leads you instead of trying to search for answers, which is what we do. That's what Western culture does, it looks for answers and solutions and experts to give them to us. But really, truly look within and find out how you can dismantle all of your beliefs and truly experience freedom and joy from that.

Who do you think you are?

There are a lot of things I think I am. I am a being of light. I am a soul searching for the truth of God in every moment. I am a creative expression of the Divine that infuses my world with evidence of who I am in every moment. I create reflections of my being and project them into my surroundings, which then reflect back to me all that I am and all that I am not. I am committed to my own growth and to the growth of those I interact with. I focus my attention on nurturing our unique human potential, and creating forgiveness, financial abundance, and joy along the way. What others see as obstacles, I see as opportunities. I share my light, without hesitation. I am a creative being, and I also believe that I

am part of this one mind, that is all actually ONE integrated comprehensive whole.

Recently, I had a moment of clarity around our oneness. I was turning a street corner in my car, and at that same moment a man fell off of his bicycle. It was a moment of violence, and it was kind of sudden and shocking as those things can be. Although the man wasn't hurt, he was definitely shaken up, but he got up and dusted himself off and rode away. Here is what was curious to me...I know I am a creative being, and I know that I co-create the things that I experience in my life. In that moment I wondered, "Did I make this guy fall?"

I wanted to explore this a little bit further, so I pulled the car over and I took a look inside myself. What I saw inside of my mind was violence; it was kind of like this part of my limbic brain that appreciated violence. And as I looked deeper, I witnessed the larger scale violence in the world and this notion that we are all one. I saw that the same energy of violence within me is also projected outside of myself. I felt this deep level of oneness with the group agreement regarding violence, and again I saw myself as part of that.

I knew intellectually that, by my thoughts, I actually have a hand in creating the violence that's in the world. I realized more clearly in the moment that what comes into my radar, within my purview, is an even more personal creation. As I looked within, I could see the energy within me, that can be creative, *and* the belief system within me, that can create violent incidents in the outside world. In that moment as I looked inside, I actually saw what my projected violence might look like, and it was shown to me kind of like a painting.

What I saw was a little string of my belief in violence. I saw this string coming out of me and attaching to the war in Iraq. That was my piece of the manifestation of violence. Then I saw other strings from all over the world attaching to war. The image was kind of like a Seurat painting in which all the individual dots together form a picture. And I realized that all the strings of our beliefs together, in aggregate, create reality. Whatever our belief system is inside can create itself externally. So, did I make him fall? Not exactly, yet I was a witness to it, so I could explore my feelings of violence and, in turn, share this with you. In fact, you are now part of this creative process. You might even ask... did I create this?

So, who do I think I am? I believe that I am a creative being that is a piece of this whole puzzle, and I create the wonders that are in my world and the challenges that are in my world as well. I also recognize

that this creative being that is me can construct and unravel my own life. I can create the violence that's in front of me and I can unravel it too. When I unravel my own violence within myself, then, it disrupts and disengages the "strings of belief" or the "dots" of violence that are around me found manifest in the world. That's when I feel that we're all one. When I am unraveling my piece, then it inherently shifts the infrastructure and the aggregated belief systems. This gives all of us the opportunity to shift and change.

What event or series of events led to your discovery?

I started my spiritual path at twenty-three, just after I graduated from college. In fact, it was Shirley McClain (God bless her) and a TV Special I watched, based on her first book on spirituality, *Out On a Limb*. I read every book in its entire bibliography and that started me on my spiritual path.

The next incident was the Harmonic Convergence in 1987. I didn't know what it was, but my friends dragged me to it. I was young and naive, and there was this event that was in the middle of the night and it sounded like fun and an adventure. In that moment, I felt something shift inside of me. It was like a flutter, an opening. So I continued to explore.

A pivotal time came several years later. I had several regularly occurring weekly migraine headaches that I found out were a result of Temporalmandibular Joint Disorder (TMJ). I basically had a headache for about three years. I was waiting in a doctor's office considering going in for surgery when a pamphlet fell off the table, literally onto my lap. I looked at the pamphlet, and it was from an orthodontist who specialized in TMJ. So I thought, well, before I go into surgery, I better check this guy out.

It turned out that the doctor and his wife worked as a team. She performed cranial sacral therapy, and he did applied kinesiology with a mouth splint. He would put a splint in my mouth, then muscle test me to see if the splint was in the right place. That was after she had done cranial sacral work with me to correct some of the problems with the cranial system. Within six weeks I was completely cured from the migraines.

Cranial sacral therapy got me into the healing arts, and I dove in head-first. I trained in several different disciplines of healing: polarity therapy, cranial sacral therapy, sound therapies, and Reiki. That was a huge part of my discovery, working with myself using those techniques.

Working with others using those healing techniques has allowed me to make all kinds of unique discoveries, including other aspects of who I am. I don't think I would have been able to go as deep within myself, and seen the truths about myself, if I hadn't explored these healing techniques with others.

More recently, I've been working with Joe Vitale and using a technique called Ho'oponopono. Joe talked about it is his book, *Zero Limits*. It's been a real important technique in the newest progressions of my life. Of course *The Secret* was what inspired me to find Joe, and many aspects of the law of attraction are a foundational philosophy for me. I think *The Secret* has helped bring me to a deeper level of understanding. Joe's work and the other healing modalities I have learned have allowed me to sustain it and move me through any blocks that come up.

I believe that when you make big requests of the universe, when you have big dreams, and make them known, and ask fervently with visualization and feeling, whatever is not in alignment with those dreams will come up for viewing, airing, acknowledging, thanking and, ultimately, releasing. Joe's work and the law of attraction are two fantastic practices that have really allowed me to find my current level of bliss.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their life's purpose, what would it be?

There are a few things I'd like to share from my book, *The Big Book of You*. One is called the "consistency theory." Most people are extremely consistent with their behavior, and there's good and bad in that. People who are not on a spiritual path are usually quite consistent in their behaviors. What that means is they typically respond in a very predictable manner. If you're about to tell them something, for example, and you anticipate that they're going to respond in a certain way, they probably will.

At some point, it becomes *your* responsibility to find a new tactic with that person. If you say something to your mother, and she responds in the exact same way that she has for the last 45 years, you have a number of choices to alter the pattern—you can either not tell her at all, or you can choose a different way to be with her reaction. Find a way to respond to her, rather than react in the same predictable manner yourself. That simple choice helps a lot of people. Once they know that this other person is going to react exactly how they always have, they can take

responsibility and ask themselves, "How can *I* respond differently now?" This usually changes the dynamics of an otherwise predictable outcome. It opens up all kinds of other possibilities within the relationship.

My other advice is, "don't compromise your true self." People often feel challenged by this one initially because most of us were taught that life is all about compromise. My theory is that the moment you compromise that which you know to be true deep within you, the next emotion is resentment. If you can find a way to look at a situation so that you do *not* feel compromised, and you don't feel that resentment, then you've changed it by changing your perception of it, not by compromising yourself.

Let me give you an example of this. Let's say there's a couple, and the man and woman have completely different tastes in music. The man loves hard rock, and the woman absolutely adores folk music. They go to each other's concerts, and one time, the man turns to his wife and says, "You know, I really hate folk music. I don't like it. I don't like the people. I just don't like anything about it. I'm not going to compromise anymore. I'm not going to go to these anymore."

Well, she keeps on going to his rock concerts and he's stopped going to her concerts. So one day he asks her, "Why are you still going to my rock concerts?" She says it's because she absolutely loves being with him when he's in his joy, and he is truly in his joy when he's at a rock concert. He thinks about this for awhile, and he thinks, Well, maybe I could try that at a folk concert. So, he goes with her to her next folk concert with this new perception. He goes thinking, I just want to watch her having fun and appreciate her having fun. And at this particular event, he has a really good time.

He is having a good time because his perception has shifted. He's moved from a point of "I am being affected by something I don't like" to "I am now in charge and looking at this a different way. As a result I am no longer compromising." He is then being true to a deeper desire in him for her to be happy, so there is no reason to feel resentment. I fully believe that if you are feeling compromised, either find a different way to see the situation and be with it, or don't do it at all. Resentment is destructive and serves no one unless you learn something from it.

Finally, and ultimately, what I discovered is that you are the "brass ring." Whatever you're seeking isn't somewhere "out there" outside of yourself...it's already within you. Once you discover, acknowledge, know, feel, and truly understand that you are the gift that you are seeking, all the other troubles of the world will fall away.

Who do you think you are?

I wouldn't give a title to myself. It's not really a *who* I am. It's more related to what my purpose is, and that is to help people empower themselves, to help them discover that power within and own it and use it to make their lives better.

What event or series of events led to your discovery?

As I look back over the types of businesses I've started and the things that I've done, I realize there was a common theme. Regardless of how remote it seemed, each one had to do with helping people discover something in themselves, that inner sense that they can do something more!

For example, my first business was in the gift industry. I started a gift basket business. In that business I think I screwed everything up that you could possibly screw up. After doing that for a while, I finally put my foot down and decided I was going to figure out how to make it work. The problem was, once I figured out how to make it work it wasn't fun anymore. So I sold the business and put together a book that taught other people in the industry how to create this type of business and to make it work. Most people in the industry didn't know how to run a business. They were doing it because they thought it was fun. Since they didn't know how to make their business work, they were losing a lot of money and pretty much making their lives miserable. I saw a way that I could help people understand how to make their business work, and that was the second business I started.

From there is just kind of cascaded as we went through successive businesses. At one point I taught college courses on business etiquette. How silly is it that business etiquette can be considered empowering people? I didn't teach it from the angle of this is what you have to do, this is what you don't have to do. It was more like, these are the rules of society and you want to know them so you can choose how to play the game. It was all about letting people understand what impressions they were giving, and how other people were perceiving them, so that they could choose to do more of it or less of it and understand where they were going.

Healthy Wealthy nWise is all about that. We're starting a new project now specifically geared toward businesses and small entrepreneurs, to help empower the small entrepreneur to become successful. And so it continues.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their life's purpose, what would it be?

In a course that I've written called *The Science of Creating Your Dreams*, there's an exercise that everybody has to do. It deals specifically with

that voice in your head that tells you that you can't do something, or says, "Who do you think you are? What are you doing? You can't do that!" Most people think the exercise is really funny. Here's what happens. I have everyone get out a piece of duct tape and put the duct tape on that voice. You don't want to put it in your hair because that doesn't work very well, but you can put it on your computer or someplace where you can see it. Every time that voice pops up and says something negative about you, you can look at the duct tape and say, "Sorry you have duct tape over your mouth, I can't hear you!"

Once that little voice shuts up, sit quietly, go deep, and really look at that one big goal, that wish that you had, that purpose that scares the living crap out of you and makes butterflies dance around in your stomach because you think it's way too big. When you get that feeling in your stomach, then you know you're getting close to what your real purpose is.

So, the first step is to get that voice that says that you can't do certain things to shut up. The second step is there to assist you in exploring what excites you. It helps you to discover what gets you going, what gets you jazzed, what gets you out of bed in the morning. This is how people can start to find their purpose.

Who do you think you are?

I'm a guy who likes to stretch the limits of what's possible. Not only from a personal level, but also the general concept of stretching the limits.

What event or series of events led to your discovery?

The path I took helped me to form that definition. It all started for me as a child. I was never one to go along with the status quo. Who do you think you are?

I spent three months in total silence in a Zen Monastery, hoping to find out the answer to that question. But the answer keeps changing...

And the answers I get shape who I become...even when the answers I get from Spirit don't make sense right away.

About six years ago, I was in acupuncture school and I got a message that I was supposed to teach holistic practitioners how to be successful in business. That didn't make ANY sense to me because I hadn't even built my own practice yet. But the message was crystal clear and it stayed with me.

Today, my husband Jesse and I, teach holistic practitioners, coaches and entrepreneurs how to make a 6-figure income in their business, while staying true to their core values.

Our mission is to be a leader in the planetary movement to shift business from a competitive model based on scarcity to a cooperative model based on unlimited abundance.

So, who I am is a powerful business woman who is sourced by Spirit. I am also newly married to my amazing husband, Jesse Koren

What event or series of events led to your discovery?

When I registered for acupuncture school, I was confident that since acupuncture was a "booming field" I would have no problem making a living at it. After three years and a grueling board exam, I was excited to finally make the difference I had been dreaming about for three years. I expected masses of people to flock to me. But was I wrong...

What I discovered was that I still had a lot of healing to do in the realm of receiving money for my services and feeling good enough about myself. It wasn't until I really put myself out there in the world to try to get clients that I discovered how painful it was to want to serve people so badly but to not know how to reach them.

It didn't take long to realize that I was \$80,000 in debt from acupuncture school, and instead of decreasing, my debt was growing. After a few months, I canceled my gym membership and was on the verge of giving up organic food because I "couldn't afford it."

I was confused because I knew I was divinely guided to help people, I just didn't know how to get clients. I was totally scared and thinking "who's going to pay me for what I do when I can't even handle my own life?"

But if I've learned one thing it's this: whatever problems I've had, there are people out there who have had the same problem and overcome it. The key is to find those people and learn from them.

A friend, who is a coach and mentor to new coaches told me that if I worked with him that I would triple my income in three months. At the time this meant going from \$20,000 to \$60,000 a year. The only catch was that I had to do the homework.

I didn't know what the homework was going to be, and I didn't have the money to hire him. But when I checked in with Spirit I knew that I had to hire this coach to help me.

So, I borrowed the money from Jesse, and signed up for coaching. When I found out what the homework entailed, I almost fell off my seat. My homework was to have twenty business conversations per day, five days a week.

But, there are no accidents in the world. Because of the sheer number of conversations I had during those three months, I started to become very clear about what works and what doesn't work in "sales conversations" with a potential client.

It was during those three months that I "downloaded" the HeartSelling model that we now teach. While I was in Acupuncture School, I had studied the five elements of Chinese Medicine: Fire, Earth, Metal, Water, and Wood. According to this system, we're all made up of the five elements and when one of these elements is out of balance, your health will suffer.

It dawned on me that the same was true for a sales conversation. If any one of the five elements was missing in a HeartSelling conversation, the person would usually decline my services. But when all five elements were present, my potential client often said "Yes."

It was like I had received a treasure map to share with the world. As you can probably imagine, I tripled my practice in three months just as my coach promised.

When other practitioners, coaches, and friends saw how quickly my practice filled up, they started asking me how I was doing it. If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their life's purpose, what would it be?

The first thing is I would encourage you to do transformational work. Reading this book is a great way to get the principles we're all sharing on a mental level. It is also important that you get them on an experiential level. You can work one-on-one with a holistic practitioner or coach, or you can attend live workshops and seminars.

And as you're doing this work, keep asking Spirit, "Who am I? What am I here for? What is my purpose?" Continue to ask Spirit these questions, because it's a never-ending inquiry.

The second thing is I would encourage you to get a mentor. A mentor is a special person who has done what you want to do and who

has qualities that you'd like to grow in yourself.

I see a lot of entrepreneurs who are trying to reinvent the wheel or worse, taking advice from people who are less successful than they are. Sometimes a mentor will show up, but they get scared, and they say "No" instead of saying "Yes." My advice is to have the faith and say "Yes" to working with a mentor. And by saying "Yes" to your mentor, you're saying "Yes" to what's possible in yourself.

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Who do think you are?

When I was first growing up my Spirit was very bright and I believed anything was possible. But when I was eleven years old, I had a dream to play on the Chicago Sting, our pro soccer team. My next door neighbor said, "Did you know that there are millions of other boys all over Chicago who want to play for the Sting, many who are way better than you? He laughed at me, punched me in the stomach, and said, "Who do you think you are?" So I gave up on that dream and put myself in a small, tight box of limitations.

But my Spirit is HUGE, bigger than ANY box I've built for myself. When I was sixteen years old, my dad introduced me to Wayne Dyer, who helped me break out of my first box. I keep breaking out of boxes, to find another box, a bigger box, containing who I am. And each time I find a bigger box, I discover a new piece of myself.

And so I'm constantly reinventing myself, discovering more and more pieces of who I am. My Spirit keeps brightening, and even though

I haven't put all the pieces together yet, I know that I'm an Uncontainably Bright, Powerful, Divine Being.

What events or series of events led to your discovery?

After listening to the Wayne Dyer tapes, my whole life started to open up. I'd love to share three key events that quickened my awakening.

The first event began the semester before I graduated from college when everyone was asking "what are you going to do after college?" When I told them I was going to travel, it didn't go over so well. You just graduated from one of the most prestigious Universities in the United States and instead of getting a prestigious job, you're going to WHAT??? TRAVEL?? FOR TWO YEARS??? Who do you think you are?

But it turned out to be the best decision I ever made. I made \$10,000 stretch the span of two years, by riding Greyhound buses and living at a dozen intentional communities throughout the United States.

While I was traveling, I filled a journal every month, trying to figure out who I was. Instead, I discovered over and over who I wasn't.

I stayed at several yoga centers, and discovered that although I loved yoga, I was not cut out to live the life of a yogi. I lived in an artistic community, and realized that although I loved art, I was not cut out to be an artist. And on and on...

At each community I peeled off a layer of who I thought I was (or should be.) I finally reached the point where I learned a lot about who I was and wasn't, but I was driving myself crazy with all the inner work.

The second event was when one of my mentors Moe Ross, asked me a question that completely changed my life. Questions have the power to do that. (Which is why this book is so powerful.)

The question Moe asked me was: "what will you regret, if you don't do it in the next seven years?" In that moment, the answer came to me, even though I was scared to act on it. My heart's calling was to work with teenagers as a wilderness therapy counselor.

I sent out 50 letters to Wilderness Therapy Camps all over the country, hoping that none of them would respond.

When I took the job as a Wilderness Therapy Counselor in North Carolina, I agreed to be responsible for ten teenage boys, seventeen hours a day, five days a week, for two years. All the boys chose to come to this camp to avoid doing time at Juvenile Hall.

I was their authority figure, and at any given time there were usually several boys yelling and swearing at me. To make matters worse, we lived outside in tents and my hands were numb and my nose dripped for the entire winter. I wanted to quit almost every day. But, when I discovered that nine of the ten boys in my group didn't live with their parents because their parents were either in jail, dead, or had left them to their grandparents I vowed that I wasn't going to be the person to break their trust and leave again.

So, I fulfilled my two-year commitment and discovered that who I am is a man who loves to serve. At the same time, something else had woken up in me. I was no longer willing to spend my waking hours getting yelled at while I froze my butt off and made less than five dollars an hour.

I made a pact with Spirit: "I'm happy to serve. But you've got to meet me halfway. I need to be served as well."

This discovery sparked the third event. I moved to Santa Cruz to become a life coach and workshop leader. I tried everything I could to get clients and workshop participants, but even though my rates were much higher than at the Wilderness Therapy Camp, I couldn't get enough people to work with me to pay the bills.

So, I got a j-o-b working at a nonprofit organization, pretending like I was making a difference. nine months later, I was stuffing cookies down my throat in the back room of the office, when I realized that not serving people deeply was killing me. I watched my wife Sharla hire a coach and triple her practice in three months. So, filled with newfound inspiration I hired my own coach and went for my dreams again.

Using the system of HeartSellingTM Sharla had downloaded; we took our company, Rejuvenate Training, from 0 to 6-figures in our first year. People started wondering how we grew our business so quickly. What you'll find is that your answer will often come as a way to serve. Especially when you're feeling great, you'll naturally want to help other people feel the joy and abundance that you're feeling.

The second part is the guidance we give all of our clients. You see our clients are holistic practitioners, coaches and entrepreneurs who naturally want to serve. The mistake they often make is the one I made when I worked at camp. They let their desire to serve other people overtake them and keep them from including themselves in the service.

The best way to burn yourself out is to serve everyone but yourself. Giving is no more spiritual than receiving and depriving yourself of your birthright of abundance, love, and support is the best way to shortchange others of it.

So, here's the second question to ask: "What do I need to receive today in order to serve fully?" By asking these two questions, you will be amazed by how quickly you become the leader you've been waiting for.

He has hosted teleseminars with many of the world's top thought leaders such as Mark Victor Hansen, Jack Canfield, Stephen Covey, Les Brown, David Allen, Vic Conant, Brian Tracy, David Bach, Harvey Mackay, Robert Cialdini, Harv Eker, Bobbi De Porter, Michael Masterson, Joe Vitale, Gay and Katie Hendricks, Bob Proctor, and many others.

He is the CEO of Heritage House Publishing, Inc. – a boutique electronic marketing and publishing company that "repurposes" written and spoken educational content for worldwide distribution. He is also the founder of the Electronic Marketing Institute.

He has trained over 8,300 teleseminar students since 2002 and claims that practically any entrepreneur can transform their annual income into a weekly income once they apply his principle-centered electronic marketing strategies. Alex's 2001 annual income became an hourly income by 2006 and he has tripled his days off.

He lives in the San Francisco Bay Area with his wife, Aimee, and two children, Gabriel and Breanna, and enjoys over 90 "Free Days" each year.

Who do you think you are?

I am a trainer and teacher who inspires and leads others to discover their own unique ability so that they'll increase and accelerate their personal productivity, in their personal life and in their professional life. Sometimes I'm a mentor, other times I'm a trainer, other times I'm a teacher, but most of the time I'm a student. By becoming both student and teacher, I

accelerate my own learning and accelerate my productivity so that I can get more done in less time.

What event or series of events led to your discovery?

I learned all about training on a park bench, after I'd lost a quarter of a million dollars in a business venture. It was my first business venture after getting out of college. The park was Macarthur Park in Los Angeles, California.

Eighteen months before, I'd started this new venture. It was a frozen yogurt and bakery store, which turned into a devastating loss. It was not just a loss of resources, because ninety percent of the quarter million dollars wasn't even mine, it was money that was handed to me through relatives and grandparents, and money that was gifted to me by my parents. I had a lot of guilt surrounding this, and I wanted to learn how to never have that happen to me again.

On the way home from Long Beach, California I took the long way, and I went to Macarthur Park. I wish I could say it was a brutally cold winter, but it wasn't. It was summer and sunny outside. It was very comfortable. I was sitting right across the street from a hotel owned by one of my father's friends. I figured if it got too uncomfortable, I could at least go up to the hotel and sleep there.

While I was on that park bench, I was watching a heavy-set woman who was there in the park. She put a dime into a bird birdseed machine. She turned the knob, and the birdseed came out. Her goal was to get the pigeons that were at the park to feed from her hand. So, I was just watching this from the park bench. There was someone else on the park bench, too. We thought about what to call this woman, and she became The Pigeon Lady.

What was interesting was how she went about having her first beak-to-hand experience. The first pigeon that walked up to her – you know how pigeons walk – it bobbed up to her and put its beak into the palm of her hand. It had that level of trust, and all the other pigeons followed the one pigeon that started it. I considered it a dance – she was dancing with them to get them to that level of trust. Once the trust was initiated, they would always come back.

How she did it was she started walking gently and quietly and casually – non-invasively – towards the pigeons. There was a whole flock of pigeons bobbing along on the concrete there by the park. She'd walk towards them and they'd walk away, and so she'd turn around and she'd

show them the birdseed. It looked like they knew that she had birdseed, so they would walk towards her when she had turned around. She turned around again and walked towards them, and the pigeons walked away. She turned around to walk away from them, they walked towards her.

The distance between her and the flock became narrower and narrower in that dance she was doing. If she walked too quickly, it would startle them, and some would fly away. If she walked away without showing them the birdseed, they didn't walk towards her.

It took the better part of an hour until she turned around and one of the pigeons, probably and adolescent who didn't have too much fear, walked up to the palm of her hand, actually genuflected on one knee – I remember it like it was yesterday – and fed from the palm of her hand.

At that moment, I thought that was the miracle. At that moment, I didn't feel very highly about myself, my self-esteem was very low, so anything was a miracle. I was so embarrassed at what had happened with the business, so ashamed of losing all this money, and I felt like I didn't have a friend in the world, so this woman was kind of my virtual friend. I don't know if she even knew I existed. She had all these friends, these pigeons, and when the first pigeon came up to feed from her hand, I thought the miracle was that all the rest of the pigeons came up and started doing the same thing. They landed on her shoulder. They landed on her head. They were all over her!

That wasn't the miracle, though. The miracle was that the next day she didn't have to go through the dance. They remembered her, and just went straight up to her and fed from her hand. They wanted birdseed, and she didn't have to go through the dance. That trust was initiated. From that point on – and I was there a couple of days – she didn't have to go through the ritual. That's been a central metaphor for my life and for my training business, and that's how I teach people.

Interestingly enough, there was this young kid who was there in the park, maybe age five or six, and he got a coin from his mom, did the same thing with the bird seed, and wanted the same result as the woman. But because he didn't know how to dance with the pigeons, because he didn't have the patience or the vigilance to dance, it didn't work for him. He'd run towards the pigeons, startle them, and they'd fly away. He'd walk away from the pigeons without showing the birdseed to them, so they wouldn't follow him. Finally, he got frustrated and just threw the birdseed at all the pigeons, and never had that beak-to-hand relationship.

If he had watched what the lady did and had the patience she had, he would have had the same experience. On one side, no patience, no dancing,

and no beak-to-hand relationship, and on the other side you have this woman who knew what to do, went through the process for the better part of an hour. I stayed at the park about a week, and I saw her at least two or three days, and these pigeons would just flock to her! They wouldn't flock to anyone else; they'd flock to her because they trusted her.

I wondered how in my own life I could do this same thing. I needed to go through the dance. I didn't go through that dance with the business that failed. I was like that young kid, without patience. I just ran at the business, not knowing a thing about it, and then lost a ton of money – most of it not mine – and created this five-year hole in my life. I never claimed bankruptcy, but it took me a long time to pay it back. After many failed attempts at starting a business, I eventually got on my feet in 1994, which was five years later.

That specific incident inspired me to become who I am today. I define myself as the result I get in communicating with others, in teaching and training them how to learn about their unique abilities, and how to teach and train others to do the same. I'm a trainer's trainer, and I utilize the teleseminar method to teach thousands of people every year. Currently I have eleven thousand students, and that probably will double in a couple of years. And I always remember the Pigeon Lady at Macarthur Park in the summer of 1989.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their life's purpose, what would it be?

It would be to observe the lessons, like I did. I was told what to do, but I didn't do it. I was told to research and to dance with my business partners, and I didn't do that, I just jumped right in. I was told to be vigilant with my research and to make sure it was a good deal, and I didn't do that. I learned through observation.

Many people are told what to do, but unless you demonstrate to them through case studies, like how they teach at Harvard, they don't get it. You must demonstrate – not just articulate what to do and how to do it, and why it's so important. Like Jim Rohn says, "The bigger the why, the easier the how." The how is not enough, you have to have a big enough why.

I would advise others to observe the things around them, like I did with the Pigeon Lady. Give meaning to those things as metaphors for life. Depending on what they stand for, they will attract incidents like that to

learn from, so they can demonstrate, not just articulate their greatness to others. Then you've not only seen it, but also actually lived it.

If I tell someone something they will forget. If I show someone something they may remember. But, if I involve someone in something, then they will learn. My goal is to involve people and have them experience. I believe that experience is the most convincing thing that anyone can do. So, first observation, then experience what you learn through observation. When you begin to live this way you'll love teaching others, and the Teacher you become will love it even more.

Who do think you are?

This is a good question, and one I ask business people when I'm working with them. I asked them who they are and why they are there. I had been asking this question of myself for years and years and I found the answer eventually.

I revisited the town I grew up in about 10 years ago, and I saw a childhood friend that I hadn't seen since we were kids. We were

reminiscing about old times and the things we had done together, and at one point he said, "Do you remember when we were lying out on the front lawn looking at the stars, and I was talking about trading bubble gum cards, and you looked over at me and said 'Hey Jack, did you ever wonder why we're here?' We were probably like six years old." I did remember asking him that, but that would've been like me to do so, because I was in pursuit of that answer for many years.

I am a scout. I remember the moment I realized that. I could write books on what that means, but the bottom line is that's it. My job is to go out and explore and have experiences and gather information and bring it back to people and offer it. I say, here's a direct sense, here's how to get from here to there, and it may not be the way, but it's a way, and I offer it to you. As long as I'm doing that, I'm doing pretty well and making a contribution. 30 years later, people still find it to be of value. So that's who I am.

What events or series of events led to your discovery?

I used to live in Phoenix in 1972, and when I lived there I would go up to Sedona, Arizona. At the time, Sedona was only about three thousand people, today it's about fifty thousand or so. There was this little artist community in the red rock country. It was very beautiful.

On my way to Sedona off on the right hand side up on a rock was this building. To me it looked like it grew right out of the rock and there was nothing else around. I said what the heck is that? I turned off the road and drove in the direction of where it was. There was a parking lot right below and a walkway that went right up to the building, which was a church. I walked in and nobody was there. It was completely empty. There was a Bible open on the podium.

I wandered around this beautiful place, and I read a plaque that said an artist, not an architect, designed it. I took some pictures, and I sat there quietly by myself in some form of contemplation and introspection and had a great experience. I was blown away by the place. I was curious. I was like, what is this place, who did it, why did they do it, how did they do it, what's it for and who comes here? That was in 1972, and I went along on my way and I forgot about it.

Flash forward to 1978, and I'm with my friends and we have a free day. We'd all been working hard and traveling and I thought we should just have a good time and maybe drive up to the Grand Canyon. I said, "You know, I used to live here. Let's go to Oak Creek in Sedona.

It's a cool little community, and it's on the way to the Grand Canyon. We can take adetour."

As we are driving up to Sedona I suddenly remembered this church, and I got really excited and I said, "Hey, let me show you something really cool." I saw the church, drove into the parking lot and parked the car. I ran up the ramp, because I was so excited and I was almost all the way up to the church before the rest of the guys were barely even out of the car.

The moment I turned around and looked back at the car was like a "burning bush" experience for me. It was like this energy came over me and I actually heard a voice. I didn't know if it was my voice or not, but it was speaking in the first person and it said, "I am a scout." It didn't say "you" are a scout. It said "I" am a scout. I had this flood of energy and tears and this moment of clarity.

That's who I am. I knew what it meant, and that's what I've been doing ever since. I go out and explore, I have experiences, I have a great curiosity, and I follow that, and then I find something, I find some kind of spiritual truth or what I call a life principle. Then I bring it back and I offer it to people, and the way I offer it to them is I give them an experience. I might tell them the information, but it's better if they can have the experience of discovering it themselves. That's how I found it.

I went to school and was a good student. I was president of the honor society, I got into Stanford, got out of school, started six businesses, made money, did the thing I thought I was supposed to do: got married. I got my own house, did the American dream kind of thing, and with all that success I was actually miserable. I was killing myself. I had an ulcer, I was smoking two packs of cigarettes a day, drinking 12 cups of coffee a day, sleeping two hours a night. I had insomnia, but I was living the way I was taught to live. That's what I thought life was, you know, you go out and make money, build and business and collect things. And at some point that got so miserable that I just had to find something else. I got far enough off course that I had to wake up.

Then I took Life Spring training. I had never done any of that Self-help, Human Potential stuff. I was a businessman who didn't do those things. I took it in another city. The guy who enrolled me had been asking me for nine months. Thank God he was persistent. I just kept telling him I was too busy and not interested.

Finally, the company sent their president to Eugene Oregon, and he invited me out to dinner. That flattered me, so I went. I had a nice time and then they offered me a scholarship to the training. I had no consideration of the cost, but just the fact that they offered it appealed to my ego again. So, I took the training in another town, because I didn't want anyone in my business to know that I was doing it. I had a pretty good experience.

I took a second training because my wife signed up for it. I wasn't going to. In that training I had unexplainable experiences. I had altered consciousness. I was seeing through solid things. I found a missing person. I found my heart again. I found energy I didn't know was there. It was amazing.

I started volunteering for the company and I helped create the first training they did in Eugene, Oregon. I put 60 people in that training in about a month. I don't know if that's what got their attention or not. I was assisting in a training and the trainer came back and handed me an envelope and said, "Here, use these and go down and talk to Handley."

I said, "Who's Handley?"

He said, "Handley is the president of Life Spring."

"Why would I want to talk to the president?"

"Talk to him about working for us," he said.

"Why would I want to work for you? I own six businesses. I don't have enough time for those and they are bigger than your business."

But in the back of my mind I was thinking this is a lot more valuable than what I'm doing. This is serving, this is peace, this is love, this is how to have a better life, this is everything they were trying to teach in church but didn't.

So I flew to San Francisco, and I ended up working for Life Spring. Three months later, I closed my businesses, moved to Seattle, Washington and within a week I was in front of the room doing trainings, and I'm still doing it.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their life's purpose, what would it be?

It's simple, but not necessarily easy. It's the eternal advice that has been used for millenniums. Follow your heart. Be true to yourself. Follow your bliss. But that's not easy because it requires great courage. It requires risk. It requires what I call faith steps, stepping into the unknown with zero guarantees and no certainty. It only works if you do it 100%, completely detached, and all along you have to learn life lessons. Surrender, detachment, cooperation, enthusiasm, letting go, focus, and all that's in the process. At some point, it shows up.

Everybody has a purpose and it's uniquely theirs. On a grander level every human has the same purpose, but it has a unique expression in each person. I say I am a scout. That's how I identify mine. Someone else may say, "I'm an explorer." Someone else may say, "I am a teacher." Someone else may say, "I'm here to learn loving relationships, I'm here to share something." But how do you find out what yours is?

It's not an analytical process, it's not a mental process as all. It's an awareness process. If you try to figure it out mentally or analyze it, you won't find it. It's uncovering it, where you just know it. The easiest way I know how to do it, or to lead someone to it or to support them to it, is I have them make a list of all the times in their life when they experienced great joy, clarity, pure loving, wonderful enthusiasm, peak moments, memorable moments in their life that were genuinely positive.

It could be a peace, it could be a loving, it could be a victory, enthusiasm, it could be when you were acknowledged, it could be the birth of a child, whatever is there. It could be an A you got in a class, a test you passed, a swim meet you won, a book you wrote, something where the experience inside was full of great joy and happiness and ease. I think everybody's got some of those.

Once they have their list, I can see the thread that runs through the list and that's their purpose. Then all you need to do is identify it in your own words. You need to do it quietly and just allow it to happen. If it doesn't show up really fast, then I'd put it aside and come back to it later. It isn't something you try to figure out and analyze and puzzle over, you just get it. There's a light inside of you and basically you're just connecting with it. And this is a mechanism through which people can connect with it again, to uncover it and bring it to life. Once you've got it then do your best to make your choices on purpose. I have found that when I do that my life really works well.

Who do you think you are?

I think I am a naturally gifted leader with a lot of talents. I'm a believer. God has given me many gifts, particularly with regards to the human condition. I've been told I'm a great motivator and fairly innovative with my ideas. By and large, I'm a person who's in service to others and it comes across in the form of coaching, which I've been doing now for about fifteen years.

At the core, who I really am as a person is someone with three very important values. The first one is courage, and I'm not sure yet whether it's courage in a brave way or courage in a dumb way to do things in a way that others won't do. I haven't really figured that out just yet. The second is freedom. In other words, I have the ability to do what I would like to do, which is to make a difference to people. The third piece is to be independent. And while these two are very similar, the independence means that I'm able to do it my way. Not necessarily in an

arrogant way, but in an effective way. I get to choose what I get to do and how I do it, so I can feel the 100% satisfaction of my efforts. And that pretty much sums up in my mind who I am.

What event or series of events led you to your discovery?

One thing I noticed early on, somewhere between five and seven years old, is that I didn't want to be like my brothers and sisters or like my parents. I'm not exactly sure where that came from, but it has served me in my life, because most of the rest of my family are blue-collar workers. Not that there's anything wrong with that. Being a white-collar worker was just important to me, not so much for the white-collar work, but that I wouldn't be doing blue-collar work.

So there was something ingrained in me there, and about eight years ago I was running a business, and the business was doing fair at best. I wasn't sure what I should do next. I went on the Internet to see if there was something that could help me. I actually typed up the word "consultant" on a search, and what came back was a number of consultants. At the very top of the list was a company called ABC Consulting.

When I called the firm and talked to the principle owner, he said, "You don't need consulting you need business coaching." This was the first I ever heard of coaching. I hired him for a period of about a year-and-a-half with the thought of bolstering up a failing business. I ended up selling it for a million dollars.

I had no intention to sell it when I first talked to him. I was determined to just fix what was broken. Through the process of working with this coach, he expanded my horizons to even be able to think about selling it, and since then I've been financially free and able to do what I want to do, which plays into my two core values of freedom and independence.

After working with him, I thought, "Wow this business coaching is really cool." So after I sold the business, I went back to him and he trained me how to do it. I've been coaching people in one capacity or another ever since. As I did business coaching, more and more things kept coming up about psychology to the point where I was fascinated by it. It would just stop me in my tracks when I watched human behavior or saw shows where people were acting in certain ways, or read a text that talked about human behavior. I've been fascinated with human behaviors for the last ten or twelve years of my life.

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their life's purpose, what would it be?

The first thing I would recommend is to create a vision for your life. Many times the words "mission" and "vision" get interchanged, so I'll define my definition of vision. For me a vision is a dream that never ends. In other words, even as we're speaking babies are being born left and right, so my job will never really end. There will always be people for me to help be the best human beings they can be.

Second, find something you're passionate about. Find in your life that one thing that you love. Then do it. Look for an edge. What way can you do the thing you love to do, in a way that others aren't doing it.

These two pieces will work in tandem for every female I've come in contact with, but for guys it seems to be mushy, so they need a little bit more guidance. For the guys, if finding your passion, vision, or edge doesn't work, I would look inside and ask yourself what the three core principles that drive your life are. Remember for me I said courage, freedom, and independence.

The three core values will not likely change in a person. From there they can go out into the world and ask, "What are the kinds of things I could do? What kind of career? What kind of vision or missions in my life fall into these three core principles? How do I align myself with those kinds of things, based on the fact that I know myself so well and that these things have to be in everything that I do?" After you find the answers to those questions, it's just about making some intelligent choices. That would be the greatest piece of advice I think I could give anybody at this time.

Who do you think you are?

I choose to answer this question in a few different ways. I am a trainer, a singer, an author and a relationship expert on the surface. These are the skills that I have developed in order to express my true purpose, which is: I am a loving, trusting, worthy man, expressing what's in my heart and sharing my joy. I am also here to touch the lives of all those who I come in contact with in a positive way, and to pass on the things I have learned to those who are willing to listen.

What event or series of events led to your discovery?

I spent many years searching for my answer to the questions: "Who am I?" and "What is my purpose?" During those years I did an extensive outer search. I visited every church I could find, looking for somthing or

someone to *show me the way* to the answers I was seeking. I wished that I could sit down in front of people that I considered to be successful and ask them questions about life purpose and their discovery. Years later, after receiving my own answers, I discovered that I often wondered about those who were still searching for theirs.

At one critical time during my inquiry I found myself a single father who had just ended a thirteen year marriage. I had no idea who I was. Because I had met my now ex-wife at such an early age, I only knew who I was with her. I found myself with a big empty hole and I had no idea how to fill it.

After spending much wasted time actively trying to figure it all out in my head, I decided that I needed to go within and listen for my answers. Fortunately, I had learned from a church how to quiet my mental noise, ask questions, and receive answers from my inner guidance. So, the pain I was feeling and the confidence I had gained in listening to my inner voice motivated me to spend the next year meditating on the question, "Who Am I?"

From that came the questions: "What is my purpose?" and "Why am I here?" I would ask these questions one at a time, and I refused to do anything else (except to go to work, or to deal with immediate family issues) until I received my answers. I spent each waking moment waiting in the silence for answers to just "drop in." After many months of eager anticipation, the answers started to present themselves to me!

- 1. "Who am I?" I asked. I heard, "You are a child of infinite spirit. You are pure energy. You are actually living proof that God exists. You are a wonderful way that joy, love, happiness, melody, truth and compassion are happening on this planet you call home."
- 2. "What is my purpose?" I asked. I heard, "To teach and inspire the masses to know that they are perfect just the way they are. The gifts you have been given are innate; it is your purpose to share them. Keep them not inside of you, but let these feelings, stories and sounds OUT, and those who are ready will hear what they need to hear and be moved by them."
- 3. "Why am I here?" I asked. I then heard, "You are here to touch the lives of each person you come in contact with. You are here to remember all that you have forgotten. You are here to *love and be loved*, and to learn to *just be* in each moment."

I asked my inner voice, "But how am I to teach and inspire the masses, as a singer and songwriter?" "Yes." the voice said. "What about as an author, a teacher or as a preacher?" Again, I heard, "Yes." "Wait, which one? I asked." All I heard was silence. "Which one," I asked again and again. There was still no answer to my question. I soon came to the realization that the answer to this question would be revealed either to me or through me at another other time. I had received the answers I needed to hear regarding my purpose already. This came with grace. It wasn't until I started trying to figure out the how that my clarity started to cloud up on me. I decided not to focus on the how, but to allow my inner knowing or instincts to point me in the right direction.

I soon decided to start dating again, and consciously using the Law of Attraction, I found my perfect mate. She shared with me this same sense of life purpose, and out of that came our unified vision to make a difference in the world in the field of relationships. We both agreed that until someone becomes completely okay within themselves, there is no room to add someone else into their life. Until one is able to love themselves full out, they will end up using their relationships to fill that empty unloved space within them.

It is our belief that once we tap into the love inside of us, and become comfortable in our own skin, *then* the fun of finding a life mate begins. I would suggest that this is the perfect time to go within and let inner guidance reveal your next steps toward creating your perfect relationship. We're talking about the type of relationship that *adds* to your already great life. One that is built on a foundation of, *we are both good enough just the way we are, so there's nothing for me to change or fix about you.*

If you could give advice to those who are still searching for their answers to these questions, what would it be?

There is no one who can answer these questions for you better than your inner guidance system. I've heard this inner guidance system called by many different names. I've heard it called God, instinct, the still small voice, Holy Ghost and many other names. You can call it what ever you like, I just know it's there for me when I am willing to sit and listen.

Sometimes people ask me how is it that I hear voices in my head, and I say, "it's easier than you think." Let me explain:

Start by sitting down, turn off the noise of the world and your random passing thoughts, and just listen. Listen to your breath at first,

until you hear only your breath. If thoughts come in, let them pass through as quickly as they come and go back to your breath. Once you get to where all you hear is your breath, you work on turning the sound of your breath off too. There is a lot revealed in the space between two breaths when you are tuned in and listening.

Sometimes this *voice* shows up as an inner knowing. You just all of a sudden become crystal clear on something you were wondering about before. You may hear a voice literally. I think the bottom line is to know and remember that you have every answer to every question within you. The question really is, are you willing to slow it down enough to listen?

I think mentors are great. I've used them myself, but only as a sounding board. I take what they say and I go to my "inner mentor" to see if it agrees. I choose *external* mentors for specific purposes. I have mentors for guidance about reaching financial goals. I have a handful who guide me spiritually. The mentors I trust the most and who have given me the most support are those mentors who loving and unceasingly remind me that there is no more powerful guidance than that which comes through my *inner* guidance.

We as human beings seek incessantly, thinking that there is so much we need to learn. Most of us have allowed ourselves to become *human doings*, not *human beings*! Plus, with all the external noise and activity in our lives, it's easy to forget how to use our innate ability to tune in to the guidance available through our thoughts and feelings. Until we stop, slow down, turn off the television set, the stereo, the video games, or the opinions of our friends, co-workers or mates, we're unable to hear the wisdom that is within each of us. It is ALL inside of you. I urge you to consider that perhaps we already know everything and just need to stop and listen, in order to remember.

Everything you need to know is already within you. *You* are the answer you have been searching for. Stop, ask and listen. Stop, ask and listen. Then, stop, ask and listen again. And why not start this process *right now*?

Upon the day that I was born, I opened up my mouth To joyfully express what my existence was about. I raised my arms, I clapped my hands, I tilted back my head, I blinked my eyes, I looked around, and this is what I said: "Hello my little planet Earth, I've come to bring you love Which - for your information - I've got an abundance of. My question, though, is when and where and which way do I bring it? Do I speak it, write it, guide you through it, dance or sing it?" And when I asked this question, Spirit lovingly replied, "You'll know just how to share it when you know just what's inside." "I do know," I responded, "it's my love and I've got tons!" "Then bring it forth, sweet child, and don't forget to have some fun!" So on that day that I was born, I opened up my heart And learned my first great lesson: How to get there is to start.

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
